Lionel Messi has shattered yet another record in his storied career as the Argentine maestro is now the most decorated footballer in the game's history with a record of 45 title wins.

Argentina defeated Colombia 1-0 in the final to win their second successive Copa America title in Miami and with it, Messi edged past his former Barcelona teammate and Brazilian rival Dani Alves to become the most decorated footballer ever.

This was Messi's fourth straight international title, having won the Copa America in 2021, the Finalissima in 2022 and the FIFA World Cup in 2022 before defending the Copa title this year in the

Messi has enjoyed a total of 39 titles in his club career, 35 of which came with

He has won a total of 12 league titles (10 with Barcelona, two with PSG), four UEFA sorry note for Messi who had to be replaced

He has also won three UEFA Super Cups and three FIFA Club World Cups with the Catalan giants.

Messi has also won the Under-20 World Cup trophy and an Olympic gold for Argentina. The 37-year-old is also holder of eight Balon d'Or trophies, most by any footballer. So far, he has netted 838 goals and 374 assists in his career.

# Alcaraz plotting golden path to greatness

There was a moment of euphoria after Carlos Alcaraz finished off Novak Djokovic to retain his Wimbledon title on Sunday, the usual pumped fists and group hugs with his entourage in the players' box.

But an hour or so later the Spaniard was already back down on planet earth, insisting his journey is only just beginning.

"I've seen and I've heard all the statistics that I am the youngest to win at Roland Garros and Wimbledon the same year," the 21-year-old told reporters after his 6-2, 6-2, 7-6(4) demolition of 24-time Grand Slam champion Djokovic.

"I honestly try not to think about it too much. Obviously it's a really great start of my career but I have to keep going. I have to keep building my path.

"At the end of my career, I want to sit at the same table as the big guys. That's my main goal. That's my dream. It doesn't matter if I already

won four Grand Slams at the age of 21." Alcaraz is indeed the youngest player to

complete the French Open-Wimbledon double in the same year during the professional era and emulated Roger Federer in winning his first four Grand Slam finals, although the Swiss triumphed in his first seven.

Alcaraz's four Grand Slam titles, the 2022 U.S Open, last year's Wimbledon when he also beat Djokovic, and this year's French Open-Wimbledon double, required just 69

matches at the slams.

Federer needed 79 matches, Nadal 81 and Djokovic 134 before notching their fourth Grand Slam titles.

With Italy's world number one Jannik Sinner, winner of this year's Australian Open, vying with Alcaraz for top-dog status, the figureheads of a new generation are now established.

Whether or not either can go on to challenge the numbers of the "Big Three" is another question entirely.

"I think being there with Jannik, in the top of the ranking, winning the Grand Slams, I think it is good for tennis to have new faces winning the big things and fighting for the big tournaments,"



# Start of a new SPANISH ERA?

Spain conquered Europe for a record fourth time on Sunday as they beat England to win Euro 2024 and want this historic night to be the beginning of a new period of dominance.

Led by young stars Lamine Yamal and Nico Williams, 17 and 22 respectively, many in Luis de la Fuente's superb side will hit their prime in the years ahead.

Between 2008 and 2012 Spain international football, dominated winning the Euros in those years and the 2010 World Cup in the middle.

A fallow period followed with Spain falling badly short in most competitions until reaching the semifinals of Euro 2020.

It was a positive sign but a last 16 defeat by Morocco at the 2022 World Cup spelled the end of Luis Enrique's reign and the start of what was to come. No longer dependent on dominating

possession, Luis de la Fuente's Spain play to a wide variety of strengths. Sometimes they do keep the ball, as

in the second half of their semi-final win over pre-tournament favourites France, but are not afraid to go direct, with the speedy and skilful Williams and Yamal duo leaving full-backs for dead on the

Spain's football has changed but they are hoping their domination of the international stage will be repeated.

"You can always improve and that's our objective... we will do it because these players are an example for everyone, they are so good."



Coach Luis de la Fuente came under and Real Sociedad, Spain believed in heavy scrutiny after a shock defeat by Scotland in Euros qualifying in March 2023, but steadied the ship by winning the Nations League three months later, confirming Spain were on the right track, at least on the field.

With the team no longer dependent on stars from Real Madrid and Barcelona, but instead a real mix including a strong Basque contingent from Athletic Bilbao

Spain were also without Pedri for the semis and final after he was hurt early in the quarterfinal win over Germany.

It is clear why De la Fuente believes Spain's present is bright but their future can be even brighter.
