Gridlock returns to Dhaka streets

Traffic congestions in different parts of Dhaka meant the capital returned to its usual self yesterday after almost a week of violence, along with curfew and a three-day general holiday.

City dwellers thronged banks, government and private offices to complete pending tasks during the seven-hour curfew break window.

However, they faced immense sufferings due to traffic jams at different points, as numerous vehicles hit the streets at once.

The suspension of metro rail and elevated expressway operations since Thursday, following large-scale damages during recent violence, added to the sufferings.

A shortage of public transport, particularly buses, forced commuters to wait for hours or walk miles to reach their destinations.

Long queues were observed at banks, while people rushed to government and other offices, which were open for four hours from 11:00am.

Major thoroughfares, including Kazi Nazrul Islam Avenue, Mirpur Road, Airport Road, and Begum Rokeya Sarani,

as well as key intersections like Mohakhali, Banani, Shahbagh, Tejgaon, Gulshan, and Kalyanpur, were crammed with vehicles.

Polas Miah, a resident of Mirpur-12, who usually commutes to his office in Dilkusha via metro rail daily, said he spent more than three hours on the road by bus for what used to be a 30-minute journey on the metro rail.

"The metro rail made our lives very easy, but its suspension has put us in serious trouble again," he said.

Anwara Begum's ordeal was different. She not only waited on the road for hours but also had to walk miles due to severe traffic congestion.

"It took four and a half hours to reach the court area in Old Dhaka from Kalyanpur due to severe traffic congestion at different points," she said.

Anwara left her CNG-run three-wheeler at Shahbagh after being stuck for half an hour and then walked to Gulistan, from where she hired a rickshaw to reach her destination.

Jhilan, a driver of a CNG-run three-wheeler, earned Tk 1,000 by yesterday evening despite starting his day at 8:00am due to traffic congestion in Uttara and

Scenes of despair at CMM court

Family members throng its premises to find their arrested loved ones

It was 1:00am yesterday when Bristy Begum woke up as she heard knocks on her door.

When she opened the door, she saw law enforcers waiting outside.

They came for her husband Fazlur Rahman, 40, in suspicion of him being involved in the recent unrest.

Before taking Fazlur away, the cops told Bristy that he would be produced before the Chief Metropolitan Magistrate's Court in the morning.

Bristy couldn't sleep the entire night.

In the morning, after the curfew was relaxed, she headed towards Old Dhaka where the court is located from their residence at Manik Nagar in Jatrabari, accompanied by two relatives and her five-year-old daughter Faria.

Despite waiting for six hours, Bristy could not find Fazlur among the 413 arrestees produced before the court yesterday.

The court premises were full of relatives of the arrestees.

Later, court sources confirmed Fazlur was sent to jail in a case filed with Jatrabari Police

"My husband is innocent. He was not involved in any violence, yet police arrested him," Bristy told this correspondent at 5:30pm.

"We live on my husband's earnings. How will we survive now?" she asked.

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DNCC resumes household waste collection: mayor

Dhaka North City Corporation has removed around 10,000 tonnes of garbage, generated during the recent violence on different city roads in DNCC areas.

An official of DNCC said they started clearing up the garbage, including bricks, felled trees, and grilles of medians on Monday night and completed it by Tuesday noon.

DNCC has collected garbage from different roads in the Pragati Sarani, Badda, Rampura, Mohakhali, Banani, Kazipara, Shewrapara, Mirpur, Uttara, and Mohammadpur areas.

He said they also resumed collecting regular household garbage.

Meanwhile, DNCC Mayor Md Atiqul Islam and LGRD Minister Md Tazul Islam yesterday visited the DNCC Zone-10 office at Mirpur-10 to witness the damaged vehicles.

Miscreants have vandalised various offices and

A total of 67 DNCC vehicles have been damaged. Of these, 29 garbage-carrying vehicles were completely charred, alongside 21 jeeps used by officers.

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Markets open, but mostly deserted

Shopping malls and markets in the capital opened yesterday, after being closed for four consecutive days, but the presence of buyers was very low.

The shops and malls were open from 10:00am to 3:00pm, as there was a break in the curfew during those hours.

Businessmen said due to the unrest over the last week, panic still persists among the buyers. So, many customers chose not to visit the shops.

Very few customers, who were in urgent need of certain products, visited the stores. It will likely take a few more days for the situation to completely return to normal, they added.

At least 150 people died in clashes between agitators and law enforcers and ruling party activists till Wednesday during the quota reform protest.

Ashraf Ali, manager of a retail shop at Noorjahan Super Market of the capital's Newmarket, said, "There is still a kind of panic among the people. As a result, even after opening the outlet on Wednesday, four days later, the number of customers is very low."

"Usually, products worth around Tk 10,000 are sold between 10:00am and 1:00pm on a regular day. However, yesterday we sold only Tk 3,000 worth of products. Hopefully, when the situation returns to normal, buyers will also increase," he said.

Khalid Mahmood Khan, co-founder of Kay Kraft, said some of their outlets were opened, and some were not. Not all outlets that were opened had visitors, he added.

However, most outlets sold some products, albeit very little, he said, adding that at least customers knew

Publish actual number of casualties

Demands Garment Sramik Sanghati

Bangladesh Garment Sramik Sanghati and Mahila Parishad have expressed concern over the current situation in the country.

In a statement, Taslima Akhter, president of Garment Sramik Sanghati; and Anjan Das, vice-president, condemned the killings, violence, arrests, and harassment.

Referring to media reports, they said approximately 197 people have been shot dead, 2,657 arrested, and numerous cases filed. They also criticised the government for shutting down the internet, which has restricted the public's right to information.

They demanded immediate publication of the actual number of casualties.

In a separate statement, Mahila Parishad condemned the elimination of female quota.
