Criminals to be tried following due process

Foreign ministry assures int'l community; says innocents won't face harassment

The government has assured the international community that law enforcement agencies will bring individuals responsible for the recent violence to justice using evidence, without any form of reprisal or harassment against protesting students or innocent civilians.

The law enforcement agencies have been given clear instructions to this end, said the Ministry of Foreign Affairs (MoFA) in a statement yesterday.

The government is ensuring that due process is followed in guaranteeing accountability and justice for reported terrorist acts and that law enforcement agencies avoid excessive use of force under any circumstances, it stated.

The statement comes after the United Nations (UN), western countries, and global rights bodies condemned the recent violence, encouraged a durable solution to the present crisis, and stressed due process in the justice system and upholding fundamental human rights.

As per the home ministry, the death toll in last week's violence reached 147, while according to independent media reports, it was close to 200. SEE PAGE 6 COL 4

55 police officers get postings, transfers

In a major move, the government yesterday transferred and posted 55 police officers including two additional Inspector Generals of Police (additional IGP) and five Additional Deputy Inspector Generals (Additional DIG).

The list also includes 48 officers of the rank of Superintendent of Police

These transfers and postings were announced through four separate circulars by the Public Security Division of the Ministry of Home

All of these officials got the supernumerary promotion to (officials who hold the same position and perform the same duties after their elevation) a year back. And now, they finally got the regular posting, according to officials of the Police Headquarters.

Among the two additional IGPs, Deputy Inspector General of Police Telecom (promoted to the post of Supernumerary Additional IGP) AKM Shahidur Rahman has been posted as the Additional IGP in the PHQ, and

Most of the accused face charges of gathering illegally, rioting, assaulting enforcers, and damaging properties.

ARRESTS IN DHAKA

Police produced 2,506, including 98 yesterday, before the Chief Metropolitan Magistrate's Court in at least 158 cases between July 17 and July 28

In 15 cases filed with Jatrabari Police Station, 335 people were arrested. The area saw continuous violence for almost a week starting on July 17.

Mirpur police arrested 168 people under 10 cases while Uttara (east) arrested 164 under 10 cases, Paltan police arrested 145 under eight cases, and Badda police arrested 130 people under four cases.

Mirpur, Uttara, Badda and Paltan areas too witnessed fierce clashes.

Five cases were filed over killing policemen, a student and a police informant. One was filed under Cyber Security Act.

She emphasised that the government would not allow anyone to jeopardise the future of Bangladesh and its people. "We will not allow anyone to play with the fate of Bangladesh, so I need all-out cooperation and assistance from you.'

Hasina expressed her determination to prevent such criminal activities from recurring in the country. "I don't know how to console you. But I can understand your pain," she said, addressing the grieving families.

Questioning the motives of the attackers, she asked, "What was the fault of general public? Why they were killed and had to face immense suffering? Killing people to topple the government? How it is possible?"

While trying to console the victims' families, Hasina shared her own losses. "... I am like you: an orphan who has lost parents and brothers. I understand your pain. I will be by your

attacks, she remarked, "Burning down everything is never acceptable. It is unthinkably brutal to hang a person after killing them. How can a Muslim hang the body of another Muslim? Those who are involved in these crimes will surely face trial."

She stressed the need for bringing the culprits to book to ensure the safety of the people. "People cannot be protected unless they are tried."

She urged the victims' families to remain patient. "I am with you as long as I live."

PM VISITS BSMMU, POLICE HOSPITALS

Later in the day, Hasina visited Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujib Medical University (BSMMU) and Central Police hospitals to see those who were injured in the violence.

She went to the Central Police Hospital around 5:00pm after visiting BSMMU. She enquired about the health of those undergoing treatment

The premier gave necessary instructions to the hospital authorities to ensure their proper treatment.

During her visit to BSMMU in Shahbagh, VC Prof Deen Mohd Noorul Huq and BSMMU Hospital Director Brig Gen Md Rezaur Rahman briefed the prime minister on the treatment measures taken for the injured.

Home Minister Asaduzzaman Khan and Inspector General of Police Chowdhury Abdullah Al Mamun were among the officials present during her visit to the Central Police Hospital in

As many as 39 police members are now undergoing treatment at the Central Police Hospital. Three police personnel were killed, and 1,131 others injured in the mayhem.

Hasina also visited Dhaka Medical College Hospital on Friday and the National Institute of Traumatology & Orthopaedic Rehabilitation on Saturday to see the victims of the

by 90 percent since it reopened on July 24, said Mohammad Rashedul Islam, team leader of the branch, which was shut from July 18 to July

"A number of our food items have expired due to the six-day closure. As a result, we incurred losses," he

Bipu Chowdhury, chief executive officer of Nawabi Voj, which runs four branches in the capital, said the recent unrest could not come at a worse time.

"We have just returned to business after the fire incident on Bailey Road. Business was almost back to normal. Once again, I am counting a big loss," he said.

Customer turnout at Nawabi Voj's four branches started declining on July 15, when the students' quota reform movement picked up pace. The company had to keep its restaurants shut from July 19 to July

After reopening, the chain is seeing just 30 percent of its usual years.

The internet blackout for five days has also robbed them of online sales lakh restaurants, employing 30 lakh as the food delivery platforms were off-grid.

Parcel delivery has started by

the end of last week as broadband internet service resumed, but business has not been good, he added.

After opening the restaurant on July 25, customer turnout is gradually increasing but it was far from normal, said Sabikoon Nahar, manager of the Saudi Arabian fast food chain Herfy.

Imran Hassan, secretary general of the Bangladesh Restaurant Owners' Association (BROA), demanded the government ensure low-cost loans to help restaurant owners recoup losses and stay afloat.

This is the second big hit to the eateries in Dhaka in 2024 after the government agencies indiscriminately shut down establishments on health and safety grounds following a fire incident in the capital's Bailey Road in February that caused the loss of 46 lives.

The hit to the restaurant business also comes when establishments are struggling with the persistently high inflation for the best part of two

"My son was a threat to no one. He was not involved in the protest. The police unjustly shot my innocent son," said Kamrul, a teacher at a madrasa in Lalbagh.

A witness, who also suffered shotgun pellet injuries close to his eve, said, "Everything happened so fast that we could not fathom what was going on. We were getting out of the colony when the protesters ran inside. Before we could understand anything, a policeman pointed his gun at us and fired."

Some people later took Khalid and him to the Dhaka Medical College Hospital, he said, wishing anonymity fearing reprisal.

Hearing the news, Kamrul went to the DMCH. "I saw my son lying on a bed and blood oozing out of his mouth and nose. My innocent son

The family's ordeal didn't end there. He said they faced immense difficulties in getting Khalid's body from the hospital morgue.

"At 2:30am on July 20, I went to the Lalbagh Police Station for clearance, without which the hospital authorities would not release the body. The police questioned me and told me to come back at 9:00am," Kamrul told The Daily Star.

"I went again but they did not cooperate. Two days later, they finally gave the clearance, and I received my son's body. During this time, I visited the police station four to five times a

Around 4:30pm on July 21, Kamrul received his son's body. Khalid was buried at their family graveyard in Bhadashon village in Faridpur's

Kamrul said, "We had a hope that Khalid [his eldest son] would become a lawyer. Our family is poor, and he wanted to contribute tot he family. Who will I ask for justice now?"

Khalid's mother gave to this correspondent just one line: "They did not let my son live."

"Only police can arrest someone who is specifically accused in any case or has a warrant or anyone who is a deserter from any force, or is on the run in any case, or an accused of any criminal charges. Except for police, no force has the legal jurisdiction to arrest anyone in any way," he said.

He said there is no law to keep anyone confined to a jail for over 24

In 2009, the High Court said section 54 of the Code of Criminal Procedure is contradictory to fundamental rights and amended it with 15 directives, mentioning that if police want to arrest anyone on suspicion, they must explain the reason in writing, said the legal

"When police go for any arrest,
