

'Please don't break rules'

Students continue managing traffic, cleaning streets

Students remained in the roads of Dhaka for a third day in a row yesterday to manage traffic and collect wastes in absence of law enforcement and conservatory workers, following the upheaval that led to Sheikh Hasina's fall.

From Panthapath to Gulistan, Shahbagh to Banglamotor, young volunteers have stepped up to restore order and safety in the city.

Around 1:30pm in Panthapath, rickshaw puller Amjad Hossain was attempting to overtake a line of vehicles when a female student intervened, saying, "Please don't break the rules."

Hossain, who has been using the road for nearly two years, happily complied. The student, Sadia Amreen, a private university student, along with her peers, took it upon themselves to guide drivers and ensure adherence to traffic rules.

"A dozen of us are here controlling traffic. We work in a roster system. It's encouraging to see people actually listening to us," Sadia told The Daily Star.

Amjad expressed his approval of the initiative.

"Today, a young girl approached me and told me it was wrong. This change is positive, and I'm following their directions," he said.

This scene was replicated across the city. Students from various educational institutions were seen managing traffic at major intersections, including Gulistan, Paltan, Shahbagh, and Banglamotor. Working in shifts,

sometimes joined by Ansar members, they filled the void left by absent traffic police.

Students were also engaged in cleaning efforts.

Arif Hossain, a private university student managing traffic at Farmgate, said, "With traffic police not fulfilling their duties, we, as students, stepped in to control the situation. I've been here since 8:00am, and despite the long hours, I'm enjoying it because I love this work."

Rafiqul Islam, a Dhaka College student stationed in Dhanmondi, shared a similar sentiment.

"It's our responsibility to step in when things aren't being managed properly. People are actually responding well to us, and it's a great feeling," he said.

Maria Rahman, a high school student managing traffic at Bijoy Sarani, added, "At first, I was nervous about confronting drivers, but they have been surprisingly cooperative."

In Moghbazar, student volunteer Nafis Ahmed said, "We're just doing our

Hopes Fakhru, visits NITOR

Expressing his optimism, Mirza Fakhru Islam Alamgir yesterday hoped that Professor Muhammad Yunus would be successful in leading the interim government.



"Professor Muhammad Yunus will successfully lead the interim government. Yunus is chosen by the students and by us. He has been entrusted with this responsibility on behalf of the entire nation. We are confident he will fulfil this duty," Fakhru said during his visit to the National Institute of Traumatology and Orthopaedic Rehabilitation (NITOR).

"We are very hopeful that under his capable leadership, the law and order situation will normalise," he said.

"But the biggest issue is not just that. The root of the problem lies in the lack of democracy. Restoring democracy is one of his primary tasks," he added.

7-year-old Araf Mahin manages traffic, cleans street in Bagerhat

In times of chaos, heroes often emerge from the most unexpected places. They don't always wear capes – in fact, some show up wearing a raincoat, armed with nothing more than a stick and a whistle.

A seven-year old hero has emerged in Bagerhat in the aftermath of a complete breakdown in law and order following a power vacuum triggered by the fall of Sheikh Hasina and absence of police.

Araf Mahin, a first grader, has been managing traffic and cleaning streets in front of the Police Line



School in Bagerhat for the last two days.

He uses his whistle, which he bought for Tk 30, to direct vehicles and maintain separate lanes.

Yesterday morning, Araf was seen organising separate lanes for rickshaws, motorcycles, and auto-



rickshaws all alone.

His mother Laili Anjuman shared her pride, saying, "Araf asked for 30 taka for a snack, but instead, he bought a whistle to manage traffic. When I came to take him home, he asked for one

Two more VCs resign

CUET bans politics; JnU to start online classes Aug 18

Vice-chancellors of two more public universities – Rajshahi University and Islamic University (IU), Kushtia – resigned after the Awami League-led government was dissolved amid a student movement.

The VCs who resigned are Prof Golam Sabbir Sattar of RU and Prof Sheikh Abdus Salam of IU.

Alongside the VC, at least 29 top officials of RU resigned from their respective posts.

They stepped down from their positions hours after leaders of Student Movement Against Discrimination issued an ultimatum urging them to resign within 24 hours.

Contacted, Prof Golam Sabbir Sattar said, "I resigned from my post for personal reasons."

RU acting registrar Prof Tariqul Islam said 29 officials, including proctor Prof Asabul Haque

'An opportunity for renewal'

ICG gives set of recommendations

The International Crisis Group (ICG), a global NGO and think tank, on Wednesday night published a set of recommendations for the army and the interim government in Bangladesh in the wake of the fall of Sheikh Hasina after week-long protests that engulfed the country in violence.

"The army should prevent reprisal killings, and the soon-to-be-formed interim government should investigate abuses and begin rebuilding democracy," the statement said.

The statement stresses upon the challenges of forming an interim government and the constitutional challenges it faces.

The ICG says the key will be to ensure that the protest movement is capably represented. If calm is to be restored, the statement read, those who risked and sacrificed the most to compel Hasina to resign – namely, the students who initiated the protest movement – should have a meaningful voice in the government's counsels, rather than finding themselves

sidelined by conservative generals and opportunistic politicians.

The ICG recommended that the army and the interim government need to ensure "security and stability, including staving off reprisal attacks on Awami League members."

Ensuring justice for the violence of recent weeks and compensating victims are going to be equally important to this process, according to the ICG. Stability is also going to be important to avoid the short-term economic crisis, the ICG said.

In the statement, ICG said, "The bigger challenge for the interim government will be to put Bangladesh back on the path of genuine democracy."

The think tank recommended carefully weighing the costs and benefits between sticking to the constitutional limit of 90 days from the day of the dissolution of the parliament to the organising of new elections, or pushing back the elections to allow for the formation of new political parties – possibly one led by students – as elections right now would probably end with BNP emerging victorious.

M d Asaduzzaman, a senior lawyer of the Supreme Court and a BNP leader, has been appointed as new attorney general of Bangladesh.

President Mohammed Shahabuddin appointed him as the 15th top law officer of the state since the post fell vacant after previous attorney general AM Amin Uddin resigned on August 7 citing personal difficulties.

Law Secretary Md Golam Sarwar issued a gazette notification to this effect yesterday.

The attorney general has been appointed even before the formation of the interim government, which was sworn in last night.
