Four HC judges promoted to Appellate Division

Four High Court judges were elevated to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court yesterday.

With their appointments, the number of judges at the Appellate Division has gone up to six.

President Mohammed Shahabuddin appointed the judges as per the constitution, according to a gazette

notification by the law ministry. The four new Appellate Division judges are Justice Zubayer Rahman Chowdhury, Justice Syed Md Ziaul Karim, Justice Md Rezaul Haque and Justice SM Emdadul Hoque, Law Secretary Md Golam Sarwar told The Daily Star last night.

Chief Justice Syed Refaat Ahmed will administer the oath of office to them at the Supreme Court Judges' Lounge at 10:30am today. The four judges were appointed as judges of the High

Court Division of the Supreme Court during the tenure of the BNP-led four party alliance government. Justice Zubayer Rahman Chowdhury was appointed as

an additional judge of the HC on August 27, 2003, for two years and his service was confirmed on August 27, 2005. Justice Sved Md Ziaul Karim, Justice Md Rezaul Haque

and Justice SM Emdadul Hoque were appointed as additional HC judges on August 23, 2004, for two years. Their services were regularised on August 23, 2006, according to information from the SC website.

On August 10 this year, six judges of the Appellate Division, including then chief justice Obaidul Hassan, resigned amid protests by students.

The other five judges are Justice M Enayetur Rahim, Justice Md Abu Zafor Siddique, Justice Jahangir Hossain Selim, Justice Md Shahnur Islam and Justice Kashefa Hussain.

Scrap cases under CSA, DSA against journalists **Demands Editors'** Council

The Editors' Council yesterday demanded that the government withdraw and scrap all the cases, including those filed against journalists under the Cyber Security Act (CSA) and the previous Digital Security Act, as well as harassment cases related to the recent movement.

In a statement, signed by the council's President Mahfuz Anam and General Secretary Dewan Hanif Mahmud, it also called for the repeal of all restrictive laws, including the CSA.

The statement noted that newspaper television channel offices were attacked and property was destroyed during the recent mass movement.

CYBER SECURITY ACT Controversial provisions to be reviewed Says ICT adviser

Clauses of the Cyber Security Act (CSA) that pose threats to freedom of expression will be re-examined, said Posts, Telecommunications, and Information Technology Nahid Islam Adviser yesterday.

He made this statement to reporters following a meeting with ICT Division officials in Agargaon, Dhaka.

"In our primary discussion, we have agreed that the clauses of the Cyber Security Act that are controversial will have to be reconsidered."

"We will sit with the law ministry in this regard. Even if the law remains, we will ensure that it does not hinder freedom of expression."

Interim govt to protect fundamental rights, freedom

Adviser Touhid Hossain tells foreign diplomats

The interim government is committed to promoting and protecting the fundamental rights and freedoms, said Foreign Affairs Adviser Touhid Hossain.

"As part of our renewed nationbuilding efforts, Bangladesh would need the unstinting support and cooperation of the international community," he told more than 60 foreign diplomats

based in Dhaka during his first diplomatic briefing at the State Guesthouse Padma vesterday. The adviser appreciated the positive and constructive

remarks of the international partners after the formation of the interim government, led by Prof Muhammad Yunus, on August 8. "We affirmed that the government will uphold and promote

all its international legal obligations, including international humanitarian law and international human rights law," Touhid told journalists after the diplomatic briefing. Responding to a question, he said former prime

minister Sheikh Hasina's stay in India will not impact the Dhaka-Delhi relationship.

"Bilateral relationship is established based on the mutual interests. If interests are compromised, the relationship does not sustain.

BB loses Tk 55cr in forex deals with Islami Bank

Bangladesh Bank has incurred a loss of Tk 55 crore from its foreign exchange deal Islami Bank centring the introduction of the crawling peg exchange rate system.

As per its commitment to the International Monetary Fund, the central bank on May 8 announced the crawling peg system (a band of rates within which the exchange rate of a currency is allowed to fluctuate).

On May 9, the management reserve and investment unit of the central bank made two dollar buy and sell deals, amounting to \$82 million, with the Shariahbased bank, where S Alam Group holds controlling stakes.
