

Veggie, fish prices go down in Bagerhat

Students join market monitoring

Students in Bagerhat have teamed up with the Directorate of National Consumer Rights Protection to monitor local markets.

Starting at 11:00am, students were seen inspecting purchase and sales receipts at various wholesale and retail shops, ensuring product quality and fair pricing. They also urged shopkeepers to prominently display price lists.

While prices of vegetables and fish have decreased due to increased supply, the cost of meat, onions, garlic, chilies, and spices remained unchanged.

Vegetable prices have reduced ranging from Tk 5 to Tk 60 per kilogram compared to the previous week. Fish prices also fell, although some consumers still found them high.

Current prices include: potatoes at Tk 50-55 per kg, eggplants, bitter gourds, okra, and teasel gourds at Tk



60 per kg, papayas at Tk 40-50 per kg, ridged gourds at Tk 50 per kg, and bottle gourds at Tk 50 per kg.

Among fish, hilsas weighing one kg sold at Tk 1,100-1,300 per kg, smaller hilsas at Tk 500-600 per kg, and pangas catfish and tilapia at Tk 180-200 per kg.

Meat prices held steady, with beef at Tk 750 per kg, mutton at Tk 1,000 per kg, and broiler chicken at Tk 170-180 per kg.

Onions were selling at Tk 110 per kg, garlic at Tk 200 per kg, green

chilies at Tk 400 per kg, and chili powder at Tk 500 per kg.

Coarse rice saw a slight increase, selling at Tk 46-48 per kg, while fine rice ranged from Tk 58-90 per kg.

Rafique Sheikh, a rickshaw puller, expressed concern about the high prices.

"Regular market monitoring is needed to keep prices within our reach," he said.

Abdullah Al Imran, assistant director of the Directorate of National Consumer Rights Protection in Bagerhat, said, "The monitoring will continue, and anyone found engaging in price manipulation will face action."

said on August 13, Khairul resigned from the position of chairman of the Law Commission.

After retiring from the position of chief justice, he was appointed the Law Commission chairman for three years on July 23 last year. His tenure was subsequently extended three times as the chairman of the commission.

Khairul was elevated to the Appellate Division in July 2009.

A week before his retirement, he gave the verdict declaring the nonpartisan election-time government "illegal", ignoring strong pleas by eminent jurists such as Dr Kamal Hossain, Barrister Rafique ul Huq, Barrister M Amir-ul Islam, former attorney general Mahmudul Islam, all of whom strongly argued for retaining the interim government system for the sake of democracy.

His verdict gave Hasina the biggest political weapon to cling to power. The end of the caretaker system meant an end to the mechanism of checks and balances which ensured free and fair elections in 1991, 1996, 2001 and 2008, said the complainant.

Court. The removal process is ongoing, he added.

Till yesterday noon, there are iron cages in most courtrooms under the Metropolitan Sessions Judge's Court of Dhaka, while the iron cages are set-up in nine special judge's courts, four speedy trial tribunals, nine women and children repression prevention tribunals, Anti Human Trafficking Prevention Tribunal and Anti-Terrorism Special

Tribunal, said court staffers.

Legal experts have criticised the use of iron cages, arguing that it violates Article 35(5) of the Constitution, which prohibits torture or cruel, inhuman, or degrading punishment or treatment.

Supreme Court lawyer Zahirul Islam Khan Panna, chairperson of Ain O Salish Kendra, said, "There cannot be an iron cage in the courtrooms of a civilised state. Iron cages should be

removed from all courts immediately."

The debate over the use of iron cages first came to fore on June 12 when Nobel laureate Prof Muhammad Yunus condemned the practice after attending a hearing in a graft case.

"It is very humiliating that an innocent person has to stand in an iron cage during a hearing. It's very condemnable... it shouldn't be applied to anybody," Yunus said back then.

Apa' project formed a human chain, further exacerbating traffic woes.

Other demonstrations included HSC candidates and various organisations staging protests at Doyel Chatter, Uttara, Shahabbagh, Mirpur Road, Science Lab, and Press Club, voicing issues ranging from job regularisation to institutional reforms.

Hundreds gathered near Shikkha Bhaban and the Press Club to demand job permanency, salary reforms, and the nationalisation of services. Dismissed BDR members also protested in front of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, while village police gathered at the press club to oppose salary inequality.

Students of the Medical Assistant Training School

(MATS) formed a human chain against corruption and discrimination, and the Bangladesh Family Planning Voluntary Demand Implementation Council called for job regularisation.

Further adding to the disruptions, the Bangladesh Independent Ebtedayee Madrasa Teachers Association protested against perceived discrimination by the Madrasa Board, while the Trinamool Nagrik Andolan held a rally demanding accountability from Sheikh Hasina and her government officials.

At Banglamotor, a group demonstrated in front of the Bangladesh Inland Water Transport Authority, while in Karwan Bazar, another group protested in front of the Directorate of Family Planning.

the World's Indigenous Peoples 2024.

Hossain also protested against the security forces for obstructing efforts to paint graffiti on the abduction of Kalpana Chakma in different locations of Chattogram Hill Tracts region.

Speaking on reforms, she said, "We need reform in the judiciary, but we must ensure that we do not destroy everything in the name of reform."

The primary task of the interim government is to ensure the safety of those who are still insecure, she opined.

Addressing the event, Ittekkharuzzaman, executive director of Transparency International, Bangladesh, said the country needs to develop a framework based on the mass aspirations of a "new Bangladesh, new state structure, and new political understanding" that emerged following the recent mass uprising.

"We do not want any discrimination against indigenous people after the mass uprising. We do not want another authoritarian government," he said, calling for action over the attacks and violence on indigenous and minority communities recently and in previous years.

He also called for separate UN investigations into each rights violation against indigenous people in previous years and sought constitutional

It was a gesture of respect, of mourning, and of the unspoken words that lingered in the minds of everyone present.

In the exam hall, the usual tension of an exam was replaced by a heavy silence. Occasionally, the cries of Ahnaf's friends broke through the silence as they broke into tears.

The invigilator's voice seemed softer, and the students' focus was often broken by the sight of that solitary bouquet.

As they filled out their answer sheets, Ahnaf's classmates knew that Ahnaf's murder would haunt them for a very long time.

"Ahnaf attended the last three exams, but today [yesterday] he wasn't here," said one student.

"It was hard to focus; three students cried in the room," another added.

Borhan Uddin, a teacher at BAF Shaheen College, who was invigilator of the exam hall, said, "We did not want Ahnaf's seat to remain empty. He sacrificed his life for the country. We decided to honour him with this gesture of placing flowers on his seat. Both teachers and students came together to lay floral tributes on his desk. Everyone was in tears during this time."

Vice Principal Shakila Nargis said, "His seat is empty, and it's painful for us all. We wanted to show that we haven't forgotten him."

The college plans to hold prayers on August 20 to honour Ahnaf's memory.

His father, Nasir Uddin Ahmed, said, "My boy is gone, but he has left many memories... There was no fear in him. I could not stop my son [from joining protests]."

Universities struggle Dhaka

Mohema Islam, a student at Comilla University, said, "We have already suffered a lot since academic activities have been at a standstill at our university for months. We don't want this to continue. We demand that the government take immediate action to fill the gaps."

DU Pro-VC (Academic) Prof Sitesh Chandra said, "Many teachers have returned to their departments, but there was a noticeable absence of students. So, we were unable to hold any classes or examinations today (yesterday)."

The absence of a VC and other administrative officials is causing significant challenges. These positions need to be filled urgently, he added.

Prof Tarikul Islam, acting registrar at Rajshahi University, said, "The government's order to reopen educational institutions was issued to vice chancellors. But we currently have no VC or even a pro-VC. So we couldn't decide on resuming academic activities. We can

only proceed once these positions are filled."

Education Ministry Adviser Wahiduddin Mahmud acknowledged the crisis in public universities.

"We must address this situation swiftly. However, this is also an opportunity to appoint genuinely passionate and qualified individuals to lead these institutions," he said.

They must have both academic and administrative expertise, which has unfortunately been undervalued for a long time, he added.

Regarding the appointment of new VCs, he said, "It is extremely challenging to suddenly appoint new leadership in over 40 universities. Nevertheless, we will make every effort to quickly fill these positions, especially at major universities."

Following the government's directive, secondary schools, colleges, and madrasas across the country also reopened yesterday after a nearly month-long closure, while primary schools had resumed on August 14.

Wahiduddin said the whole job will be done in phases.

He made the remarks at a time when many educationists criticised the new curriculum for a sketchy evaluation system.

Besides, due to a lack of sufficient training, many teachers were still confused about how to give classroom instructions, distribute group work for students, and evaluate the students' performances based on the new curriculum.

The last Awami League government chalked out the new curriculum, saying it would reduce emphasis

on memorisation and prioritise experimentation and activity-based learning.

Phase-wise implementation of the curriculum started on January 1, 2023. Currently, the curriculum is followed in classes one, two, three, six, seven, eight, and nine, while classes four, five, and 10 are supposed to follow it from January 2025.

Under the new curriculum, there will be no public exam before class 10 and no exams for students up to class 3. Science, humanities, and business studies will be introduced in class II instead of class 9.

water as a sarcastic gift of "sherbet" to Taqsem still remains fresh in the memory of Dhaka dwellers.

Wasa recently terminated Taqsem after he remained as its managing director for over 15 years even as news over allegations of widespread irregularities, corruption and looting against him got regularly published in newspapers.

He was replaced by AKM Shahid Uddin.

Notably, complaints were filed with the Anti-Corruption Commission regarding Taqsem's amassing of huge wealth illegally and embezzlement of Tk 132 crore from the funds of Wasa Employees' Multipurpose Cooperative Society Limited.

Even after so many allegations against him, no case has been filed against him and he has not been arrested, said Mizanur.

"Under Taqsem as managing director, Dhaka Wasa was run in a tyrannical manner, turning it into his playground for committing irregularities, misuse of power, and widespread corruption, among other charges," he also said.

Addressing the human chain, Mizanur also demanded replacing the newly appointed Wasa managing director AKM Shahid Uddin.

"AKM Shahid Uddin has long been an accomplice of Taqsem's corruption," Mizanur alleged, citing news reports.

location and release of missing Jumma activists, including Mayadhan Chakma, and the release of those detained on politically motivated charges.

Additionally, the commission demanded justice for Kalpana Chakma, pressing for action on the unresolved 1996 abduction case of the indigenous activist. The CHTC further

advocated for the retention of the CHT Regulation 1900, which is currently under legal scrutiny.

It also called for unrestricted access for national and international organisations to the region to ensure accountability and transparency.

The statement was signed by Sultana Kamal, Elsa Stamatopoulou, and Myrna Cunningham Kain, co-chairs of the CHT Commission.
