ACC to probe two staffers of ex-PM over graft

Anti-Corruption Commission has launched investigation allegations of corruption, irregularities and amassing wealth illegally against two staffers of former prime minister Sheikh Hasina.

They are: her former deputy press secretary Ashraful Alam Khokon, former personal and (peon) assistant Jahangir Alam.

The ACC made the decision in a meeting held at its headquarters yesterday, its press relations office confirmed.

According sources, Khokon holds dual citizenship in Bangladesh and the United States, and allegedly owns a significant amount of assets, both in his name and under aliases.

Information about four private cars registered in his name has already surfaced.

High-ranking cops concerned as ACC probe looms

The high-ranking police officials loyal to the previous Awami League regime, are now passing days amid fear of losing their jobs, lawsuits, arrests and public wrath.

Their concerns follow the Anti-Corruption Commission's recent decision to launch investigation into allegations of corruption, irregularities, and amassing wealth illegally by abusing power, against at least 80 present and former police officials.

Confirming the ACC's move, ACC's secretary Khorsheda Yasmeen said, "Decision has been taken to investigate the corruption and illegal wealth of Habibur Rahman, former commissioner of Dhaka Metropolitan Police, and Harun Or Rashid, former chief of Detective

Branch. An investigation team has also been formed." Khorsheda said complaints against any other police official will come under the jurisdiction of the commission and will be investigated.

Sources alleged that these police officials amassed ample wealth through bribery, recruitment, posting, tender manipulation, interference in cases, and arrest

Some of these top police officials used ruthless force and opened fire to stop the protesters who joined the quota reform protest.

A dozen cases have already been filed including murder charges against top police officials including the former inspector general of police, former DMP commissioner, and dozens of other officials.

Some officers have yet to join their workplace after Hasina's fall, while others submitted medical certificates SEE PAGE 4 COL 4

MUNIA MURDER CASE Family demands reinvestigation

The family of college student Mosarat Jahan Munia, whose body was found in a Gulshan flat in 2021, vesterday demanded reinvestigation into the rape and murder case filed against Bashundhara Group Managing Director Sayem Sobhan Anvir and seven others.

Saying that previous investigation officers were bribed to cover up Anvir's crimes, Munia's sister Nusrat Jahan Tania appealed to the interim government to immediately arrest and interrogate

Tania, the complainant in the case, was speaking at a press conference at the Jatiya Press

Following Munia's death, two cases were filed against Anvir, his family members, and some others. The accused were later cleared in both

The other case was filed over abetting her death by suicide.

Tania alleged that several law enforcement officials, including the then IGP Benazir Ahmed and deputy commissioner of Gulshan Division, played a "shameless role" in saving Anvir.

She termed the previous investigation and the order of the court as blatant examples of the culture of lawlessness during the Awami $\bar{\text{L}}\text{eague}$ regime.

Tania hoped that by ensuring justice for Munia,

Employees from grades 10 to 20 resumed work after the Dhaka Mass Transit Company Ltd board agreed to their demand for a pay rise, according to two officials.

DHAKA SOUTH, NORTH New administrators vow to improve services

The newly appointed administrators of Dhaka North and South City Corporations yesterday pledged to ensure smooth and efficient service delivery.

Speaking to reporters on their first day in office, Md Mahmudul Hasan, administrator of Dhaka North City Corporation, emphasised the importance of meeting public expectations.

"The interim government was formed through a student uprising. We will prioritise fulfilling the students' expectations from this government," Hasan said.

DNCC will enhance its services, particularly in mosquito control, to combat dengue during the rainy season, he added. He also pledged to clear canals of illegal

encroachments and maintain routine services like birth and death registration. Dr Mohd Sher Ali, administrator of Dhaka South

City Corporation, echoed a similar commitment. "The services provided by DSCC will continue uninterrupted," Ali assured.

He highlighted improvements in the birth and death certificate services, now managed through a central server, and vowed to ensure the efficient delivery of trade licenses and other services.

Ali also warned that any deliberate obstruction by officials in providing these services would result in legal action.
