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‘Filing of case doesn’t mean random arrests’

Home ministry says cops under pressure from some quarters to record cases

The government has warned of legal action against those responsible for creating instability through forced resignations, vandalism, arson, illegal searches, looting, extortion, and tender manipulation, which it said were being carried out by a group of overenthusiastic and vested quarters.

The Ministry of Home Affairs issued the warning in a circular yesterday.

The circular also stated that in an attempt to create instability, some quarters are putting pressure on the police to record cases and are attacking the accused in court. In this context, the government wants to assure everyone that a case filed does not mean random arrests will be made.

“All these cases will be properly investigated, and appropriate action will be taken,” reads the circular.

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57 Bangladeshis convicted for protesting in UAE pardoned

Yunus writes to UAE president to thank him

The president of the United Arab Emirates yesterday pardoned all 57 Bangladeshis who were convicted by the UAE Federal Court for demonstrating in the Arab country during the uprising in Bangladesh.

Chief Adviser Prof Muhammad Yunus paid deepest gratitude to the UAE President Sheikh Mohammed bin Zayed Al Nahyan for pardoning the Bangladeshis who were sentenced to jail terms for expressing solidarity with the student-led mass upsurge.

“This act of clemency, following our telephone conversation [last week], not only exemplifies Your Highness’s compassionate leadership but serves as a conduit for strengthening the enduring bond of fraternity between our two nations,” Yunus said in a letter to the UAE president yesterday.

The decision to annul the sentences of the migrants has been a great relief for their families and countrymen, the letter said.

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LOOTING OF POLICE STATIONS 2,000 arms, 3 lakh bullets still missing

Joint drive to recover those underway

Despite repeated calls by the government to submit the looted firearms and bullets to nearby police stations, over 3 lakh bullets and 2,000 guns remain missing.

The government conducts a joint drive, comprising the members of armed forces, BGB, Coast Guard, police, Rab, and Ansar, across the country to recover the arms from today.

The drives begins from 12:00am as yesterday was the last day to hand over the guns, including those whose licences have been suspended, said Home Adviser Lt Gen (ret'd) Jahangir Alam Chowdhury after the first meeting of the advisory council on law and order at the Secretariat yesterday.

After the fall of Hasina-led government on August 5 amid an uprising, mobs looted firearms and bullets from different police stations and establishments across the country.

Since August 12, the Police Headquarters asked several times to hand over the guns and bullets and the deadline to do it ended yesterday.

According to the PHQ data, 5,829 firearms and 6,06,742 bullets were looted from police, different police stations, and establishments.

Of those, 3,763 guns and 2,86,082 bullets were recovered, meaning that 2,066 arms and 3,20,660 bullets remain missing.

The guns include rifles (Chinese), SMGs, pistols, shotguns, teargas launchers, and signal pistols.

The PHQ data shows 31,044 teargas shells, 1,455 teargas grenades, 4,692 sound grenades, 291 smoke grenades, 55 stun grenades, 893 multiple bang stun grenades, and 177 teargas spray were also looted.

5,829 arms looted; 3,763 recovered

6.06 lakh bullets looted; 2.87 lakh recovered

2,116 sound grenades, 22,139 teargas shells recovered

Of those, 22,139 teargas shells, 704 teargas grenades, 2,116 sound grenades, 213 color smoke grenades, 18 stun grenades, 533 multiple bang stun grenades, and 94 teargas sprays have been recovered so far.

“We will also recover the illegal firearms, along with the looted ones, during the joint drive,” Md Rezaul Karim, deputy inspector general of the PHQ, told The Daily Star.

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Bangladeshi girl killed in BSF firing

A 16-year-old girl was shot dead allegedly by the Indian Border Security Force in Kulaura upazila of Moulvibazar on Monday night.

Swarna Das, daughter of Parendra Das of Kalnigarh village, was a student of class eight at Nirod Bihari High School in the upazila.

Several Bangladeshis attempted to illegally enter Indian territory when BSF shot dead one of them and took the body, said Nayek Obaid, patrol commander at Lalarchak Border Outpost of the Border Guard Bangladesh.

Binay Bhushan Roy, officer-in-charge of Kulaura Police Station, said bringing Swarna’s body back would require an official procedure involving authorities from both sides of the border.

Swarna’s grieving father Parendra said his daughter and wife attempted to cross the border to visit his eldest son, who lives in Tripura.

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Israeli PM signals no appetite for Gaza truce

Remains defiant amid mounting criticism; 18 more killed in Gaza

Concerns grew yesterday over the chances of securing a Gaza truce, a day after Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu rejected making any “concessions” in stalled talks towards a hostage release deal.

Netanyahu told a televised press conference at the end of a day of nationwide protests that he would “not give in to pressure” to renege on demands in indirect negotiations with Hamas to end the war, now nearing its 12th month.

Analyst Mairav Zonszein of the International Crisis Group said Netanyahu’s remarks showed “he won’t stop the war... until Hamas surrenders, and he basically announced there won’t be a hostage deal”.

Gripped by grief and fury after six dead hostages were recovered from Gaza, Israelis took to the streets on Sunday and Monday to ramp up pressure on their government to secure the release of the remaining captives.

The military said the six were all captured alive during Hamas’s October 7 attack on southern Israel that triggered the war, and shot dead by the captors shortly before troops had found them.

“These murderers executed six of our hostage,” said Netanyahu, who has increasingly faced accusations from critics in Israel as well as Hamas officials and analysts of prolonging the war for political gain.

‘Forcing teachers to resign totally unacceptable’

Edn adviser calls for immediate end to harassment of teachers

Khaleda Zia cleared in 5 defamation cases
