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Yunus visits injured at neurosciences hospital

Chief Adviser Muhammad vesterday visited victims, injured who were shot during the July-August student-led movements, at National Institute of Neurosciences and Hospital in Dhaka's Agargaon.

He inquired about the conditions of the victims who were injured critically the security forces during the movement.

The hospital's Director Kazi Deen Mohammad said, "He (Prof Yunus) saw four students who were being treated in the Intensive Care Unit of the hospital."

"All of them were hit by bullets in their heads. Their health conditions are improving," he said.

At least eleven people, including eight students from universities colleges, are being treated at the hospital.

Don't reform constitution, rewrite it Speakers tell discussion

There is a need for a new constitution as merely amending the current one would not fulfil the aspirations of students or prevent the rise of future tyrants, said speakers at a roundtable yesterday.

Bangladesh Policy Discourse organised the event, held at Cirdap Auditorium in the capital, where participants called for significant state reforms and a constitution that ensures civil equality and balance of power.

"A one-party system was established in parliament. If the state fails to create strong institutions, the country will face destruction," warned Prof Robaet Ferdous of Dhaka University's mass communication and journalism department.

He accused the previous government of dismantling all constitutional institutions over the past 15 years. "We must move forward with the collective intellectual knowledge of the world, ensuring that the original spirit of any revolution is not compromised."

Commuters suffer as job seekers block Shahbagh

Commuters in Dhaka's Shahbagh area faced severe traffic disruption yesterday as hundreds of job seekers blocked the intersection for around eight hours, demanding an increase in the age limit for government job applications from 30 to 35.

Vehicular movement around Shahbagh came to a standstill from noon, according to eyewitnesses.

"I was stuck for several hours near Science Lab due to the blockade. Eventually, I had to leave my car and walk to my destination," said Ashraful Alam, a businessman.

By the time this report was filed at 8:30pm, the protest had been ongoing for over seven hours, with demonstrators still gathered on the road.

Abdul Hannan expressed his frustration, saying, "I often face huge traffic congestion in this area due to frequent protests. It seems like every few days, a new group blocks Shahbagh intersection with their demands. Whether their demands are valid or not doesn't matter -- the issue is why should the roads be blocked? Dhaka is already known for its traffic. If roads are blocked constantly, where will we go? This is no longer acceptable. The government must address this."

Another commuter, Rafiqul Islam, added, "Now is the time for change. The authorities should think seriously about these issues."

Ten arrested over attempted robbery in Gulshan

At least 10 people were detained after attempting to rob a building in Gulshan-2 early yesterday.

Witnesses and police said around 50 people arrived on Road-103 on motorcycles and in cars before entering a building around 1:00am.

The building, "Finance Square", houses several financial institutions.

The robbers tied up the security guards on duty and attempted to carry out the robbery.

Upon hearing the hue and cry and receiving information, locals, along with police and army members, rushed to the scene, capturing 10 robbers while the rest managed to flee.

"They entered the building, tied our hands, and taped our mouths to stop us from calling for help. They took our wallets and mobile phones," a security guard told reporters.

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Swarna's death in BSF firing protested

Students and locals of Moulvibazar's Kulaura upazila demonstrated on Friday night, protesting the death of 16-year-old Swarna Das, who was shot by the Indian Border Security Force (BSF) at Lalarchak border in the upazila.

Swarna was reportedly killed in BSF firing on the night of September 1.

In light of the incident, a torch march and a protest rally were brought out in the upazila around 8:00pm on Friday, while civil society members visited the victim's house yesterday afternoon.

Local leaders and activists, including Faridul Haque, political coordinator of "Rashtra Sanskar Andolon," and the platform's executive committee member Pritam Das, met with Swarna's family. Later, the platform organised a press briefing, which was attended by platform's Dhaka metropolitan leaders.

Don't want to see killings like Felani again: home adviser

Home Adviser Lt Gen (retd) Jahangir Alam Chowdhury yesterday instructed the Border Guard Bangladesh to carry out its responsibilities with professionalism, emphasising the importance of border security and anti-smuggling efforts.

Addressing senior BGB officials at the force's headquarters in Pilkhana, Dhaka, the adviser expressed his strong stance against border killings, referencing the death of Felani Khatun in 2011.

"I do not want to see killings like Felani again. Do not show your back at the border," he said. Felani Khatun, a teenage girl, was shot dead while

attempting to cross the India-Bangladesh border. Her body was left hanging from a barbed-wire fence for four and a half hours on January 7, 2011.

Despite massive outcry over the incident, her murder case remains pending in the Supreme Court of India. He also issued a stern warning against corruption, declaring that any involvement in bribery or corrupt practices would result in strict punitive action.

"Corruption will not be tolerated under any circumstances. If necessary, they will be dismissed," he

The adviser further said the BGB must always act in accordance with the law.

BGB Director General Maj Gen Ashrafuzzaman Siddique and senior officials attended the meeting, while all region commanders, sector commanders, battalion commanders, and other BGB personnel joined via video teleconference.
