Help build a new Bangladesh

Yunus urges foreign friends at UN to support country's new journey

Chief Adviser Prof Muhammad Yunus has sought support from foreign friends for Bangladesh's new journey towards a happy and prosperous future.

"Our job is to clean it up and reform it. We need to make a good start. We need the support from all of you to make that happen," he said while addressing a reception on the sidelines of the UN General Assembly (UNGA) at the UN headquarters on Tuesday evening (New York time), reports UNB.

He said the interim government does not want to miss the opportunity to build a new Bangladesh.

Around 200 representatives of countries and territories attending the UNGA was at the event hosted by Bangladesh marking the 50th anniversary of the country's UN membership.

Prof Yunus and renowned photographer Shahidul Alam jointly

unveiled two books that depict events of the student-led mass uprising, which led to the fall of Awami League regime after 15 years in power.

Recalling the sacrifices made by the students and people during the uprising, Prof Yunus said the people are united today. "We don't want to disappoint them."

He said the students invited him to lead the interim government until the elections are held following reforms. "It is a very significant year for us..."

At an event of the Clinton Global Initiative 2024, Prof Yunus shared the stage with former US president Bill Clinton where he introduced two young people, including his special assistant Mahfuj Alam, and lauded their role during the uprising.

With Clinton standing beside him, Prof Yunus said, "It is amazing...the way they speak, the language I have never heard. They speak about the world, they speak about the country, they want to

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IMF to provide more loans on a fast track

Yunus tells its MD polls date after consensus over reforms

The International Monetary Fund (IMF) has assured the interim government of providing more loans on a "fast-track" basis as Bangladesh expects \$3 billion from the global lender.

IMF Managing Director Kristalina Georgieva on Tuesday met with Chief Adviser Professor Muhammad Yunus in New York on the sidelines of the United Nations General Assembly.

She said the IMF "would fast-track financial support for the government", according to a media release from the Chief Adviser's Office.

She said she had sent a team to Bangladesh "quickly" and it was now in Dhaka at the moment. The team will place its report with the IMF management board next month, according to the release.

Georgieva also said the IMF board could initiate a new lending programme for Bangladesh, based on the report of the team or it could also extend the existing loan programme launched early last year, the release added.

A four-member IMF team led by its Mission Chief Chris Papageorgiou reached Dhaka on Tuesday for preliminary discussions on the loan proposal and will stay until September 30.

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ARMY CHIEF'S REMARK ON DEMOCRATIC TRANSITION

Political parties give cautious, mixed reaction

Emphasising the importance of patience, politicians have expressed mixed reactions to the remark by Army Chief General Waker-uz-Zaman that the transition to democracy should occur between one and one and a half years.

They, however, viewed the army chief's pledge to support the interim government in any situation as a positive sign.

Waker made the comments in an interview with Reuters, published on Tuesday.

BNP Standing Committee member Khandaker Mosharraf Hossain said the army chief talked about democratic transition within 18 months, but this could be done in a shorter time.

He said that his party has given time to the interim government to implement reforms, including restoring people's voting right.

"We believe that if the interim government is sincere, they can do it promptly. So, we don't want to set any specific time frame for the government."

About the chief of army staff's commitment to stand by the interim government, Mosharraf said the army stood by the mass uprising that led to the fall of Sheikh Hasina's government.

HSC results by mid-Oct

Grades for cancelled exams to be based on SSC performance

The results of this year's Higher Secondary Certificate (HSC) and equivalent exams will be finalised through subject mapping, where marks for six cancelled exams will be calculated based on students' results from the Secondary School Certificate (SSC) and equivalent exams.

For subjects where exams were conducted, the answer sheets will be evaluated based on the full marks for those subjects, said Prof Tapan Kumar Sarker, president of the Inter-Education Board Coordination Committee yesterday.

The HSC results are expected to be published by mid-October, he added.

This year's HSC exams, which began on June 30, were disrupted due to deadly violence during the quota reform protests.

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
