Mominul calculative amid testing conditions

Bangladesh batter Mominul Haque stepped into a challenging situation after opener Zakir Hasan perished following a 24-ball duck, with Jasprit Bumrah leading the Indian attack and keeping a

tight grip on the Bangladesh innings on the opening day of the second and final Test in Kanpur yesterday. As Mominul faced 14 deliveries without scoring, there was anxiety perhaps creeping in.

Mominul had been induced into a sweep by Ravichandran Ashwin, who was brought into the attack straight after Mominul came in, suggesting there was an attempt at making the batter stew; for Ashwin had produced an almost unplayable delivery to get the left-hander's scalp in the first innings in Chennai.

Having gotten off the mark on his 15th delivery faced, Mominul slowly started to settle in. He was mostly calculative about his knock; he was going to take his chances here. In a stop-start game due to light and

heavy rain, along with bad light, Mominul calculated his could again say that it would be a crime to waste an scoring options.

City's Rodri out for season

Manchester City midfielder Rodri will miss the rest of the season after rupturing his anterior cruciate ligament, manager Pep Guardiola confirmed on Friday in a big blow to his team's quest for a fifth consecutive Premier League title.

Rodri underwent surgery for the injury earlier on Friday, Guardiola said. "Surgery this morning, ACL and some meniscus (cartilage), next season he will be

here. This season is over," Guardiola told reporters. "Unfortunately we got the worst but these things happen. We will be there to support him in his recovery step-by-step."

The Spaniard injured his right knee during the team's 2-2 draw with Arsenal in the Premier League on Sunday. Guardiola's team top the table on 13 points ahead of Saturday's clash at Newcastle United.

The injury is a cruel twist, coming days after the 28-year-old Rodri warned of strike action by players over their increasing workload. Rodri is considered a favourite to win the Ballon d'Or after leading City to an unprecedented fourth straight Premier League before being named Euro 2024 player of the tournament as Spain clinched title.

"What he gives us, we don't have a similar player. But the others can all together replace him,' Guardiola added.

Bangladesh face strong Pakistan in SAFF U-17 semifinal

Bangladesh will take on a strong Pakistan team in the second semifinal of the SAFF U-17 Championship at the Changlimithang Stadium in Thimphu, Bhutan today.

Bangladesh are yet to win a match in the tournament, having lost 1-0 to India and drawn 1-1 against Maldives in the group phase. They booked a semifinal spot as Group A runners-up by virtue of goal difference with Maldives, who lost 3-0 against group champions India in their last group stage

BCB in 'final phase' over talks for Afghanistan ODIs

The Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) is in talks with its Afghan counterparts to arrange a threematch ODI series as part of the national team's preparation for next year's ICC Champions Trophy in Pakistan.

The Tigers are scheduled to travel to the Caribbean islands in November to play two Tests, three ODIs, and three T20Is against the West Indies. At the moment, this is the only ODI series scheduled for the Tigers before the Champions Trophy, slated to begin next February.

To make up for the lack of 50-over fixtures before the marquee event, BCB board president Faruque Ahmed said on Thursday that the board hopes to arrange three more ODIs against Afghanistan in the UAE before the series against the Windies.

Bangladesh were scheduled to play an allformat series against Afghanistan in Greater Noida, India in July this year but that series got rescheduled. The proposed ODI series between the sides, however, is not part of that tour and will be a separate series, BCB's cricket operations in-charge Shahriar Nafees confirmed The Daily Star on Friday.w

"We are in the final phase of discussion regarding the ODI series with the Afghanistan Cricket Board. This is not an FTP-scheduled series. We will play the FTP scheduled matches in two phases, next year and in 2026," Nafees said.

"We have only three ODIs against West Indies before going into the Champions Trophy. So we are planning to hold the matches to give our players enough 50-over matches before the ICC event," Nafees added.

Nafees also informed that the board will receive confirmation this week regarding the two-Test series against South Africa next month.

Records tumble for Sri Lanka's

Lankan middle-order batsman Kamindu Mendis stormed into the record books in Galle on Friday when he became just the fourth cricketer to make 1,000 runs inside 13 Test innings.

The 25-year-old has played just eight Test matches since his debut two years ago at the same venue against Australia but has quickly made a name for himself as a star

on Thursday when he made his eighth consecutive fifty in as many appearances.

Friday's knock made it five Test centuries from 13 innings -- a record that also tied him with Bradman as well as George Headley of the West Indies.

Only three batters have reached the mark faster, with Weekes managing it in 10 and Sutcliffe making it in 12 alongside Australia's Neil Harvey.

By the time Sri Lanka declared on 602

Mendis joined Australia's Don Bradman in becoming the second-fastest player to 1000 Test runs, achieving the feat in 13 innings. Uniy two players - Herbert Sutcliffe and Everton Weekes - reached the milestone faster as they took 12 innings.

Mendis, however, is the fastest to have done so in 75 years. He also became the quickest to the feat Vinod Kambli, who did it in 14 innings.

Six of those matches have been played since March when he scored his first Test ton against Bangladesh. His unbeaten 182 against New Zealand on Friday made him equal third-fastest to the 1,000-run mark with Australia's Donald Bradman.

Only two others have surpassed him, with England's Herbert Sutcliffe and Everton Weekes of the West Indies both reaching the landmark in 12 innings.

It was another feather in the young lefthander's cap since the second Test began Bangladesh and England.

5, he had notched up a 200-run partnership in Galle -- where Kamindu was born and raised alongside fellow centurion Kusal Mendis (106 not out).

Kamindu was the only cricketer to make a century on either side in the first Test against New Zealand, which Sri Lanka won by 63 runs.

He has been in excellent form this year and was also Sri Lanka's highest runscorer in their last two series against

'Those who spoke ill, now feel proud of me'

Over the last two years, young leg spinner Rabeya Khan has emerged as a permanent member in Bangladesh women's team squads in white-ball cricket. Consistent performances with the ball and the ability to score runs down the order has earned the 19-year-old the stamp of approval from her skipper Nigar Sultana Joty and head coach Hashan Tillakaratne. Before the team's departure for the T20 World Cup in the UAE, Rabeya spoke with **The Daily Star's Samsul Arefin Khan** where she opened up about her bittersweet journey in cricket and what she hopes to achieve in the upcoming tournament. Here are the excerpts:

The Daily Star (DS): You captained the 'A' team, which comprised mostly of national team players, against Sri Lanka 'A' in a series recently. How was the experience and do you think this was sufficient preparation before going to play a World Cup?

Rabeya Khan (RK): I think the preparation was really good. The opponents were unknown to us. So, it was a good place for the World Cup preparation. About captaincy, I really enjoyed it. The seniors really helped me and because of that I didn't face any difficulties.

DS: How did you get started in cricket?

RK: I'm a student of BKSP. But before my admission there, I had to go through a lot of hardships when I was pursuing cricket from my home in Barishal. People of my area used to make derogatory comments about me. My father had to endure it the most. He was the one who took me to different places to play cricket. I also played with my cousins or boys from my locality. Many asked him why I was playing with boys. But my father never said anything in reply. He always pushed me to play

cricket. My father [Md. Emdadul Hoque Khan] is a sports lover. One day in 2016, he told me about a BKSP trial and took me there. I got selected from the trial and got admitted to the BKSP in 2017. That's when my cricket

career actually started. **DS:** Cricket is a very expensive game. It must have been tough for your father to provide you all the kits and gears.

RK: I will give the full credit of my cricket career to my father. He is a farmer and worked incredibly hard to help me reach this far. I have three maternal uncles and an aunt, who have helped me and my father whenever we were in need of financial support. My father takes tremendous pride in my success. Not only him, those who used to speak ill, now feel proud of me.

DS: Head coach Hashan Tillakaratne rates Bangladesh's spin attack as the best in the world. Most of Bangladesh's group matches will be played in Sharjah, which is known as a spin-friendly track. Will that work in favour of the team?

RK: We closely followed the recent South Africa versus Afghanistan matches in Sharjah to learn about the wicket. Our spin attack has always been good and it's doing well right now. So, I expect we will perform well there.

DS: Skipper Nigar Sultana Joty thinks you have the ability to contribute more with the bat. What are your thoughts on that?

RK: As a batting unit, we have a tendency of getting bowled out cheaply at times. Like the coach and the captain, I also hope that I will be able to contribute with the bat alongside my bowling. I'm doing everything I can and hopefully my efforts will get reflected in the World Cup.

Leverkusen ready for 'full throttle' Bayern

are expecting Bayern Munich to go all out when the sides meet in the Bundesliga on Saturday and they will need to produce a perfect performance to take anything from the match, manager Xabi Alonso said.
