'INVISIBLE STORIES'

Puppetry, ghosts, and traditions under one roof

Invisible Stories', a captivating body puppet theatre performance, has recently debuted at La Galerie, **Alliance** Française de Dhaka. The show enchanted

audiences with its surreal portrayal of the mystical world intertwined with daily life in Dhaka. MAISHA ISLAM MONAMEE

Directed by French puppeteer Laurie Cannac, the show featured Bangladeshi artistes Diana Meriline and Md Farhad Ahmed.

This multidisciplinary performance blends storytelling, puppetry, dance, and song, offering a magical exploration of Bangladesh's rich folklore and history.

The story follows two scientists in Dhaka investigating the presence of ghosts in everyday life. Their research soon transforms into a fantastical journey to the Sundarbans, where they encounter the wilderness, spiritual wisdom, and the supernatural



embedded in the region. Combining humour and horror, the production draws from various Bengali oral traditions, including ghost stories and supernatural elements.

Through the artistes' use of puppetry and physical movement, the invisible becomes visible, offering a glimpse into the unseen forces shaping the world around us. From "tree ghosts" blamed for Dhaka's infamous traffic to the "ectoplasm" holding up the city's walls, the show plays with the supernatural in ways that are both whimsical and profound.

Laurie Cannac has long been inspired by traditional tales, and she saw Bangladesh's folklore as a natural fit for her unique

approach to puppetry. "I always work with traditional old tales, so when I was invited to create a show in Bangladesh, I looked into stories popular here," she explained. "Ghost stories are vivid and emotional—they're scary but also funny. And as a puppeteer, ghosts are very inspiring." Laurie's creative process with the actors involved extensive improvisation, especially around body movement and puppetry. The choice to use body puppetry—where human actors manipulate life-sized puppetswas a natural one.

"The world of traditional tales is perfect for body puppets, especially the Bangladeshi ghost world. Body puppets are human-

sized, just like ghosts, and their movements mirror human ones," she noted. Laurie also highlighted the similarities between puppets and ghosts, describing both as figures hovering between life and death.

Although grounded in tradition, *Invisible* Stories addresses contemporary issues, creatively linking ancient ghost tales to modern challenges, such as Dhaka's notorious traffic. "It seemed clear to me that old ghost tales still have relevance in everyday life," Laurie remarked. "For instance, I used the idea that Dhaka's traffic jams might be caused by tree ghosts who migrated to the city due to rural exodus." The show also explores the more spiritual, nature-connected worldview. already underway for a European tour.

embody these opposing perspectives. As the story unfolds, the more scientifically-minded character is humbled by her experiences in the Sundarbans, ultimately developing a newfound respect for nature and the supernatural.

Laurie shared that this aspect of the story was inspired by her interactions with the people of the Sundarbans. "The strength of their traditional way of life and thinking fascinated me. The Sundarbans are victims of climate change but also part of the solution. I deeply respect the people there," she said.

Both Diana Meriline and Md Farhad Ahmed bring exceptional talent and experience to the production. Diana, a student at Prachyanat School of Acting and Design, has been involved in theatre since 2018, while Farhad has worked with Prachyanat Theatre since 2012 and Jolputul Puppets since 2014.

The technical aspects of the performance, including the use of objects and movement, further enhance the portrayal of the invisible, allowing the audience to engage with unseen forces. This inventive approach enables the performers to explore Bangladesh's rich folklore, encompassing ghost stories from various religious communities.

Beyond its supernatural elements, *Invisible* **Stories** is steeped in Bangladesh's history. The play references historical ghosts, such as ghost trains, inspired by the tragic convoys during the 1947 partition. These elements highlight the lingering effects of historical events on the present, adding depth to the narrative. The exploration of personal ghosts, connected to the Jungian concept of the collective unconscious, deepens the relationships between the characters. "Puppets are metaphoric-they are living images that spark our imagination. They bring cultural narratives to life and can question society with humour and poetry," Laurie observed.

Invisible Stories is set to leave a lasting impact, with upcoming performances scheduled in Chattogram, the Sundarbans, and Dhaka's Brihatta Art Foundation as part of the River Heritage Project. The production has also been selected for the World Festival of contrast between scientific rationalism and a Puppet Theatre in France, and discussions are

Tk 353cr anomalies found at Sonali Life Insurance

Life has 204 branches with 26,693

Since the inception of Sonali Life in 2013, a total of Tk 169.09 crore has been withdrawn in cash from six of its accounts with five banks until December 2023.

Withdrawing excessive amounts of cash from a public limited company's bank account is risky, indicating embezzlement, according to the BFIU

On September 30, BFIU directed banks to freeze the accounts of Quddus, and seven of his family members, along with 19 other individuals and three organisations linked to the insurance company and

Besides Quddus, the extended family had his wife Fazlutun Nessa, eldest daughter Fauzia Quamrun Tania, voungest daughter Tasnia Kamrun Anika, Anika's husband Sheikh Mohammad Danial, Quddus's Mostafa Kamrus Sobhan, and Sobhan's wife Shafia Sobhan Chowdhury as directors on the 20-member board.

The extended family controlled the board with 44.38 percent of the company's total shares.

a son-in-law and a daughter-in-law violated the Insurance Act by owning 24.34 percent of Sonali Life's shares together when no individual or family group is allowed to own more than 10

percent of shares. THE BUILDING

As per the BFIU document, Quddus owns the building, in which Sonali Life is headquartered. The building was mortgaged to Jamuna Bank for a Tk 35.5 crore loan.

However, no board meeting agenda included the purchase of the building, and no approval was given by the board or by IDRA.

The Tk 139.10 crore was paid for the building to benefit Quddus's Dragon including companies, Sweaters, CD Acrylic, and Imperial Sweaters, the BFIU report said.

Quddus, during a conversation with BFIU officials, claimed he received the funds as rent, according to the report.

But the company had documents to back the payment of only Tk 18.17 crore as rent from 2015 to 2023, the report said. "Because of a lack of documents, it could not be confirmed how much he took as office rent."

The family in a statement claimed

as rent, repayment of loans given at the inception of the company, and for the purchase of the ERP software from another concern of Quddus.

It claimed the insurance company still owes Quddus Tk 12 crore as of December 31, 2023.

The family also claimed that Rashed's failure to maintain proper records led to the inconsistencies surrounding the "rent".

MONEY LAUNDERED?

The report said a total of Tk 6.46 crore was withdrawn from the insurance company and sent abroad via Hundi, an illegal channel of cross-border money transfer, through Crown Money Changer Co Ltd.

The funds were paid to purchase British pounds, send money to London, for shopping in London, for Dubai tour, and payments to Quddus's granddaughter.

Crown Money Changer Co denied having any transactions with Sonali Life and no documents were found on the transactions, BFIU said in the

Rashed received financial benefits in various ways. He booked a flat in Gulshan, valued at Tk 18.39 crore, under his and Fauzia's names. The BFIU found evidence to believe that the payments for the flat were made by Sonali Life via its agents and pay

The family statement said it would not share details about the purchase of the Gulshan flat because the transactions were under legal scrutiny.

Sonali Life appointed Rashed as deputy managing director and chief financial officer in 2013 by showing that he had worked at Meghna Life Insurance from 2005 to 2013.

Meghna confirmed to BFIU that Rashed had never been their

Harassment of women in public spaces on rise

daylight while crossing a footbridge in Dhanmondi. She ended up with multiple injuries.

In mid-September, several women faced harassment and assault in Cox's Bazar, with videos of the incidents going viral on social media. Similar attacks took place targeting

sex workers in various parts of Dhaka. Senior journalist Sebika Debnath shared how she faced verbal harassment multiple times over the past two months and was questioned about her clothing choices and

upbringing. In a recent encounter with an aggressive elderly man, she felt compelled to stand up for herself but worried about a potential mob attack something that too has increased significantly over recent weeks.

Another senior journalist Jharna speak out like she used to. Roy described being humiliated for not wearing a headscarf when she was at street food joint with her family.

Due to the increase in the discriminatory attitude towards women, those like Sangita and Jharna now hesitate to protest or speak up against such abuses, fearing violent repercussions

"I always protested such incidents. My films focus on women's freedom and I advocate for it. But that day, I couldn't protest. Faced with torrents of abuse and threats, I was afraid that if I protested, people wouldn't believe me and instead might point fingers at

me because of his age," Sangita said. Shelly Islam, a school-goer, said thin police presence makes her feel vulnerable to harassment on the streets, leaving her too afraid to

Women on social media have been sharing similar experiences, with hundreds commenting on the increase in catcalls, verbal abuse, and various forms of harassment.

One woman reported being harassed for wearing a tip (a coloured dot on the forehead), while another was targeted for not wearing a burqa during a job interview. Others mentioned being victims of stalking.

Khushi Kabir, women's rights activist and coordinator of Nijera Kori, emphasised the urgent need to restore law and order, questioning why the situation hasn't improved despite the army being given

magisterial powers. "Idon't understand why the advisers haven't made a public statement condemning such behaviour, especially given the number of these incidents; their silence on these issues is unacceptable."

Shaheen Anam, executive director of Manusher Jonno Foundation, noted that ultra conservative groups have become emboldened and are acting without consequence. She highlighted that no actions have been taken against those who have engaged in such harassment, resulting in increased online trolling and hate

campaigns targeting women. She also pointed out that the overall mindset towards women remains unchanged.

"While major reforms in the Election Commission, judiciary, and law and order are crucial, women's issues are being completely sidelined, with social concerns not receiving the attention they deserve.'

To address this, she called for louder voices from women's organisations and social movements through writings, seminars, and advocacy.

"This government came to power through a movement against discriminations, yet discriminations against women remain unchanged."

She emphasised the need to hold authorities concerned accountable, including the women and children's affairs and social welfare ministries. Meanwhile, she suggested the ICT ministry act against online hate

campaigns. Bangladesh Mahila Parishad President Fauzia Moslem expressed her surprise that the Nobel laureate Chief Adviser Prof Muhammad Yunus has not yet addressed women's issues despite their vital role in the movement for societal progress.

She also criticised the male coordinators, who led protests with female students at the forefront, for their silence on the matter.

Fauzia noted the rise of misogyny which has shifted from social media to the streets. She called for clarity from those in power, stating, "The state cannot function like this -- there must be guiding principles."

She added that if the situation does not improve, women may have no choice but to take to the streets to initiate a movement.

She also emphasised the need to address the demoralisation within the police force, so that they can discharge their duties properly.

Contacted, Sharmeen S Murshid adviser to the women and children's affairs ministry, declined to comment on this issue.
