



## **BREACH OF DISCIPLINE** 252 trainee SIs dismissed month before graduation

Govt says no political reason behind it; several sacked SIs claim innocence

A total of 252 trainee sub-inspectors (SIs) of the 40th Outside Cadet batch have been dismissed just a month before graduating from the Sarda Police Academy in Rajshahi.

The academy's principal sent discharge letters to the trainees at their home addresses on Monday morning, confirmed three senior officials of the academy and the Police Headquarters

The official reasons cited for their dismissal was "breach of discipline".

On Friday, the trainees were sent on a five-day vacation.

#### **EC REGISTRATION** SC restores Jamaat's appeal against scrapping

The Appellate Division of the Supreme Court restored an yesterday appeal that challenged a High Court verdict scrapping the Jamaat-e-Islami's registration with the Election Commission as a political party.

The apex court will now fix a date for holding a complete hearing of the appeal on merit, said Mohammad Shishir Manir, a lawyer for the Jamaat.

"If the Appellate Division allows the appeal after holding a hearing on it, Jamaat-e-Islami will get back its registration and will participate in elections," he told The Daily

A four-member bench of the Appellate Division, headed by Chief Justice Refaat Ahmed, passed the order yesterday after holding hearing on a petition filed by Jamaat, seeking restoration of its

# Death toll tops 1,550 as bombings go on

Israel kept up its bombing of Lebanon yesterday after a late-night strike that killed 18 people near a Beirut hospital, state media reported, as its war on Hezbollah approached the one-month

The latest deaths brought the overall toll in Lebanon since September 23 to at least 1,552, according to an AFP tally

of health ministry figures, although the real number is likely to be higher due to data gaps.

The official National News Agency said four strikes hit Beirut's embattled southern suburbs, a Hezbollah stronghold, AFP footage showing plumes of smoke rising over the area.

An Israeli strike hit a target several hundred metres (yards) away from the venue just minutes after reporters left, an AFP video journalist said.

One raid in the Ghobeiri area levelled an 11-storey apartment complex, AFP images showed.

In the country's south, the Lebanese Red Cross said three paramedics were wounded in a strike on Nabatiyeh as they carried out a rescue mission in coordination with UN peacekeepers.

The strikes on Nabativeh created a "belt of fire," with scores of residential buildings, shops and cafes wiped out in "less than 30 seconds", NNA said, calling it the heaviest Israeli bombardment of the city since the start of the war.

"One street looked like a terrifying battlefield," NNA said.

The Israeli army also bombed Al-Hawsh, just south of the southern city of Tyre, NNA said, with AFPTV footage showing smoke billowing over the area.

## **Ex-MP Sumon** arrested, put on remand His counsel hit by 'pro-BNP lawyer'

A Dhaka court yesterday placed Barrister Syed Haque Sayedul Sumon, a former independent lawmaker, on a remand five-day in a case filed over

the shooting of Jubo Dal leader Ridoy Mia on July 19 in Dhaka's Mirpur area during the uprising. Dhaka Metropolitan Magistrate Md

Jakir Hossain passed the order after police produced him before the court with a 10-day remand prayer in the case, said a sub-inspector working at the court.

During vesterday's hearing, pro-BNP lawyers hurled abuse at Sumon in the courtroom. He was silent during the whole hearing.

After the proceedings, he was seen apologising to pro-BNP lawyers' leader Omar Faruq Faruqi, said witnesses.

Lawyer Morshed Hossain Shahin, who defended Sumon, was assaulted by a "pro-BNP lawyer" yesterday noon while he was briefing journalists about the hearing in front of the Chief Metropolitan Magistrate's Court of Dhaka.

A video clip of the assault was making the rounds in social media.

# Harris and Trump push for every vote

One of the tightest US election races of modern times enters its final, two-week stretch Tuesday, with Republican Donald Trump making a pitch to Latino voters as Democratic rival Kamala Harris sits down for a national TV interview.

Both campaigns are pumping hundreds of millions of dollars into a last push for undecided voters who could tilt the balance in their favor, with polls showing the candidates in a dead heat ahead

About 18 million Americans have already voted by mail or in person -- representing more than 10 percent of the total in 2020 and turnout could well be the deciding factor in who wins the White



Whatever the result, Americans will make history on November 5: they will either elect the first woman president in the world's leading superpower -- or they will put the first convicted felon into the White

Some polls appear to be giving Trump, who at 78 is the oldest nominee from a major party in US history, a slight edge recently but all within the margin of error.

The former president still refuses to accept his 2020 election defeat to outgoing President Joe Biden and is expected to reject the result if he loses -- potentially pitching the United States into chaos. THE OBAMA FACTOR

Harris -- the vice president who only threw herself into the race in July, when Biden made the stunning decision to drop out -- will give a interview to NBC on Tuesday.

The 60-year-old, who celebrated her birthday over the weekend, will also deploy two of her party's most popular emissaries onto the campaign trail: Barack and Michelle Obama.

## Tigers look to set Proteas a target

## BRICS, not West, will drive global economic growth

### Putin tells businessmen, officials on first day of summit

The BRICS group will generate most of the global economic growth in the coming years thanks to its size and relatively fast growth compared with that of developed Western nations, Russian President Vladimir Putin said on Friday

Putin hopes to build up BRICS - which has expanded to include Egypt,

Ethiopia, Iran and the United Arab Emirates as well as Brazil, Russia, India, China and South Africa - as a



powerful counterweight to the West in global politics and

The Kremlin leader is due to host a BRICS summit in the Russian city of Kazan on Oct. 22-24.

The countries in our association are essentially the drivers of global economic growth. In the foreseeable future, BRICS will generate the main increase in global GDP," Putin told officials and businessmen at BRICS business forum in Moscow.

"The economic growth of BRICS members will increasingly depend less on external influence or interference. This is essentially economic sovereignty," Putin added.
