Policy solutions key to their inclusion in job sector

Speakers tell seminar

Hawa Islam, a graduate with hearing and speech disabilities, endured discrimination and disrespect while working in several job sectors in Bangladesh. Eventually, she ended up without a job and is currently struggling financially.

"I have worked hard to develop my skills to earn a living, but my disabilities became major obstacles. Employers don't assess my abilities; instead, they exclude me as soon as they learn about my situation. I've applied for 25 jobs but haven't received a single call for an interview," said Hawa.

The remarks came during an event titled "Building Disability-Inclusive Supportive Workplace Culture in Bangladesh," jointly organised by The Daily Star and Access Bangladesh Foundation at The Daily Star Centre yesterday.

Another speaker, Akash Rahman, who has cerebral palsy, recounted the struggles

he faced before securing a job and having his own family. Nazmus Sakib, diversity and inclusion officer of UNDP, said,

Keeping their limitations in mind, a suitable workplace and work environment must be created for them in the government and private sector by including it in the policy.

"Barriers are created by the system, which results in the skills of people with disabilities not being expressed. Time and opportunity are not given to

them while answering questions during vivas. In this way, their talent is disregarded."

"Disability is not homogeneous group. They have the capacity and skills to go into employment, but our social conditions and ecosystem do not support it," he added.

Nazma Ara Begum Poppy, national project support officer at UN Women Bangladesh, said no separate studies are done to assess the barriers women with disabilities face, so there are no

These women are also more likely to be sexually harassed at work, she added.

"Our roads are not disability friendly. We require help from other people to move around. The existing disability act does not mention any special facilities for women either," she said.

Both Nazmus and Nazma are persons with visual disabilities. Mahmudul Hasan, assistant director of Society for the

Govt to phase out outdated vehicles

Ministry sits with stakeholders today

The government is going to take measures to remove outdated vehicles from Dhaka city, aiming to reduce air pollution.

The road transport and bridges ministry is going to hold a meeting today with the stakeholders to devise a plan on how to drive out tne venicies from the streets, an official said.

The move came at a time when the number of outdated vehicles rose to over 75,000 across the country, according to Bangladesh Road Transport Authority (BRTA)

Besides, the environment ministry has already written to BRTA to remove buses and minibuses older than 20 years and trucks and lorries older than 25 years from the roads.

Air pollution, a major issue for the capital, is one of the greatest environmental risks to health. With over two crore residents, Dhaka often tops the list of cities with the poorest air quality, according to vehicles are considered one of Air Quality Index (AQI) data.



According to BRTA, buses and minibuses are over 20 years old. Of them, 10,556 are in Dhaka. A total of 46,481 registered trucks, lorries, and other heavy vehicles have crossed 25 years. Of them, 14,683 are in Dhaka.

Older vehicles tend to emit more toxic gases due to incomplete combustion of fuel. The older the vehicle, the more pollution it causes, experts said.

SC lawyer files petition challenging its legality

A Supreme Court lawyer filed a petition with the High Court yesterday challenging legality of Article 70 of the constitution which deals cancellation membership of a lawmaker for voting against his or her political party. Lawyer Md Eunus Ali

Akond, in the petition, said an Appellate Division bench led by the then chief justice Surendra Kumar Saha observed the constitution's 16th amendment case in 2017 that Article 70 is contradictory to the constitution, which has been upheld by the apex court recently.

"This article should be scrapped, and I have again filed the petition challenging its legality. Its hearing may be held next week," he said.

DENGUE OUTBREAK 2024

Oct deadliest month so far

Despite seven days still remaining before the end of the month, October has already become the deadliest month this year in terms of deaths and cases from dengue.

With seven more deaths reported in the 24 hours till yesterday morning, the total death toll this year has now risen to 264.

Of the deaths, 108 were recorded in the first 23 days of October. Dengue claimed 80 lives in September, according to

Directorate General of Health Services (DGHS). Out of a total of 53,196 cases this year, over 20,000 people were infected in this month alone, the data show.

Experts have attributed the surge in dengue fatalities this year to the nationwide lack of mosquito control measures by the relevant authorities. Besides, late hospitalisation, multiple infections, and false detection are also blamed for the rise. GM Saifur Rahman, an entomologist at National University, said

this year the two Dhaka city corporations did not take adequate measures to identify and destroy active clusters of Aedes mosquitoes and their larvae. Moreover, the absence of surveillance in the district towns has been a major reason behind the outbreak, he said. "The government should have effective surveillance to identify

dengue hotspots. This will enable local government departments, community organisations, and educational institutions to conduct targeted interventions," he said.

Involve the youth in combating child marriage

Speakers at a programme yesterday emphasised the importance of incorporating youth into various government plans and policies to effectively combat child marriage.

They also highlighted the need for coordinated efforts among NGOs to address the issue.

These recommendations were shared during a views-exchange meeting titled "The Role of Youth in Ending Child Marriage and the Way Forward," organised by the Bangladesh Legal Aid and Services Trust (BLAST) at The Daily Star Centre in Dhaka.

Barrister Sara Hossain, honorary executive director of BLAST, stressed the need to provide girls with sufficient opportunities for education and employment to promote self-reliance, which is a key strategy in preventing child marriage.

Media personality Farzana Brownia pointed out that many girls in rural areas are married off due to the lack of social security. She emphasised the importance of ensuring social protection for girls as a means of ending child marriage.
