The government has reconstituted the Public Administration Reform Commission with the inclusion of three new members, raising the total number of members to 11.

The Cabinet Division issued a gazette notification to this end on Thursday.

Headed by Abdul Mueyed Chowdhury, who is also serving as chairman of Biman, the commission has been formed to build pro-people, skilled, and neutral public administration.

The three members are Prof Dr Syeda Shahina Sobhan, Firoz Ahmed, and Khondakar Mohammad Aminur Rahman.

The other members are former secretaries Dr Mohammad Tarek and Dr Mohammad Ayub Mia, senior secretary of Public Administration Ministry Dr Md Mokhles ur Rahman, former additional secretary Dr Md Hafizur Rahman Bhuiyan and former joint secretary Dr Rizwan Khayer, Dhaka University Prof Aka Firowz Ahmad and a student representative.

police deaths

Urges CA press wing

Some news outlets and people are deliberately spreading lies and misinformation on the number of police personnel killed during the July-August student-led uprising, the Chief Adviser's Press Wing said in a statement yesterday.

"We have noticed that some news outlets and also some people have been deliberately spreading lies and misinformation on the number of policemen who were killed during the July-August student-led uprising," it read.

According to the Police Headquarters, 44 police personnel lost their lives in the student-led movement, a figure backed by a list of those killed, published by the department.

The statement emphasised that the police department maintains a meticulous record of officers and constables injured or killed in protests or violent incidents.

The Press Wing requested anyone claiming a higher death toll to provide verifiable evidence to support their assertions.

Dhaka residents struggle with delayed certification, documentation works

With an urgent need for birth certificates of his family members, Mohammad Ziaul Haque, an employee of a private organisation, went to the zonal office of Dhaka North City Corporation in the capital's Mohammadpur on Tuesday.

But he was asked to go to the the Ward-27 councillor's office in Farmgate instead, which he found to be locked.

He was also given the phone number of the ward secretary, but no one responded when he called the number throughout the day.

"It's utterly frustrating. We need the birth certificates urgently, as we have to get passports within a month for an urgent trip abroad," said Ziaul.

Around 25 people went to the office on Tuesday to get different documents, only to return empty-handed.

Yasin Ali, a staffer of the ward-27 office, said the office remains closed most of the time, with the secretary showing up at times for a brief period.

The same scenario persists in other ward councillor's offices.

On September 27, all councillors of the two Dhaka city corporations and 10 other city corporations were removed from their posts. Now the ward secretaries are performing duties in their stead.

DNCC and DSCC now started to issue different certificates from their ward-level offices in coordination with the zonal office, following a direction from the interim government.

However, many residents complained that they were facing difficulties in getting services.

It now takes three to four days to get certificates, as the ward secretary has to get approval from the zonal office before issuing a certificate.

A councillor used to issue these certificates within an hour, they added.

Councillors used to issue 23 types of certificates, including citizen certificates, birth and death certificates, character certificates, succession (warisan) certificates, income certificates, voter ID correction certificates,

etc.

Previously, the citizens could reach the councillors anytime.

During a visit to ward-16 of Dhaka South City Corporation on Wednesday, this newspaper found a woman waiting in the councillor's office, where the ward secretary was providing services.

She was having trouble getting her succession certificate, as her elder brother -- who has had no contact with the family for a long time -- was not present.

"I am in dire need of this certificate to get the pension of our father, who passed away in August. If the councillor was still in charge, I wouldn't have faced this much hassle, as he knows us well," said the woman in her mid-50s.

"We are in serious trouble now," she added.

Secretary of Ward-16, Md Badruzzaman, said they cannot provide a warisan certificate to a person without the consent of a successor.

He also said they cannot provide the certificate within a day as they have to take the certificate to the zonal office for its vetting, which takes a few days to be completed.

Echoing Badiuzzaman, Ward-15 Secretary Zahirul Islam said they take five working days to complete a certificate due to the procedure.

Compared to other ages, people in the 16 to 30 age group are the most vulnerable to dengue infection this year.

According to experts, people in this age bracket remain outside home for a significant portion of time, which may have caused the high infection rate.

According to the Directorate General of Health Services (DGHS), the highest 8,551 dengue patients are aged 21 to 25, while 7,751 are aged 26 to 30, and 7,308 are aged 16 to 20.

Meanwhile, one more died in the mosquito-borne disease in the 24 hours preceding yesterday morning, while 477 were hospitalised in the same period.

With that, the death toll this year has reached 269, while the total number of cases has risen to 54,702.

Prof Kabirul Bashar, an entomologist at Jahangirnagar University, said, "A lot of people get infected with dengue at their offices or educational institutions. As people in the 16 to 30

age group remain outside most of the time, this may have contributed to their contracting the mosquito-borne disease in large numbers."

Bashar suggested wearing full-sleeved shirts, full pants, socks, and shoes to stay safe from the Aedes mosquito, the carrier of dengue virus.

People must also be careful in keeping their houses, yards, and workplaces clean, he said.

He also suggested people to use mosquito-killing repellent and cream to protect them from mosquito bites and to use mosquito nets while sleeping.

Entomologist Manzur A Chowdhury said there could be a connection between the high population of that age group and the large number of infections.

Stressing the need for continuing anti-mosquito drives, Manzur said the peak of dengue this year may reach in November, and the number of cases will start reducing afterwards.

He, however, warned that though the number of dengue cases will start declining, it will not be reduced significantly this year. People may get infected with dengue until February, he said.

Meanwhile, Dr HM Nazmul Ahsan, associate professor at Shaheed Suhrawardy Medical College Hospital, highlighted that high-risk groups, including the elderly, obese individuals, pregnant women, infants, and people with comorbidities, are more susceptible to fatal outcomes.

Dr Ahsan advised that severe stomach pain, difficulty breathing, extreme weakness, bleeding from the gums or nose, and vomiting should be treated as signs of immediate hospitalisation.

"Failure to hospitalise patients showing these warning signs can result in shock syndrome," he added.

He recommended consulting a doctor

ports asked to  
hoist signal-3

Bangladesh Meteorological Department yesterday asked all maritime ports of the country to keep hoisted cautionary signal three.

The advice was given as severe cyclonic storm "Dana" crossed Odisha of India and is likely to move west-northwestward to affect coastal areas of Bangladesh.

"Under the influence of the cyclone, gusty/squally wind is likely to affect the north bay, maritime ports and adjoining coastal areas of Bangladesh," a special weather bulletin of MET office said.

Maritime ports of Chattogram, Cox's Bazar, Mongla and Payra has been asked to keep hoisted local cautionary signal-3, it said.

All fishing boats and trawlers over the north Bay and deep sea have been advised to remain in shelter till today.
