Farooqi threat looms over Tigers' left-handed top-order

If you are a left-handed top-order Bangladesh batter, you would not like the sight of Afghanistan's left-handed pacer Fazalhaq Farooqi steaming in at you with the new ball.

Just ask former ODI skipper Tamim Iqbal – Bangladesh's highest run-getter in the format who was tormented and humbled down to the ground by Faroogi in a three-match series in Chattogram in 2022. Farooqi dismissed Tamim in all three matches and the southpaw, who was trapped lbw twice and castled once, had no answer to what Farooqi was dishing out.

Tamim won't be playing the upcoming three-match series against Afghanistan, starting on Wednesday in the UAE, but that does not mean that Farooqi won't be licking his lips as he gears up to wreak havoc when taking on Bangladesh, who have four left-handed top-order batters in their squad, three of whom are expected to play.

Let's look at what Farooqi's key strengths are with the new ball. The 24-year-old is an expert at swinging the ball both ways, particularly at nipping it off the surface. It's not like he can



he deals expertly at extracting the minimal assistance on offer. Add that up with his ability to keep it accurate and you have a solid option to rattle oppositions in the Powerplay – all of which along with his death-bowling prowess he used to great effect

Given the current form of Bangladesh's top-order across formats or their overall batting form in general, the candidates selected for the Afghanistan series do very little to evoke a sense of confidence. One can never know what to expect from Soumya, who has already played international cricket for almost 10 years. Skipper Shanto has been under fire for his abysmal form in the other formats and Zakir's glaring weakness against strict lines and lengths in recent redball contests does not help the Tigers either. Tanzid is different in that regard as he shares little of those similar weaknesses but has largely blown hot and cold.

The silver lining to this has most definitely got to be the Sharjah Cricket Ground - the venue for all three ODIs – as it has aided batters in recent contests. In the eight matches played at the venue since 2022, the average first innings score is 300.

England, Australia tours beckon Tigresses

Bangladesh women's cricket team will get to tour current and former ODI World Cup winners Australia and England for the first time in the next Future Tours Programme cycle (2025-2029). The Tigresses will also tour India and Pakistan during this cycle while host South Africa, West Indies, Sri Lanka and Zimbabwe.



The next Future Tours Programme cycle will almost matches being played among 11 teams as part of an expanded Women's Championship, ICC said in a press release on Monday.

All formats show a substantial increase from the previous cycle (2022-2025) and this FTP sees an ICC event each year with the inaugural sixteam Champions Trophy scheduled for 2027. The other ICC events during the period are the ICC Women's Cricket World Cup in 2025 (India), the ICC Women's T20 World Cup in 2026 (the United Kingdom) and the ICC Women's T20 World Cup in 2028 (host yet to be announced).

In all, 132 ODIs will be played in 44 series of three matches each. Members have scheduled, by mutual agreement, tri-series in the lead up to and as preparation for ICC events. Members have also pencilled in more Test matches this time, according to the new FTP.

Crisis manager Cummins rescues Australia

Pat Cummins proved once more he is the man for a batting crisis as he guided world champions Australia to a tense two-wicket win in their seriesopening one-day international against Pakistan at the Melbourne Cricket Ground on Monday.

Playing his first ODI since last year's World Cup in India, Cummins produced a nerveless knock of 32 from 31 balls to push the hosts past Pakistan's modest total of 203 with 16.3 overs to spare.

Cummins, who also took two wickets, burnished his record of guiding Australia to victory from positions of peril, having scored the winning runs during the Ashes Test at Edgbaston last year and twice hung tough with the bat at the

"Tonight we got it done. I always much prefer

sitting in the change-room but a wonderful match," Cummins said. "It got a bit tighter than we would have liked in the end.

The hosts were in trouble at 155 for seven when Cummins came to the crease, with Pakistan sniffing their first win in Australia in nearly eight years and energised by a three-wicket burst by paceman Haris Rauf.

Tailender Sean Abbott was run out for 13 to leave Australia needing 19 runs with two wickets in hand but Cummins and Mitchell Starc (two not out) held on.

Cummins smashed a four straight past Pakistan quick Mohammad Hasnain to level the score then punched a single square to seal the win.

Pace spearhead Starc was named man-of-thematch with three wickets, including dismissing both Pakistan's openers.
