like morality, honesty, principles, and ideals. This is why the country's political landscape is so chaotic. If we could uphold these values, they would be reflected in the betterment of our society."

Reflecting on the sacrifices of those who fought for Bangladesh's independence, Sohel Taj added, "Our duty is to honour the debt of their blood. Even if we can't give anything else, we should at least show respect to them."

During the event, Oitijhya launched a paperback edition of "Tajuddin Ahmad: Neta o Pita", a book published in 2014 on the liberation and post-liberation period, authored by Tajuddin's elder daughter, Sharmin Ahmed.

Recalling memories of her father, Sharmin said, "He would wake up early every morning and wake us up too. He made us exercise and would say, 'A day that starts early goes well.' Sometimes he would take us for walks, and if he saw garbage on the road, he would pick it up himself and dispose of it properly."

Sharmin urged the younger generation to revisit the history of the Liberation War. "The new generation should know the proper history of

the Liberation War, and analyse its contributions."

She shared insights into the untold plans of 1971, saying, "At that time, Bangabandhu, Tajuddin Ahmad, and others had planned to go underground on the night of March 25, taking shelter in Old Dhaka to declare independence and lead the war. However, that plan was foiled when Bangabandhu was arrested, which deeply shocked and surprised Tajuddin Ahmad. This incident marked the point where two distinct paths emerged in history."

Sharmin said many young people feel disconnected from the Liberation War due to a lack of comprehensive historical education.

"For a long time, they were taught only the history of one family, one individual. As a result, they feel disinterested. However, the Liberation War was a people's war, with contributions from every race. It is essential to highlight these contributions," she added.

Professor Ahmad Mostafa Kamal, who conducted the event, said, "We have become miserly in remembering Tajuddin. The man who led the struggle for independence is now discussed less and less, which is truly unfortunate for us."

the state. "If this opportunity is lost, our very existence as a nation will be endangered. I want to emphasise this point."

The BNP leader also said the interim government, which is currently responsible for running the state, has been endorsed by all quarters, including students and politicians.

"We entrusted them with this responsibility with the hope that they would clean up the mess created by the Awami League over the past 16 years and organise a credible election. Through that election, we can build the new Bangladesh that the youth aspire to," he said.

Fakhrul said they are repeatedly talking about the election because they believe no reform initiative can succeed without the active participation of the people. "Such participation is only possible through an elected parliament."

He also said if parliament can be made effective, it will be possible to ensure democratic culture and practices in the country.

and Monisha's body was hanging from a window grill," Ataur told The Daily Star.

"We are investigating the incident and interrogating their family members to find the reason behind the deaths. The bodies have been sent to Dhaka Medical College morgue for autopsy," he added.

the Ministry of Women and Children Affairs.

"We hope to establish policies and strategies within the available time frame," she added.

Tasneem Siddiqui, founding chair of the Refugee and Migratory Movements Research Unit (RMMRU), said research shows that it costs a quarter as much for female workers to migrate as it does for male workers.

"Nineteen percent can't afford to migrate, 31 percent return early due to issues, while 51 percent manage to improve their lives," she explained.

Tasneem said Bangladesh has the highest migration costs in Asia, attributing this to corruption involving government officials, recruiting agencies, and brokers. At the seminar, Rahima Begum, a returnee migrant worker, shared her experience of hardship.

"I stayed in Saudi Arabia for over a year during the pandemic but didn't receive any salary. I returned to Bangladesh and had to take loans," she said.

"My husband sent me a total of Tk 25,000 in six months, but I couldn't repay my creditors, and

one of them even assaulted me. I don't know how I will manage to move forward," she added.

Khaleda Masuma, from Abdullahpur, shared similar challenges. She worked as a housemaid in Saudi Arabia for just over a month, facing abusive treatment.

"They [the employers] didn't provide food and even beat me. When I fell sick, they didn't give me proper medical care. After borrowing money from many people, I returned to Bangladesh. But due to our poor financial condition, I still can't repay the loans," she shared.

FLAD's senior program officer, Lily Gomes, and chairperson Fawzia Karim Firoze, along with leaders from migrant organisations, also spoke.

A total of 69,922 dengue cases have been reported since January 1, 2024.

Last year, 1,705 people lost their lives due to dengue, making it the deadliest year on record. The DGH recorded 321,179 dengue cases and 3, 18,749 recoveries last year.

**Explanatory notes for the significant variations in the Financial Statements (Un-audited) for the 1st quarter ended 30 September 2024:**

### Issue-1: Significant Decrease in Revenue

The decrease in revenue is mainly due to reduction of IPLC Rent and IP Transit service results in ordinary course of business (i.e., price reduction, market competition and disconnection of default parties etc.).

### Issue-2: Significant Decrease in EPS

The decrease in EPS is mainly due to reduction of revenue in IPLC Rent, IP Transit service, increase in Operation and Maintenance Expenses along with increase in weighted average number of shares due to issuance of 2,21,33,333 new shares in favor of Government of Bangladesh (PTD) on 17 September 2024.

### Issue-3: Diluted Earnings per Share

To calculate Diluted Earnings per share, 1,69,98,144 Nos. of potential shares has been taken into consideration against Tk 24.96 crore, Tk 61.28 crore, Tk 33.00 crore and Tk 8.25 crore received during the year 2021-22, 2022-23, 2023-24 and 2024-25 respectively as equity from Government for implementing the project named "Installation of 3rd Submarine Cable for expansion of International Telecommunications System of Bangladesh" considering issue price of Tk 75 (Tk 65 as Premium per Share, Face Value Tk 10 per Share) based on the previous consent of the Finance Division of Ministry of Finance, Posts and Telecommunications Division and Bangladesh Securities and Exchange Commission.

### Issue-4: Net operating cash flows per share (NOCFPS)

The decrease in Net operating cash flows per share is mainly due to less collection of revenue and dues from the customers comparing that of the previous same period and issuance of 2,21,33,333 new shares in favor of Government of Bangladesh (PTD) on 17 September 2024.

### Issue-5: Net Asset Value per Share

Net Asset value per share has been increased mainly due to ordinary course of business activities even after issuance of 2,21,33,333 new shares in favor of Government of Bangladesh (PTD) on 17 September 2024.

on Bangladeshi domestic workers but now has increased hiring options, including workers from the Philippines. An official at the Bangladesh Embassy in Riyadh, said that Saudi Arabia has expanded its recruitment network, now sourcing workers from about 20 to 25 countries, up from just a few in 2015.

A Gulf News report on April 18 said Saudi Arabia has increased its hiring options to 33 countries, with recent additions such as Ethiopia, Burundi, Sierra Leone, Tanzania, and Gambia.

Shameem Ahmed Chowdhury Noman, former secretary general of the Bangladesh Association of International Recruiting Agencies, highlighted the need for modernising training facilities in Bangladesh to improve the skills of female migrant workers.

commission is essential to reshape the police force, said the adviser.

"After August 8, I talked to police personnel of different levels, and they made it clear that they no longer want to be part of a politicised system. They seek a professional, independent force that works for the public," said Shakhawat.

He highlighted the importance of political parties in the country showing commitment to such reforms.

He stressed that police reforms must be treated as a national priority and noted that restoring public trust in the police was vital for the country's social stability. Prof Dr Md Rizwanul Islam and Dr Ishrat Zakia Sultana from North South University presented a roadmap for police reforms and proposed a comprehensive plan for the formation of a police commission at the event.

Program, warned that without adequate skills, Bangladeshi female workers could face future challenges in the Saudi market and may encounter exploitative situations.

**IMPACT OF LOWER EMPLOYER COSTS**  
This recruitment decline coincided with a recent reduction in the costs Saudi employers pay for hiring Bangladeshi workers.

In January, the Saudi Ministry of Human Resources and Social Development capped the cost for recruiting domestic workers from Bangladesh at 11,750 Riyal, down from 13,000 Riyal.

Cost ceilings were also reduced for other source countries like the Philippines, Sri Lanka, Uganda, Kenya, and Ethiopia.

According to a recruiting agent, the cost reduction has posed challenges for Bangladeshi recruiters, as high intermediary and associated costs make the recruitment process more expensive.
