Rahul Gandhi chopper takeoff delayed **Congress complains** to election body

India's Congress party MP and Leader of opposition in Lok Sabha, Rahul Gandhi, faced an unexpected delay vesterday as his helicopter remained grounded in Jharkhand's Godda awaiting clearance from Air Traffic Control (ATC).

The chopper was allowed to take off after a delay of 45 minutes amid high-stakes campaigning for the final phase of the state's assembly elections.

The Congress claimed the holdup was a calculated move to disrupt Gandhi's campaign schedule. Party



leaders pointed fingers at Prime Minister Narendra Modi's rally near Deoghar, suggesting that the ATC's decision prioritised the PM's event over Gandhi's movements.

The Congress has written to the Election Commission of India (ECI) over the incident. The Congress has alleged that Gandhi and his staff had secured all the requisite permission for travelling across the state.

"There should be a level-playing field in campaigning. The PM's campaign cannot take precedence over that of all others. Today Rahul Gandhi got delayed in Jharkhand on this account," wrote Congress leader Jairam Ramesh on X.

In its letter to the ECI, the Congress alleged misuse of protocol to hinder opposition leaders' electoral campaigns. "If such a situation is allowed to prevail, then the ruling regime and its leaders can always take undue advantage of such protocols and limit the election campaign of opposition leaders," the letter read.

Musk's efficiency panel will issue reports

Says Trump on streamlining US govt, picks RFK Jr to lead health dept

US President-Elect Donald Trump said on Thursday that a government efficiency panel headed up by billionaire Tesla CEÓ Elon Musk will issue reports in its work to streamline the US government.

 $\hbox{``They will be coming out with individual'}\\$ reports and a big one at the end," Trump said in a speech at his Mar-a-Lago resort in Florida, providing the first new detail on the panel's output since it was announced earlier this week.

Trump on Tuesday said the panel would "provide advice and guidance from outside of government," on slimming down the government, cutting regulations, reducing spending and restructuring federal agencies.

Trump, for example, wants to sharply cut the "deep state" - career federal employees he says are clandestinely pursuing their own agendas.



Meanwhile, Trump said on Thursday he has selected Robert F Kennedy Jr, an environmental activist who has spread misinformation on vaccines, to lead the Department of Health and Human Services, the United States' top health agency.

In a post on X, Kennedy vowed to work to end chronic disease, clean up corruption and provide Americans with the data they need to make informed decisions, vowing to Trump he would work to "Make America Healthy Again."

Trump also said that North Dakota Governor Doug Burgum, a wealthy former software company executive, will be his pick for interior secretary.

"He's going to head the Department of Interior, and it's going to be fantastic," a tuxedo-wearing Trump said at a gala at his Mar-a-Lago Florida retreat.

Burgum, 68, has portrayed himself as a traditional, business-minded conservative. He ran against Trump for the Republican presidential nomination before quitting and becoming a loyal Trump supporter, appearing at fundraisers and advocating for Trump on television. The interior secretary will oversee policies guiding the use of 500 million acres of federal and tribal land, a fifth of the nation's surface area.

Since his victory, Trump has chosen several loyalists with little experience for key cabinet positions, stunning some allies and making clear that he is serious about reshaping America's institutions.

'EXTREME' CLIMATE

Swedish daily DN halts posts on X

Sweden's newspaper of reference, Dagens Nyheter (DN), said yesterday it would stop publishing its articles on Elon Musk's social media platform X, citing a "harsh and extreme" climate.

DN's announcement followed similar moves this week by The Guardian and Spain's La Vanguardia. "Since Elon Musk took over, the platform has increasingly merged with his and Donald Trump's political ambitions, while the climate on X has grown more harsh and extreme," editor-in-chief

Peter Wolodarski said in an article posted on X. "Therefore, we will not publish anything on there from our official accounts for the time being," editor-in-chief Peter Wolodarski said.

Musk has consistently courted controversy with his use of X, particularly during the recent United States presidential election when he endorsed victorious Republican candidate Donald Trump.

The tech billionaire used his personal account, boasting nearly 205 million followers, to sway voters in favour of Trump.

TOXIC SMOG

Pakistan's Punjab declares health emergency

Pakistan's Punjab declared a health emergency due to toxic smog yesterday, banning construction, shutting schools for another week and moving universities online, with a 3-day lockdown possible, the province's senior minister said yesterday.

Punjab battles toxic smog every winter as cold air traps dust, emissions, and smoke from illegal stubble burning on fields. Air quality has deteriorated drastically in recent weeks and the province's capital Lahore currently ranks as the world's most polluted city, says IQAir.

"A complete lockdown will be enforced on Friday [yesterday], Saturday, and Sunday (next week) if the situation does not improve by Wednesday," said Punjab Senior Minister Marriyum Aurangzeb, addressing a press conference in Lahore.

Citizens were advised to stay indoors. Air Quality Index readings in Lahore reached 637 at 3:00 pm, according to IQAir, significantly higher than levels recommended by the WHO.

UK scrambles jets Shocked heavily, Farzana was

UK jets were scrambled to monitor a Russian reconnaissance aircraft flying close to UK airspace, the defence minister in London said yesterday.

Two Typhoons from Lossiemouth in Scotland followed the Russian Bear-F aircraft as it flew over the North Sea on Thursday, the ministry said.

"At no time was it able to enter UK sovereign airspace," it added. The Typhoons were supported by a

Voyager refuelling aircraft. "Our adversaries should be in no doubt of our steadfast determination

and formidable ability to protect the UK," said armed forces minister Luke Pollard. 'The Royal Navy and RAF (Royal

Air Force) have once again shown they stand ready to defend our country at a moment's notice and I pay tribute to the professionalism and bravery of those involved in these latest operations," he added.

The Royal Navy also shadowed Russian military vessels passing through the Channel this week, said the defence ministry.

"Sometimes I lie awake at night worrying about how I will buy food the next day," Nasrin said in despair.
