Saad loyalists submit memo to CA's office

Hold 2-hr sit-in seeking permission to allow Saad to attend Biswa Ijtema

Followers of the Tabligh Jamaat faction loyal to Delhi's Maulana Mohammed Saad Kandhalvi yesterday submitted a memorandum to the chief adviser's office to allow Maulana Saad to attend next year's Biswa Ijtema.

They marched to the State Guest House Jamuna on Minto Road in the morning and submitted the memorandum, which was received by the Chief Adviser's Press Secretary Shafiqul Alam.

The memorandum also sought permission for followers of Delhi's Nizamuddin Markaz, the Tabligh headquarters led by Maulana Saad, to organise the first phase of next year's Biswa Ijtema.

Before the march, they held a sit-in demonstration in front of Kakrail Mosque, which began around 8:45am, leading to traffic congestion in the area.

They later withdrew their programme around 10:45am, after receiving assurances from the chief adviser's office that their demands would be addressed.

Shafiqul Alam, secretary of the Chief Adviser's Press Wing, met with the demonstrators to negotiate, but the protesters insisted on delivering their memorandum directly to Yunus.

Eventually, a delegation submitted the memorandum at the CA's office, where Shafiqul received it on behalf of Yunus. He assured the group that their demands would be communicated to the chief adviser, according to

Mohammad Sayem, media coordinator for the faction. "After receiving the assurance, we called off our sit-in at 10:45pm," Sayem told The Daily Star.

4 killed as bus, pickup collide

Four people were killed in a head-on collision between a bus and a pickup truck in Tangail's Madhupur upazila early vesterday.

The incident took place around 5:30am in front of Malauri Government Primary School on the Tangail-Jamalpur regional highway when a Dhaka-bound bus of Binimoy Paribahan collided with a Jamalpur bound pickup truck, said Rasel Ahmed, inspector (investigation) of Madhupur Police Station.

The deceased were identified as pick-up driver Sujan Miya, 25, his assistant Amjad Hossain, 28, and vegetable traders Rabiul Islam, 28, and Shahjahan Sheikh, 42.

Rabiul and Shahjahan were returning home after selling off their vegetables in Dhaka.

The driver and helper of the pickup truck died on the spot. Meanwhile, two critically injured passengers of the pickup were taken to Madhupur Upazila Health Complex, where they died from their injuries.

On information, police rushed to the scene. The accident briefly disrupted traffic on the road, but the situation was brought under control by the police soon after.

Defaulted loans may double next year

All types of loans including agriculture and SME loans will come under the tightened classification rules, which will have to be implemented in the second phase by March next year.

If the new loan classification rules are followed, the defaulted loan figure will likely double, according to industry insiders.

Bangladesh now has the highest ratio of defaulted loans in South Asia, with nearly 17 percent of the country's total disbursed loans having gone bad.

"No doubt, the defaulted loans will increase in the upcoming days," said Syed Mahbubur Rahman, managing director of Mutual Trust Bank, citing the tightening loan classification rules and the impending loan default by the Awami League-affiliated businessmen who took out huge amounts from banks violating rules and regulations.

Bad loans will surpass Tk 3,00,000 crore by December, said Mohammed Nurul Amin, a former chairman of the Association of Bankers Bangladesh (ABB), the forum of banks' managing directors and chief executives.

If the loan classification rules are tightened, the number will be higher, said Amin, the chairman of Global Islami Bank.

A team of the World Bank is now in talks with the central bank to support banking sector reforms and they urged the BB to implement the international standard loans classification rules by the deadline.

BB once followed the international practice while classifying loans but it gradually deviated since 2015.

US warns Turkey against hosting Hamas leadership

The United States issued a warning Monday against countries hosting members of Hamas, singling out Turkey after recent reports indicated possible moves by the Palestinian Îslamist group's leadership.

"I've seen the reports that some of the leadership of Hamas, who had been in Doha, have now moved to Turkey," State Department spokesman Matthew Miller during a press meeting Monday.

Miller did not confirm the reports, but said he was "not in a position to dispute" them.

"We will make clear to the government of Turkey, as we have made clear to every country in the world, that there can be no more business as usual with Hamas," he added.

"We don't believe the leaders of a vicious terrorist organization should be living comfortably anywhere," Miller said, adding that several of the members have been indicted in the United States and "should be turned over."

3 HC judges step down

Contacted, Law Secretary Sheikh Abu Taher declined to comment on the specifics of the resignations and the contents of the resignation

Law Adviser Asif Nazrul and SC Registrar General Aziz Ahmed Bhuiyan could not be reached over the phone for comments.

Requesting anonymity, an official of the SC registrar general's office told The Daily Star that the Supreme Judicial Council, led by Chief Justice Syed Refaat Ahmed, earlier this month had called for Justice Salma, Justice Quazi Reza-Ul and Justice Zahirul to appear before it.

The official said the three HC judges sent their resignation letters to the president yesterday through the SC registrar general's office.

Then chief justice Syed Mahmud

Hossain on August 22, 2019, asked Justice Salma Masud Chowdhury, Justice Quazi Reza-Ul-Hoque and Justice AKM Zahirul Hoque to refrain from judicial activities.

The three judges sought leave from the authorities concerned, then SCspokesperson Mohammad Saifur Rahman said in a press statement that day without mentioning any reason.

The statement did not disclose the names of the judges and why the inquiry was being conducted.

Meanwhile, over 1,000 students demonstrated on the SC premises on October 16 this year demanding removal of the "pro-Awami League fascist judges".

On that day, SC Registrar General Aziz Ahmed told the protesters that 12 judges will not be assigned benches. Following this statement, the agitating students postponed their demonstrations.

The 12 HC judges --Justice Md Ataur Rahman Khan, Justice Naima Haider, Justice Sheikh Hassan Arif, Justice Muhammad Khurshid Alam Sarkar, Justice Ashish Ranjan Das, Justice Khizir Hayat, Justice SM Maniruzzaman, Justice Khandaker Diliruzzaman, Justice Md Akhtaruzzaman, Justice Shahed Nuruddin, Justice Md Aminul Islam, and Justice SM Masud Hossain Dolon - have not been given judicial duties

Law ministry sources say the draft introduces a provision that makes it possible to ban a political party for up to 10 years for committing crimes against humanity or genocide.

According to the draft, the amendment would allow the trial of leaders of any organisation for giving commands, the appointment of foreign lawyers, and the recording and broadcast of trial proceedings.

More than 120 complaints have been filed with the investigation agency of the International Crimes Tribunal so far. Dozens of the complaints were against Sheikh Hasina, her party colleagues and top leaders of Awami League's ally parties.

Prof Asif said the government would seek to extradite Hasina from India depending on the tribunal's

The law ministry is at the final stage to prepare a draft Cyber Protection Ordinance 2024.

The interim government early this month decided in principle to repeal the Cyber Security Act, which has been widely criticised as a draconian

If the cybersecurity law is repealed, cases filed over "speech crimes" under the law will be withdrawn

and the lawsuits related to hacking or computer-related crimes will continue, Prof Asif said.

A draft law to appoint High Court and Appellate Division judges is in the final stage. "Hopefully, the next judge will be appointed as per the new law.

"We have taken a major step. There were different allegations over appointments of justices by different governments. We want to have a law regarding the appointments."

Almost all the criminal cases filed to suppress the mass uprising have been withdrawn, he said.

The government is embarrassed about cases filed just to harass people. "If I remain in this ministry, I will find a way to punish those who file false cases.'

Asked whether the law ministry was working on an ordinance to give legitimacy to the interim government, he said no such ordinance has been finalised.

About 80 percent of defaulters are not willing to repay despite having the ability to clear the loans, according to

More than 15 major defaulters took out Tk 20,000 crore to Tk 30,000 crore each from banks before fleeing the country he said

"When the banks go to auction their mortgaged assets, these defaulters send their representatives to the court, and the High Court also takes their words into consideration. We can't recover the money when the court imposes a stay order on the default status of the client.
