'More reserved seats for women' Activists, journos also propose reintroduction of 'no-vote' option

Women rights activists and senior television journalists yesterday proposed increasing the number of reserved seats for women in the parliament, alongside a direct presidential election.

While holding separate views exchange meetings with the Electoral Reform Commission, they also proposed direct polls for the reserved seats for women, reintroduction of the no-vote option, and having a mechanism that none can get elected uncontested.

Both the meetings were held at the Election Commission office.

61pc want polls within a year, 65.9pc prefer reforms first

Reveals VOA survey



More than three out of every five (61.1 percent) Bangladeshis said they wanted elections within a year, while almost 66 percent said they wanted necessary reforms before the elections, as per a survey by the Voice of America's Bangla service.

Most of the respondents who prioritised reforms before elections were lenient with the are implemented.

Meanwhile, 18.7 prefer elections within two and three years, and 8.6 percent believe polls should happen within 18 months. A minority of 5.8 percent want the elections postponed for four years or

Interestingly, 4.6 percent respondents did not have a specific preference for an election deadline, while 1.1 percent declined to answer.

The survey was conducted across Bangladesh and included participants during October 13-27.

The survey highlighted slight variations in preferences between urban and rural populations, with 60.4 percent urban respondents and 61.4 percent rural participants supporting elections within a

Gender differences were also evident, as 65 percent women preferred elections within a year compared to 57.3 percent

POST-AUG 5 PROBES Ensure no innocent is harassed: IGP

UNB, Dhaka

Inspector General of Police (IGP) Baharul Alam yesterday instructed fieldlevel officers to properly investigate cases filed after August 5 to ensure no innocent person is harassed.

The IGP further stated that even if a case is filed against an innocent person, steps should be taken to withdraw it through the proper legal process.

The police chief was presiding over a meeting on the country's overall law and order and security at the Police Headquarters.

The IGP instructed metropolitan police commissioners, DIGs, and district SPs to hold regular exchange meetings with their forces to boost morale.

He added that no police officer should be unnecessarily victimised.

He urged field-level officers to strengthen public relations, emphasising that police must engage with the community, listen to their concerns, and take legal action where necessary.

The IGP acknowledged that in the current climate, public expectations are high.

The People for Animal Welfare (PAW) Foundation, Bangladesh, yesterday filed a complaint with Adabor Police Station after carcasses of three stray dogs and a cat were found in Mohammadpur's Japan Garden City on Friday night.

In the complaint, the organisation alleged that six more dogs were poisoned but the carcasses were hidden away before they arrived at the scene.

PAW Foundation accused Shahanur, secretary of the Japan Garden City Committee, along with other committee members, of culling the animals, alleging that it was a violation of the Animal Welfare Act 2019.
