He added that the interim government is currently working on state reforms and a new political settlement, while the younger generation has taken on the role of a vigilant watchdog.

"The potential for a new Bangladesh has emerged, with its key driving force being the nation's youth," he said.

According to Iftekharuzzaman, a commission has already been formed to reform the ACC, which needs a complete restructuring — from appointments to operational processes. Other key institutions also require significant reforms to ensure accountability and effectiveness.

However, he stressed that true change will not come until there is a positive transformation in Bangladesh's political culture, bureaucratic ethos, and a widespread adoption of anti-corruption principles.

"This is a lesson rooted in the spirit of our student movements against inequality — a spirit that must inspire our political leaders and bureaucrats.

"We must align ourselves with the youth's demand to instil an anti-corruption ethos across politics, bureaucracy, and society at large. The younger generation has shown us that they will relentlessly dismantle anything they find unacceptable," he said.

Addressing the interim government, Iftekharuzzaman said, "We trust that the current government has no political ambitions of its own. Therefore, we urge this

interim administration to implement reforms across state structures, including the ACC, in a way that future governments, elected through democratic means, operate within a framework that inherently promotes anti-corruption and ensures integrity. This is the crucial responsibility of the current interim government."

In his keynote speech, Zafor Sadiq, deputy programme manager of TIB, emphasised that the core objective of state reform and a national political settlement must be the eradication of corruption, abuse of power, and impunity.

He said, "The essence of a 'new Bangladesh,' envisioned through unprecedented sacrifices and loss of life, lies in continuing the fight against corruption, inequality, and oppression. Our goal is to build a corruption-free, egalitarian, well-governed, and humane nation."

Zafor Sadiq also presented a 14-point demand for reforms during the human chain, calling for structural changes to institutions and policies to support the vision of a corruption-free Bangladesh.

number of undocumented workers, Jahangir said, "We don't have precise statistics. People from various countries are involved, and no illegal stay will be permitted."

On deportation plans, he said, "A timeline will be set after gathering data."

Regarding claims of 2.6 million illegal Indian

workers, Jahangir refrained from commenting, saying he was unaware of the source. He dismissed speculation of border tensions, affirming vigilance by the Border Guard Bangladesh across all regions.

Jahangir also mentioned upcoming discussions during the Indian foreign secretary's visit, expressing optimism about maintaining strong bilateral relations. "When you visit someone's home, the relationship naturally improves," he said.

Both the President and the Chief Adviser congratulated the women who are going to receive the "Begum Rokeya Padak 2024."

Begum Rokeya, who was a fierce champion of gender equality, was born at Pairaband village in Mithapukur upazila, Rangpur, on December 9, 1880. She died on the same day in 1932 in Kolkata.

The birth and death anniversaries of Begum Rokeya have been officially observed as Rokeya Day since 1994.

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He reiterated the interim government's commitment to seeking justice against Hasina for alleged "mass murder" during the July uprising and the siphoning of \$16 billion annually. Efforts are underway to bring her back under the extradition treaty with India. Meanwhile, Deputy Press Secretary Apurbo Jahangir said there is a possibility of Misri meeting the Chief Adviser. However, he added that discussions on "uneven treaties" with India, may occur later.

He also invited Indian journalists to visit Bangladesh to counter disinformation, urging them to report from the ground.

"If anyone is found to be involved in irregularities, they must be held accountable," he added.

Acknowledging the road's state, KCC Chief Engineer Mashuuzzaman Khan said rainwater had accumulated on some parts of the road and caused damage during the monsoon.

"The contractors have been instructed to repair the affected portions, and steps are on to prevent waterlogging on the road in the future," he added.

is being sold at Tk 1,200-1,400 per maund," he said.

Abu Tareq, another farmer of the same locality, said the straw produced alongside paddy, which is a high-price fodder for cattle, will help cover the production cost incurred.

Talking to this correspondent, many other farmers in neighbouring Char Laxmipur, Char Anandipur and Char Bhavanipur villages, also echoed the same.

Aman cultivation is profitable as it costs less than Boro cultivation, while the straw generates extra income, they added.

Nasrin Akter Banu, deputy director of DAE in

Mymensingh district, said a total of 2,68,490 hectares of land were brought under Aman cultivation in the district this season with a production target of 7,79,738 tonnes of paddy.

"Although Aman paddy on 25,795 hectares of land was damaged completely or partially due to recent flash floods in three upazilas, it will not affect the total production," she added.

M o h a m m a d Nuruzzaman, deputy director of DAE in Netrokona, said 24,667 hectares of Aman fields were affected in recent flash floods out of the total 1,35,900 hectares of land cultivated this season, but the production target of

6,20,000 tonnes will not be affected much due to good yield.

Mohammad Shakhath Hossain, deputy director of DAE in Sherpur, said the total production could be a little less than the target, as flash floods damaged crops on around 33 percent of the total 93,708 hectares of land cultivated for Aman paddy.

"However, the price is reasonable in the market, while the farmers will be able to cultivate winter crops on the lands once all the paddy is harvested," he added.

The picture has also been similar in Jamalpur and Kishoreganj districts so far, according to DAE sources.

various government offices for assistance but has yet to receive any meaningful support.

"I've knocked on many doors, but no one has responded. I am in desperate need of financial aid to survive and seek further treatment," he said.

Dashmina Upazila Executive Officer Irtiza Hasan said that if Saidul submits a formal application, the local administration would facilitate help through social services and the deputy commissioner's office.

However, such promises often ring hollow for many, like Saidul, trapped in bureaucratic limbo.

fairs also presented its own challenges.

"I remember taking a stall at a fair in Dhanmondi, where I couldn't make a single sale," she recounted.

"People would come and surf through my products, but no one bought anything. Some even filmed me from a distance, showing more interest in me than in my creations."

Finding someone to share a stall with her has also proven difficult, as other entrepreneurs often hesitate. "They tell me directly that customers might not visit if they share a stall with me," she explained.

This forces her to pay the full amount for a stall, despite it not being profitable given the limited sales potential in such a short time.

"It was evident that when I wasn't at the stall, my products received a much better response, but hiring someone isn't profitable for me due to my small business size."

However, despite the setbacks, she found moments of success. "There were times I did make a good profit from people who appreciated my art, like at Dhaka Makers and Art Summit."

Unfortunately, similar issues sometimes plagued her online sales. When delivering products nearby, customers would stop her to ask irrelevant and inappropriate questions about her body.

Tithi has also been harassed multiple times while sourcing materials for her business. In the male-dominated wholesale market in Islampur, she is often met with stares.

"On one occasion, I found a man putting his hand inside my jacket. When I looked at him, he smiled unapologetically and mockingly said, 'Sorry.'"

Tithi also said she is frequently overcharged for the same materials compared to her peers from other genders.

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Tithi often hauls 50 kg sacks of cloth down four flights of stairs, encountering refusals to assist her due to her hijra identity, even when she offers payment for help.

"In New Market, wholesale shopkeepers typically prioritise female entrepreneurs, engaging them in conversation and offering business tips, while I'm largely overlooked and spend entire days trying to buy just Tk 10,000 worth of products."

Currently, Tithi's average monthly income is Tk 15,000, constrained by inconsistent online sales.

Last month, she earned around Tk 20,000 from selling a few saris and a shipment of patchwork bags to Japan.

Tithi believes hijra entrepreneurs could thrive if the government created a supportive environment, offering access to loans, skills training, and vocational training and job opportunities.

Despite all, Tithi aspires to grow as an entrepreneur and proudly represent her identity. "Many hijra entrepreneurs hide their identities, even while producing for top brands. I want to change that narrative and help train others in my community," she said.

Her appeal to the new government is clear — fulfil the promise of anti-discrimination by providing hijras with genuine opportunities to work and thrive based on qualifications and expertise.

Barrister Mainul Hosein
(1940-2023)

Today marks the first death anniversary of Barrister Mainul Hosein, Founder Trustee of Independent University, Bangladesh (IUB). On this solemn occasion, we honor his remarkable contributions to education, journalism, and public service.

Born in Pirojpur in January 1940, Barrister Mainul Hosein, son of the legendary journalist Tofazzal Hossain (Manik Mia), pursued his education in Kolkata, Pirojpur, and Dhaka. After completing his Honours in Political Science at Dhaka University, he studied Law at the Middle Temple Inn, London, and returned to Dhaka in 1965 as a Barrister-at-Law.

In 1969, he became Editor of The Daily Ittefaq, continuing as Chairman of the Board of Editors even after returning to his legal career in 1973. He also served as a Member of Parliament in 1973 and held leadership roles in the Supreme Court Bar Association and the Press Council of Bangladesh. In 2007, he served as the Law, Information, and Land Adviser in the Caretaker Government.

Barrister Mainul Hosein passed away on December 9, 2023, at the age of 83, leaving behind a legacy of service and integrity. The IUB family remembers him with deep respect and heartfelt prayers. May the Almighty grant eternal peace to his soul.
