# Politicisation hindering public admin

Speakers tell CGS event

Politicisation remains the biggest challenge to Bangladesh's public administration, with both politicians and bureaucrats contributing to its entrenchment, speakers said at a discussion yesterday.

They criticised the isolation of public administration from the people and called for sweeping reforms to ensure accountability and merit-based appointments.

The public administration system is heavily influenced by a "broker culture", undermining its effectiveness, speakers said at the discussion, organised by the Centre for Governance Studies at the CIRDAP auditorium in Dhaka.

Hossain Zillur Rahman, former advisor to a caretaker government, said, "Our public administration suffers from significant deficiencies and is trapped in a broker system."

Criticising the state of local governance, he added, "Political parties and bureaucrats have reduced local governments to lowclass servants."

He said without granting autonomy to institutions, economic progress would remain stagnant.

"Bangladesh is experiencing instability and uncertainty, but Awal Majumdar traced the roots of also an opportunity to bring about change," said Zillur, also executive director of CGS.

The BCS General Education Cadre Association yesterday demanded the immediate withdrawal of the Public Administration Reform Commission's reported recommendation to exclude the General Education Cadre from the BCS system.

At a press conference at Dhaka Reporters Unity yesterday, the association warned of protests if their demands were not met by December 29.

Acting General Secretary Mohammad Tajib Uddin presented a 15-point demand, expressing concern over remarks by the commission's chairman suggesting plans to remove the General Education and Health Cadres from the BCS structure.

Tajib Uddin said the proposal had caused significant distress among the 16,000 members of the General Education Cadre, creating an atmosphere of uncertainty and anxiety.

He described the

proposed reforms as a 'suicidal plan," warning that such a move would destabilise the cadre and risk the stability of the state.

warrants arrest yesterday against former Dhaka-19 MP Muhammad Saiful Islam and four police officials in connection with crimes against humanity during the July-August mass

uprising in Ashulia, Savar. Tajul said investigations had uncovered the involvement of Saiful and the police in a brutal incident where six students were reportedly shot dead, their bodies burned, and the crime staged to appear as the work of protesters.

A viral video from early August showed six burnt bodies piled onto a police van. Investigators found that Saiful allegedly fired shots personally, aided by four officers. After the shootings, the bodies were taken in a rickshaw, later loaded onto a van near the police station, and set alight using petrol.

The names of the implicated police officials remain undisclosed to prevent their escape. Tajul Islam said that while the officers are currently posted in different locations, their arrests are expected soon.

"Such actions appear to have been an attempt to avoid accountability," he added.

## Postgrad trainee doctors reject Tk 5,000 stipend raise

Postgraduate trainee doctors yesterday staged a protest rally rejecting the Tk 5,000 increase in their monthly

The proposed raise would take their stipend to Tk 30,000, but they called for raising the stipend to Tk 50,000, warning that they will continue their movement until their demands are met.

The Finance Division on Monday issued a circular increasing the salary to Tk 30,000 from Tk 25,000 for the postgraduate trainee doctors.

Yesterday afternoon, the postgraduate trainee doctors organised a protest rally at Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujib Medical University (BSMMU) in Dhaka's Shahbagh. Hundreds of doctors participated in the protest, voicing their dissatisfaction with the Tk 5,000

At around 2:45pm, the protesting doctors brought out the rally at BSMMU, chanting different slogans saying that they rejected the government's decision.

Regarding the decision, Suja Uddin, a postgraduate trainee doctor at Dhaka Medical College Hospital, told The Daily Star, "A mere Tk 5,000 increase in stipend is a mockery of us. We do not accept this decision. Our monthly stipend must be raised to Tk 50,000."

While briefing the reporters, Jabir Hossain, president of Doctors Movement for Justice -- the platform under whose banner these protests are being organised announced an indefinite period of work abstention nationwide, demanding their monthly stipend be raised to Tk 50,000 or be the same as a 9th-grade salary for government employees.
