INSIDE BAITUL MUKARRAM MARKET

Dhaka's destination for tasbihs, prayer mats, and attars

Rows of stalls brimming with the thick fragrance of attars, the gentle gleam of tasbihs, countless varieties of prayer mats and religious caps — this is a scene common at the city's Baitul Mukarram Market. As you wander through its bustling lanes, you encounter sellers who have spent years building their lives around these religious wares. Their stories are as diverse as the goods they sell.

Take Noro Nobi, for example, who arrived in Dhaka in 2018 with little more than faith and determination. With limited resources, he began selling tasbihs (prayer beads) and prayer caps. His goods, sourced from various wholesalers, quickly gained a loyal following.

"At first, I thought I'd sell anything – vegetables, fruits – but when I saw this market, I felt it was calling me. I wanted to sell something that connected people to their faith," Nobi shares, gently arranging an assortment of intricately carved tasbihs.

His collection includes prayer beads made from fragrant sandalwood, polished stones, and even semi-precious gems. Customers also flock to his store for his collection of attars — from the woody warmth of oud to the delicate sweetness of rose, each fragrance is a sensory link to the Islamic heartlands.

For many, a visit to Nobi's stall is not just a shopping experience but a step toward nurturing their spirituality. "It's not just about selling products; it's about understanding what my customers need for their prayers and daily lives," he explains.







Not far from Nobi's shop, Akram Ali has carved a niche selling prayer mats and Qur'an holders. Originally from Chittagong, Akram came to Dhaka a decade ago to pursue a better life. He began as a porter but his keen eye for craftsmanship soon led him to the world of prayer mats.

"I've been here for ten years," he says, carefully unrolling a mat with intricate floral patterns. "I started with only a few items, but now I stock mats from Saudi Arabia, Iran, and India."

For Akram, selling prayer mats is a way to help people create their sacred spaces.

"There was a young couple who came here before their wedding," Akram shares. "They bought matching mats, saying they wanted to start their married life with prayer. Moments like that make all the hard work worth it"

Baitul Mukarram Market draws a diverse crowd. There are devout Muslims seeking items for personal worship, families shopping for gifts during festivals, and even tourists fascinated by the cultural significance of the wares. Fridays see the market at its busiest, as worshippers from the mosque spill into the bazaar to browse

its offerings.

Despite its bustling atmosphere, the market is not without challenges. Sellers face rising costs due to fluctuating exchange rates and import taxes, which affect the affordability of their products. Competition is fierce, as dozens of stalls offer similar wares, forcing sellers to differentiate themselves through personalised service and quality offerings.

"It's not easy," admits Noro. "Sometimes, I have to lower my prices just to make a sale. But at the end of the day, I'm grateful. This market has given me everything."

While tradition remains at the heart of Baitul Mukarram Market, modernity has begun to creep in. Some sellers are experimenting with online sales, offering their goods to customers far beyond Dhaka. "I've started posting pictures of my mats on Facebook," Akram shares. "I even got an order from someone in Chittagong. It's a new way to keep the business going."

Yet, the tactile experience of the market – the feel of a smooth tasbih or the sight of vibrant stalls – remains irreplaceable.

As Baitul Mukarram Market continues to thrive, it displays the enduring appeal of faith-driven commerce. Sellers embody the spirit of the market, combining hard work with a deep respect for their customers' spiritual needs. Their stories are woven into the fabric of this unique marketplace, where every product tells a tale of devotion and tradition.

Why everyone's talking about MONA MAMA'S EGG-TOPPED HALEEM

So recently, there has been this haleem on Mohammadpur's Salimullah Road that has taken social media by storm. You know the one I'm talking about—the bowl of thick, aromatic treat, perfectly measured with three pieces of beef and topped with a small, boiled quail egg!

Curious, I decided to see if the hype was real! So, following the buzz, I rushed to Salimullah Road, the street already famous for its kababs and spice-filled air. At the centre of it all was Mona Mama, the man of the moment, serving bowl after bowl to an eager crowd. The excitement in the air was indeed palpable.

The interesting fact I realised after reaching there was that this was not some new craze; Mona Mama has been selling it here for over 30 years! His shop name is Mona Mamar Haleem and Soup, owned by Abdul Mannan, who is basically our Mona Mama.

So, I approached him with a polite smile, hoping to learn more about the

inspiration behind his unique addition of a quail egg in his haleem. However, he quickly dismissed my curiosity with a casual, "Ekhonna mama, pore (Not now, dear, later!)" Slightly embarrassed, I just stopped there and waited until the crowd thinned out. Meanwhile, I asked some of his customers for their opinion.

"Social media brought me here," said Nabila, a university student, snapping photos of her steaming bowl. "But one bite, and I know I'll be back even without the hype. It's actually that good."

After taking one spoonful, I realised that she was not exaggerating. One bite of meat and egg in, and I was hooked too. The dish was thick, flavourful, and perfectly spiced, with the quail egg adding a unique touch that made it feel like comfort food fit for a winter evening.

"Honestly, the egg makes all the difference," said Sanchay, a corporate executive who had come straight from work. "It's what takes this from good to

unforgettable." Sanchay almost summed it up perfectly, but for me, it's not just the egg but also that balance of beef. Those three pieces changed the game for me.

Mona Mama's shop is not grand. It's a small, humble roadside shop that cannot accommodate more than 25 people at once! And apart from his famous haleem, Mama also serves a signature chicken soup with wonton that has people coming back for more. But here's the catch: Mama has a quirky rule—he won't serve anyone until he is inside and seated. So, if you are unlucky, you will end up waiting outside, watching people enjoy their meal while you twiddle your thumbs and pray for them to leave. And let me tell you, waiting can get pretty frustrating!

A customer, clearly fed up, shouted, "Why don't you get a bigger shop, Mama? Koto khon daray thaka jay?" (How long do I have to wait?) Mama responded without missing a beat, "Bharar teka den Mama,

dokan baraitasi! (Give me the rent; I'll expand the shop!)"

Mama's response got me choking on my own laughter, and I was about to spill my haleem on me.

Finally, when Mona Mama got some time off from serving, he opened up about the quail egg idea. Well, that was not quite opening up. Honestly, I was expecting some deep, dramatic backstory. But no, Mama just casually dropped it, like it was no big deal: "One fine morning, I just thought—quail egg on my haleem!"


And that was it. No grand speech, no big reveal. Just an idea that popped into his head! Disappointing, right?







DHAKA'S "FOKINNI BAZAR"

Where every taka matters

Amid the relentless rhythm of trains rumbling past, a different symphony of life plays out every day near the rail line of Tejkunipara. Here, an unassuming kitchen market, "Fokinni Bazar" has been thriving for years. You may ask, why such a name? It is because the market is a lifeline for many — from day labourers to garment workers and here, the city's less privileged stretch their hard-earned money in ways unimaginable elsewhere.

The Tk 10 economy

"You can even buy grocery items worth Tk 10," says Md Elias, who owns a shop at Fokinni Bazar and has been a chicken trader for three years. "Sometimes people cannot afford to buy a whole chicken; so, they

buy gizzards and livers at a lower price. You can even buy cooking oil and lentils for Tk 10 or 20 too!"

The market's defining feature is its inclusivity. Here, even the smallest of budgets is welcome. With as little as Tk 10, one can walk away with a handful of vegetables, a piece of fish, or even cooking oil. It's a place where even the poorest can shop with dignity, finding ways to feed their families without feeling excluded.

This hyper-affordability creates a sense of community among the buyers. Vendors, many of whom share similar economic struggles, often show leniency, offering a little extra to a familiar face or a known neighbour. Take a walk around the market, it will appear to you like a microcosm where empathy thrives amidst adversity.

Waste not, want not

What sets Fokinni Bazar apart is its unique inventory. Vendors here do not stock

glossy, picture-perfect produce. Instead, they specialise in salvaging the unwanted. They scour stockpiles from larger markets, collecting vegetables deemed unfit

"We pick up what

Operating along the railway tracks comes with its own set of risks. Trains barrel through the market multiple times every day, their thunderous presence forcing vendors and buyers to halt their activities momentarily and clear the

Despite the obvious dangers, the market persists. The proximity to the tracks is not just a matter of convenience but a necessity born out of limited options. For many vendors and buyers, moving elsewhere is simply not feasible. The tracks, therefore, become both a lifeline and a tightrope.

With that said, the vendors of Fokinni Bazar are unsung heroes and many of them are women who juggle their roles as breadwinners and caregivers, their resilience etched into their weathered faces.

They rise before dawn, source their goods from various corners of the city, and spend long hours under the



to ensure that nothing goes to waste. Buyers, in turn, embrace this ethos out of necessity and practicality. In a world where food waste runs rampant, Fokinni Bazar emerges as an unlikely hero, proving that one person's discard can be another's treasure.

A market of necessity

Fokinni Bazar is no sprawling, organised grocery hub. Instead, it is a makeshift haven of affordability, operating on the fringes, both literally and metaphorically. Vendors set up their stalls on either side of the railway tracks, their precarious positions mirroring the unstable lives of their patrons.




scorching sun or drenching rain, all to make a modest living. Begum remarks, "For us, every piece of vegetable matter, no matter how bruised or wilted they are. No one here feels any shame in buying them."

In the grand mosaic of Dhaka's urban life, Fokinni Bazar occupies a tiny, unassuming tile. But its impact is immeasurable, feeding not just the bodies but the spirits of those who rely on it. It is a place where waste finds worth, and every Tk 10 carries the weight of survival, resilience, and dignity.
