

PADDY ON TOBACCO LAND

Aman output on decline

Farmer Soleman Ali of Baninagar village in Kaliganj upazila has a total 11 bighas of agricultural land.

For the last 25 years, the 60-year-old has been cultivating tobacco on eight bighas of land, during the tobacco season, and other crops on the remaining three bighas.

But during Aman season, he brings his entire 11 bighas under paddy cultivation.

While talking to this correspondent, Soleman said this year he got 44 maunds of Aman paddy from three bighas land, where other crops are grown, while he yielded 81 maunds of paddy from eight bighas, previously

used for tobacco farming.

"Land previously used for tobacco cultivation giving significantly less production, compared to the land that produces other food crops such as paddy, wheat or vegetables round the year," Soleman said.

Tobacco plants absorb a lot of nutrients from the soil, hindering its fertility, and hampers production of other crops including paddy and vegetables, he said, adding that it takes at least seven to eight years to improve the soil quality of the land used for tobacco farming.

Another farmer Maqbul Hossain of Sarpukur village in Aditmari upazila shared the similar experience and said, "Of my eight bighas land, I brought

five bighas under tobacco farming last season."

"Later in the year, I cultivated Aman paddy on entire eight bighas, but compared to the other three bighas of land, I got four maunds less yield from the five bighas used for tobacco cultivation," he added.

Echoing the same, Narayan Chandra Barman, another grower of the village, said local farmers opted to grow tobacco instead of other crops as many tobacco companies encourage them with lucrative offers and buy their products at a fixed price.

According to Department of Agricultural Extension (DAE), tobacco is being cultivated on about 12,000 to 13,000 hectares of land in all the upazilas of

Lalmonirhat every year, but due to its lucrative profit more farmers are gradually turning towards tobacco cultivation now.

Omar Farooq, Aditmari upazila agriculture officer, said usually, farmers get 14 to 15 maunds of paddy from each bigha of land, but the harvest drops to 10 to 11 maunds in terms of the land previously used for tobacco cultivation.

Repeated cultivation of tobacco on the same land reduces the soil fertility and become less productive for other food crops like paddy and vegetables, he said, adding that they were trying to discourage farmers from tobacco farming by raising awareness campaigns regarding its harmful aspects.

However, the victim's family kept insisting on returning home, and even though police tried to convince them to stay at the hospital overnight, the victim was taken home yesterday morning, claimed the ASP.

Protesting the rape incident, leaders and activists of Chhatra Union, Jubo Union, and Udichi brought out a torchlight procession from central Shaheed Minar and marched through the main roads of Cox's Bazar town before gathering at the old Shaheed Minar for a short protest rally.

Addressing the rally, Sourav Dev, general secretary of Udichi's

officers must strictly adhere to the law and should not act on orders that violate legal boundaries, even if they come from him.

The term "Bhater Hotel" gained traction on social media after former DB additional commissioner H a r u n - O - R - R a s h i d introduced the practice of serving meals to detainees or visitors and shared the photos online.

He also said there were no irregularities in the recently-concluded sub-inspector recruitment tests, adding, "Even if I ever engage in corruption, expose me publicly but ensure the news is fact-based."

Jahangir expressed gratitude to the media for honest reporting, saying it has countered much of the misinformation spread by the Indian media.

"When the media reports truthfully, it helps us take action more effectively."

Responding to another question, he said incidents of mugging have increased, "but law enforcers are making regular arrests of muggers".

About the torture of Bangladeshi expatriates in Libya for ransom, he urged victims to report the incidents to help the authorities concerned to take legal action.

Regarding recent abductions along the Teknaf border, the adviser blamed the instability in Myanmar behind such incidents and said all abducted individuals have been rescued.

"The Arakan Army has taken control along the Myanmar side of the Teknaf border. There is no law and order there. We are contacting both the parties [Myanmar government and Arakan Army] but there is no scope to sit with them.... Our border is secure and under our control."

He added that significant amounts of drug consignments are still arriving in Bangladesh as agents of Abdur Rahman Bodhi, who topped multiple government lists of Yaba traders, are still active.

injured in a shooting attack on a car and bus near the town of Kedumim in the Israeli-occupied West Bank, Israel's national ambulance service Magen David Adom (MDA) said.

Israeli Army Radio said the military had imposed a cordon around all villages in the area to search for the suspects, who it believes fled to a nearby Palestinian village.

Separately, two Palestinians, including a 17-year-old boy, were killed by Israeli forces in the occupied West Bank on Sunday, according to the Palestinian Fatah party and the Palestinian Health Ministry.

Major gas price hike

the BERC like the ousted Awami League government used to.

The AL government curtailed the BERC's power as regulator and increased the gas price for industries by more than 150 percent by themselves and fixed it at Tk 30 per unit. The gas price for captive users was also increased several times.

Between July and September 2024, Petrobangla imported a total of 1,726 million cubic meters of LNG for Tk 10,979 crore. The per cubic meter cost of LNG during that period was Tk 63.58, and after including all additional charges, the final cost per unit reached Tk 75.72.

The move to initiate the gas price hike comes as the ministry looks to narrow the fiscal gap of Tk 16,162 crore this fiscal year.

If the price is not increased, the government will have to come up with subsidies, the proposal said.

BERC chairman Jalal Ahmed told The Daily Star that they are yet to start work on the proposal.

"We will take a decision based on our standard operating procedure," he said.

As per the BERC procedures, they have to announce their decision within the next 90 days. They will also hold public hearings within this time frame.

The new gas pricing structure could dampen enthusiasm for establishing new industries as the increased costs may make the ventures less economically viable, according to businesspeople.

"If the proposal is accepted, industrialisation will come to a halt," said Mohammad Hatem, president of the Bangladesh Knitwear Manufacturers and Exporters Association, a major industrial gas user.

No new investment will come as the new units would not be able to compete with existing establishments with that much higher gas prices, he added.

Economy slows to 1.81%

"Earlier, it was seen that despite political unrest like hartals and blockades and transport shutdowns, economic growth was shown higher," said Selim Raihan, executive director of the South Asian Network on Economic Modelling, a think tank.

Political disruption was a major reason behind the tepid GDP growth as it affected all sectors, said Zahid Hussain, a former lead economist of the World Bank's Dhaka office.

Because of industrial unrest in Gazipur, Ashulia and other areas, many garment factories couldn't operate for days, which affected the manufacturing sector.

Besides, the services sector grew by 1.54 percent compared with the 5.07 percent recorded for the first quarter of last fiscal year.

At least four to five factors were behind the low growth, said Mustafizur Rahman, a distinguished fellow at the Centre for Policy Dialogue.

"After the political changeover, many businesspersons left the country, while others got caught up in trouble. Their factories and businesses couldn't function properly."

This affected industrial production and business activities.

"Political instability, natural disasters, industrial unrest combined with high inflation also led to a problem of reduced demand."

High inflation has

decreased people's purchasing power noticeably.

"As a result, even if things were normal, demand and business activities would still have been negatively impacted."

This had a particularly negative effect on the services sector, said Hussain, who was part of the 12-member committee that prepared a white paper on the Bangladesh economy.

"So, all these factors combined to define the first quarter. Yet, despite everything, the fact that there's still around 1.8 percent growth in this quarter, which, I think, is very good news," he added.

Due to flood in August, agricultural production was negatively affected, said Raihan, also a professor at the University of Dhaka's economics department.

In the first quarter, agricultural output rose just 0.16 percent compared to 0.35 percent a year earlier.
