Abul Mansur Ahmad's death anniversary today

Today is the 46th death anniversary of Abul Mansur Ahmad, a renowned litterateur, journalist, and politician of the sub-continent. He passed away in 1979.

One of the greatest satirists of Bangla literature, he was also a pioneer of modern and progressive journalism. He worked for prominent newspapers such as Krishak, Nabajug, Sultan, and Mohammadi, and was editor of the Kolkata based Daily Ittehad from 1946 to 1948.

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Large crowds thronged the outpatient department at Dhaka Medical College Hospital yesterday, as many patients sought consultations and tests ahead of returning to their villages for Eid.

Pave path for a democratic government

Rizvi calls upon chief adviser

BNP senior joint secretary general Ruhul Kabir Rizvi yesterday called upon Chief Adviser Dr Muhammad Yunus to ensure an impartial election and pave the way for a democratic government.

"The people believe that under the leadership of Chief Adviser Dr Yunus, a free and fair election will take place," he said while addressing an event in the capital.

"As long as you remain in power, you must ensure an impartial election and hand over power to the people's representatives. The public deeply trusts this process. But if there is any delay, it will take a different turn," he added.

Rizvi also accused advisers of the interim government of attempting to create a division between the long-standing anti government movement and the recent July-August uprising and prolong the interim government's tenure.

"One of your advisers told students that if the country continues to be run this way for the next five years, it will be much better. Does that mean elections are unnecessary?" he asked.

Addressing the same event, BNP standing committee member Selima Rahman urged the chief adviser to uphold his image as a beacon of peace by ensuring a fair election and restoring stability in the country.

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DEATH IN CUSTODY Ensure fair, impartial investigation: MSF

Manabadhikar Shongskriti Foundation (MSF) has called for an immediate, impartial, and fair investigation into the death of a murder suspect -- Hezaz Bin Alam, also known as Ezaz -- in police custody.

The rights organisation also urged that those responsible be held accountable and face legal action to ensure justice.

In a press statement issued yesterday, MSF said the death of an individual in police custody is a matter of grave concern.

The organisation emphasised that all custodial deaths require thorough investigations, as they raise serious public concerns.

The state has a legal obligation to ensure the safety of individuals in custody, said the statement, signed by rights activist and MSF Founding President Sultana Kamal.

Ezaz, 37, died at Dhaka Medical College Hospital on Saturday, just hours after detectives detained him from the Japan-Bangladesh Friendship Hospital in Jigatola, Dhanmondi, where he was undergoing treatment.

An inquest report prepared on Sunday by Sheikh Kader Ahmed, a sub-inspector at Mohammadpur Police Station, in the presence of an executive magistrate, documented dark bruises on Ezaz's back, handcuff marks on his wrists, and additional bruises on his thighs, buttocks, and swollen legs.

Ezaz's father, Shah Alam, claimed his son was taken by a joint forces team from Mohammadpur's Baroikhali area on March 10 and tortured at a nearby camp before being handed over to Mohammadpur police early on March 11.

According to police, an army team arrested Ezaz and then handed him over to police on March 11 as his name was found in a murder case.

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Visa suspension puts Umrah pilgrims in limbo

Several thousand Umrah pilgrims and hajj agencies are facing major disruptions as the Saudi government has almost completely stopped issuing Umrah visas without prior notice.

This sudden decision has left thousands of pilgrims stranded, while many travel agencies are facing huge losses, said the Hajj Agencies Association of Bangladesh (HAAB).

The abrupt policy change has created uncertainty for those planning to perform umrah.

Many Bangladeshi pilgrims are now in limbo due to the visa situation.

Amid this situation, the Religious Affairs Ministry will hold a press conference on Umrah visas at its office at the Secretariat office today.

The Saudi government had opened Umrah visas through the Nusuk app, allowing millions of pilgrims to travel.

However, due to overcrowding, particularly in Makkah and Madinah, visa issuance has been reduced by 90 percent, sources at the ministry said.

This situation is not limited to Bangladesh, as other countries are also facing similar issues.

According to ministry sources, Saudi Arabia is currently seeing a lot of visitors, more than it sees even during the Hajj season, making it difficult for people to worship properly.

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The Saudi government may have temporarily halted visa issuance due to the overwhelming number of pilgrims during Ramadan, they added.

Farid Ahmed Majumder, secretary general of HAAB, said around 45,000 to 50,000 Bangladeshis travel to Saudi Arabia for Umrah during Ramadan.

"The sudden visa halt has put these people in uncertainty," he said, adding that many have already purchased airline tickets and booked hotels, which has put them in trouble.

"In previous years, Saudi authorities informed us in advance before reducing or stopping visa issuance, but this time, they didn't give any prior notice," he added.

Farid also mentioned that around 30,000 to 33,000 Bangladeshis have already bought air tickets for Umrah.

The Religious Affairs Ministry has already written to the Saudi ambassador expressing concerns but has not yet received a response.

Regarding ticket refunds, a ministry official said they are in contact with the respective airlines to ensure refunds.

Unlike Hajj, there is no formal agreement between Bangladesh and Saudi Arabia for Umrah.

Man gets life term over rape in Dhaka 5 sent to jail, 2 arrested in 3 districts on same charges

A Dhaka tribunal yesterday sentenced a 22-year-old man to life-term imprisonment for raping a seven-year-old girl in South Keraniganj in 2014.

Judge Munshi Md Mashiar Rahman of Women and Children Repression Prevention Tribunal-4 of Dhaka delivered the verdict in presence of the lone convict, Md Arshad.

The tribunal also fined him Tk 1 lakh, in default of which he will have to serve one year more in jail. Meanwhile, at least five people were sent to jail and two others were arrested yesterday over rape charges in three districts.

In Jashore, a youth was arrested on charge of raping a woman keeping her four-year-old child at knife-point at their home.

The accused is Hasan Ali, 18, from Sadar upazila, said Babul Hossain, OC of Jashore Kotwali Station. While leaving the scene, Hasan also stabbed the woman and the child, according to the case.

In another incident, four Jatiyatabadi Chhatra Dal (JCD) leaders allegedly gangraped an 18-year-old girl in the district on Sunday.

A court sent Al Mamun Hossain, 20, is general secretary of Gadkhali union unit of JCD; Yasin Arafat, 21, office secretary; Jaber Hossain, 22, executive member; and Amirul Islam, 20, activist, to jail yesterday, said Jhikargachha Police Station OC Bablur Rahman Khan.

Ashrafal Alam Rana, Jhikargachha upazila JCD convener, said the four were expelled from their organisational positions.

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A DAY IN COURT

Shajahan's smirk finally fades

The smirk was still there as Shajahan Khan stepped out of the Dhaka Chief Metropolitan Magistrate's Court lockup. His lips curled into the familiar expression that had become his signature -- whether in moments of controversy, tragedy, or now, as an accused in a murder case.

But the confidence that once fuelled it seemed to waver.

At 10:08am, he silently stood in the dock, a stark contrast to his earlier demeanour in the holding area, as he was usually seen chatting and laughing before.

The prosecution argued for a five-day remand, linking him to the death of Rafiqul Islam in Badda on July 19 last year.

During the hearing, Shajahan raised his hand, trying to get Dhaka Metropolitan Magistrate MA Azharul Islam's attention. No response. He tried again -- nothing. Only after his lawyers had spoken did the court permit him to speak. "Honourable court, please give me some time to speak. I want to say something," he began.

With permission granted, his tone

turned pleading. "The public prosecutor mentioned that police fired shots during the movement. Such an order can only be given by senior police officials. I cannot order them to fire. I am not involved. Why was this case filed against me? Not only me, my son Asibur Rahman has also been accused. He is now in jail."

Then, before the packed courtroom, Shajahan Khan broke into tears.

"I am getting old. I haven't seen my son... What did my son do? While I stayed in Dhaka, he was in Madaripur. You can check this right now!" His voice cracked as he wiped his eyes with tissue paper.

The judge remained impassive. "Your lawyer has already spoken on your behalf."

But Shajahan wasn't done. Folding his hands, he begged for more time. "They [lawyers] could not explain the matter properly. Local Sirajul chairman is accused in six murder cases. I was not on his side. That is why this case has been filed against me as part of a conspiracy."

At 10:37am, the magistrate delivered his ruling -- a four-day remand.
