

China, India  
may seek to  
meddle in  
polls: Canada

China and India are likely to try to interfere in the Canadian general election on April 28, while Russia and Pakistan have the potential to do so, the country's spy service said on Monday.

The Canadian Security Intelligence Service made its comments at a time when Ottawa's relations with both India and China are chilly.

Beijing and New Delhi have denied previous allegations of interference.

Canada was slow in responding to efforts by China and India to interfere in the 2019 and 2021 elections but their outcomes were unaffected by the meddling, an official probeconcluded in a final report released in January.

central Syria

Kill four people in south

Israeli shelling killed four people in southern Syria yesterday, Syria's state news agency reported, after the Israeli military said its troops had clashed with militants there who had opened fire on them.

The violence along the border area marks increased friction between Israel and Syria, where a new Islamist-led leadership has been installed after rebels ousted former leader Bashar al-Assad from power in December.

Israel has since said it will not tolerate an Islamist militant presence in southern Syria. Syria's leadership has said it does not intend to open a front against Israel. Yesterday, the Israeli military said militants in southern Syria opened fire toward Israeli troops, without specifying whether the Israeli troops were within Syrian territory when they were targeted.

The Israeli military said its troops returned fire and that an Israeli warplane struck the militants. It gave no details on casualties but said "hits were identified". Syria's state news agency said Israeli tank fire on Koya, a town in the southern province of Daraa, had killed four people and wounded others, including a woman.

YEMEN WAR SECURITY BREACH

Trump backs national  
security adviser

White House promises to probe, criticises journo

President Donald Trump yesterday expressed support for his national security adviser, Michael Waltz, after a magazine journalist said on Monday that Waltz had accidentally included him in a discussion of highly sensitive war plans on the messaging app Signal.

"Michael Waltz has learned a lesson, and he's a good man," Trump told NBC News in a phone interview.

US senators were set to grill Trump's top intelligence officials on Tuesday about the apparent breach, which triggered outrage and disbelief among Democrats and national security experts.

Jeffrey Goldberg, editor-in-chief of The Atlantic, said in a report on Monday that Waltz unexpectedly added him on March 13 to an encrypted chat group on the Signal messaging app coordinating US action against the Yemen rebel group over its attacks on Red Sea shipping.

National Security Council spokesperson Brian Hughes said the chat group appeared to be authentic. The White House said it was looking into how Goldberg's number was added

to the thread.

Democrats - and some Republicans - called for an investigation of what appeared to be a major security breach. Classified and sensitive information is not supposed to be shared on commercial mobile phone apps, and unknown numbers should not be included.

Members of the Senate Intelligence Committee were to question two of the administration officials on the chat - Director of National Intelligence Tulsi Gabbard and CIA Director John Ratcliffe - on Tuesday during the panel's annual hearing.

In his opening statement, Senator Mark Warner, the Democratic vice chairman of the intelligence committee, said a military or intelligence officer who took similar action would be fired.

"Yesterday, we stunningly learned that senior members of this administration, and according to reports, two of our witnesses here today, were members of a group chat that discussed highly sensitive and likely classified information that supposedly even included weapons packages, targets and timing and included the name of an active CIA agent," he said.

CIVIL WAR ABUSES

UK sanctions  
ex-Sri Lankan  
commanders

Britain on Monday imposed sanctions on three former senior Sri Lankan military commanders and one former Tamil Tiger rebel commander over human rights violations during a civil war that ended in 2009.

The measures, which include bans on travelling to Britain and asset freezes, target the former chief of staff of the Sri Lankan Armed Forces, Shavendra Silva, former commander of the Navy Wasantha Karannagoda and former commander of the Army Jagath Jayasuriya.

Vinaya gamoorthy Muralitharan, known as Karuna Amman, a former commander in the Liberation Tigers of Tamil Eelam, was also sanctioned. Amman split from the LTTE before the war ended and later led a paramilitary group working for the Sri Lankan Army.

Turkish court jails 7 journos  
after anti-Erdogan protests

A Turkish court yesterday remanded in custody seven journalists for covering the mass protests that erupted following the arrest of President Recep Tayyip Erdogan's main political rival, in a crackdown that has now seen more than 1,400 people arrested.

Among the journalists placed under arrest by the Istanbul court was AFP photographer Yasin Akgul, who was seen being escorted away to jail.

Press freedom group Reporters Without Borders (RSF) denounced the move as "scandalous".

Vast crowds have hit the streets daily since the March 19 move against Istanbul's popular opposition mayor,



Ekrem Imamoglu, prompting nightly clashes with riot police that have spread across the country.

With security forces using water cannon, pepper spray and rubber bullets against protesters, the Council of Europe denounced a "disproportionate" use of force while

Human Rights Watch warned that this is a "dark time for democracy" in Turkey. Akgul, one of 10 journalists rounded up by police in dawn raids on Monday, had earlier yesterday been granted conditional release by the court along with six other journalists.

But shortly afterwards, prosecutors revised their decision and the court decided to remand them all in custody on grounds of taking part in an "illegal" protest.

"This is the first time that a clearly-identified journalist has, in the exercise of his duties, been formally arrested on the basis of this law against gatherings and demonstrations," RSF's Erol Onderoglu told AFP following the decision about Akgul, the first to be announced.
