polls: Khasru

The people of Bangladesh are ready to cast their votes and are eagerly awaiting a national election by December, said BNP Standing Committee Member Amir Khasru Mahmud Chowdhury yesterday.

“Let the people decide who supports democracy and who does not; who supports a democratic order and who doesn’t. The people are not fools – they’re observing everything closely,” he said. The BNP leader made these remarks after a meeting with leaders of the Left Democratic Alliance and the Bangladesh Jono Adhikar Party at the BNP chairperson’s office in Gulshan. Khasru said elections are essential for restoring democracy and forming a democratic government through the people’s right to vote. He stressed that the reform issues, on which consensus has already been reached, should be made public without delay. “What’s the difficulty in announcing the election date after disclosing those agreed points to the nation?” he asked. “The chief adviser has said reforms will be based on consensus. Then tell us, where that consensus has been reached?”

UAE envoy

Says HRSS report on Jan-March, suggests strengthening rule of law

If urgent steps are not taken to strengthen the rule of law, democracy, and fundamental freedoms, the country’s overall human rights situation may deteriorate further, the Human Rights Support Society (HRSS) has warned. In its quarterly report released yesterday, the rights body emphasised the need for inclusive dialogue with political parties, civil society, journalists, and citizens to improve governance and ensure constitutional rights through proper law enforcement. At least 47 people were killed and 2,475 injured in 325 incidents of political violence across the country in the first three months of this year, according to the HRSS. Most of the violent incidents were linked to struggles for supremacy, political vengeance, extortion, and attempts to control various establishments, the rights body said in its report for January-March, based on media reports and its own findings. Of the total incidents, 190 were intra-party clashes between rival factions of the BNP, while six were within the Awami League and nine within the National Citizen Party (NCP). In addition, 58 clashes occurred between BNP and AL, 16 between BNP and Jamaat-e-Islami, five between BNP and NCP, nine between AL and NCP, and three between AL and Jamaat. The remaining 29 incidents involved confrontations among other political parties. During the same period, at least 31 people were killed and 64 injured in 70 incidents of mob beatings across the country. At least 91 journalists were reportedly tortured and harassed in 67 incidents, while 24 journalists were named as accused in 10 separate cases. The report further noted that nine individuals were killed in incidents involving “gunfights,” torture by law enforcement agencies, or while in custody. Of these, three died in two reported “gunfights,” four as a result of torture, one in police custody, and

‘We must not  
let fascism  
return’

Says Prof Ali Riaz

The result of institutional weaknesses and the failure to build a democratic state over the past 53 years are the reasons behind the establishment of a fascist regime in Bangladesh, said Prof Ali Riaz, vice-chairman of the National Consensus Commission. He made the remarks at the beginning of a discussion between the commission and the Amjanata Party, at the LD Hall of the Jatiya Sangsad Bhaban in Dhaka yesterday. In his opening speech, Prof Riaz also said the aim of the commission is to develop an inclusive national charter through discussions with all stakeholders – a charter that would serve as a roadmap for the future of Bangladesh. Mahathir Hasan, an FIR-named accused in the case filed over the killing of Primeasia University student Jahidul Islam Parvez, yesterday gave his confessional statements to a Dhaka magistrate. Dhaka Metropolitan Magistrate Md Mizanur Rahman sent Mahathir to jail after recording his statements when the investigator produced him at his chamber with a police forwarding report, said a court staffer. Details of the statements could not be known immediately. On April 23, another accused Al Kamal Sheikh gave his confessional statements to the magistrate. Law enforcers have so far arrested six accused, including three FIR-named ones. On April 19, Parvez, 24, a third-year student of the university, was stabbed to death in front of the campus in Banani. The next day, his cousin, Humayun Kabir, filed the case with Banani Police Station, naming eight people, including Sobhan Niyaz Tushar, joint convener of Students Against Discrimination’s Banani thana unit, and Hriday Miazi, joint member secretary of the same unit, and accusing 25-30 unnamed individuals.

Ishraque meets CEC

BNP leader Ishraque Hossain met Chief Election Commissioner AMM Nasir Uddin yesterday, as the Election Commission awaits a legal opinion from the law ministry regarding the issuance of a gazette declaring him the mayor of Dhaka South City Corporation. Ishraque arrived at the EC headquarters in the afternoon to discuss the latest developments with the CEC. The meeting came just two days after the EC sought the law ministry’s consultation on the matter. In the 2020 DSCC election, held on February 1 of that year, Awami League candidate Sheikh Fazle Noor Taposh was declared the winner, defeating Ishraque by a margin of nearly two lakh votes. However, on March 27, 2025, a court overturned that result and declared Ishraque instead as the mayor. Nearly a month after the verdict, the EC sought

The Bangladesh Army, in coordination with other law enforcement agencies, arrested 204 individuals during joint operations conducted across the country between April 18-23. The Inter Services Public Relations (ISPR) issued a press release to inform the update yesterday. The operations were carried out by units under different infantry divisions and independent brigades of the army in Dhaka and several other districts. The arrestees include those accused in murder cases, illegal arms holders, listed criminals, smugglers, juvenile gang members, drug dealers and addicts, and members of illegal syndicates. They were handed over to local police stations for further legal procedures following preliminary interrogation, according to the release. Illegal items including 16 firearms, 410 rounds of

Demand activists on 12th anniv of Rana Plaza collapse; seek compensation for victim families

Relatives of the deceased, survivors, and labour leaders gathered at the Rana Plaza site in Savar yesterday to mark the 12th anniversary of the tragedy and renew their calls for justice and compensation. From the early hours of the morning, mourners placed flowers at a makeshift altar erected in front of the remains of the collapsed building, where 1,136 workers were killed and more than 2,000 injured when the 10-storey structure collapsed during working hours on April 24, 2013. Survivors and their families say little has changed in the years since. Many have yet to receive adequate compensation or see justice delivered. They called for the harshest punishment for those responsible, including building owner Sohel Rana, and for the fulfilment of compensation claims.



Salma Akhter, a former garment worker who was on the eighth floor of Rana Plaza during the collapse, said, “I’m living an inhumane life. My spinal cord injury has left me unable to return to a normal existence. I’ve received nothing but a token donation.” Her story echoes those of hundreds of other survivors who continue to suffer from long-term injuries, poverty, and limited access to medical care or financial support. Rahela Begum, who lost her son Rabbi Mia in the collapse, visits the site every year to seek solace and demand accountability. “My son was murdered. I’ve cried until my tears have run dry,” she said. “We deserve justice. We demand the Tk 48 lakh compensation promised to us.” Despite years of inaction, labour leaders remain cautiously hopeful that the interim government will finally act on
