Coping with grief: How a nation heals after a tragedy

The shock came mid-afternoon on an ordinary Monday, and for countless families in Dhaka, 21 July became unforgettable. A Bangladesh Air Force F-7 BGI aircraft crashed into Milestone School and College in Uttara, killing students, teachers, and the pilot.

The tragedy struck not just a school but the collective heart of a nation. You didn't have to be a parent at Milestone to feel your breath catch. As the headlines unfolded, so did a wave of shared sorrow. Grief, suddenly, was everywhere. It was not just a personal experience, but a public one.

And for many, it reopened older wounds. Losses long buried. Questions never asked.

But how do we cope when grief arrives uninvited, without rules, timelines, or logic? How do we move forward, not just as individuals but as families, as communities, as a country?

Grief is not a straight line

We are often taught that grief comes in five neat stages: denial, anger, bargaining, depression, acceptance. However, in real life, it's far messier. Grief loops back. It quiets down only to return months or even years later.

Dr. Helal Uddin Ahmed, Professor of Child, Adolescent, and Family Psychiatry, explains that a "normal grief reaction" can last 6 to 8 weeks. "For example," he notes, "it's natural that school students will be on edge for a couple of weeks now. In fact, the entire nation is grieving. Every small mishap may trigger panic."

When those feelings persist longer, or begin to affect someone's ability to function, Acute Stress Disorder or Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) may set in. That's when professional help becomes not just helpful, but essential.



Children grieve too

It's easy to overlook how deeply children are affected after a tragedy. Some may cry, others withdraw.

Some might act out in ways that feel confusing to adults, but these behaviours are often a child's only way of expressing pain.

Ahmed cautions against dismissing their emotions with phrases like "It didn't happen to you" or "Just sleep it off." Instead, he urges adults to talk to children honestly, using age-appropriate language, and to allow space for questions, even uncomfortable ones.

For younger children, grief often comes out in play or drawing. Teenagers might show it through irritability, poor concentration, or guilt. What they need most is reassurance that their feelings are valid and that grief doesn't make them



weak or strange.

"We live in a culture where we don't talk about the dead," he reflects. "That silence makes grief heavier, especially for children."

Adults are not immune

Adults, too, are often expected to "stay strong," especially in front of children or family. We are encouraged to move on, stay busy, and focus on the positive. However, unprocessed grief finds its own ways to surface through anxiety, fatigue, emotional numbness, or sudden bursts of sadness we cannot explain.

Healing, Dr Helal Ahmed stresses, doesn't mean forgetting. It means making space: for memories, for mourning, for the gradual return to life. It may mean letting go of the idea that time heals all wounds. Some losses stay with us, but they become part of who we are, not barriers to who we can become.

The grief we carry

Some of the hardest conversations about loss are the ones that never happen, especially within families. In many homes, grief becomes the quiet shadow in the corner of the room. No one speaks of the person who's gone. Everyone tries not to make it worse.

But silence can be just as painful as the grief itself. Saying a name, recalling a memory, admitting that something still hurts — these acts can become moments of connection, especially for children who may be too afraid to speak first.

Whether it's through prayer, photos, storytelling, or simple rituals, what matters most is the willingness to acknowledge the loss. To make space for grief without judgment.

The journey towards healing

Although modern life often isolates us, community still holds power, especially in times of collective pain. True healing happens not just in therapy rooms, but in neighbourhoods, classrooms, and workplaces that offer space for softness.

After the Milestone tragedy, grief didn't just ripple through families — it struck at our sense of safety. It exposed how fragile our mental health systems still are, and how urgently we need a culture that treats psychological wounds with the same care as physical ones.

That means destigmatising therapy. Normalising conversations around fear, sadness, and guilt. And understanding that it's okay to not be okay — for both children and adults.

Healing is not linear. It doesn't happen overnight. However, it does begin — in presence. In compassion. In the radical act of listening to ourselves and each other.

“Pappu’s Art School for All” brings rickshaw painting to everyone

In the heart of Old Dhaka, where narrow streets carry the echoes of history and the city breathes through its rickshaw wheels, a quiet revolution in art education is taking place. It does not come from a university or a gallery. It comes from paint-stained hands, tin rooftops, and the stubborn belief that art belongs to everyone.

“Pappu’s Art School for All” is a grassroots initiative offering free and inclusive training in the traditional craft of rickshaw painting — a vibrant, uniquely Bangladeshi art form. The school operates out of 38 Hossaini Dalan Road in Chawkbazar and is already welcoming students every Friday and Saturday from 3 PM to 5 PM, turning the walls of Old Dhaka into living canvases of hope.

The goal? To preserve a fading cultural form while empowering underprivileged youth, differently-abled individuals, and anyone with the desire to learn, regardless of age, gender, or income.

More than art

Founder Mohammad Hanif Pappu knows what it means to dream without resources. A self-taught artist, he grew up watching the colours of rickshaws light up the streets of Dhaka.

“Our youth are wasting away in gossip and bad company,” Pappu shares. “I want them to fall in love with colour. To be addicted to a clean canvas instead of something destructive.”

With this mission, he started the school not for profit, but for purpose. His dream extends beyond the boundaries of Dhaka: “One day, I want to take this school to other countries — to show the world what our

people can create when given a brush and a little hope.”

The classes are open to all, but are completely free for those who cannot afford them. That includes children from low-income families, people with disabilities, and those often excluded from the formal education system.

“Some are passionate but poor. Some are disabled but dream big,” Pappu says. “If I can help even a few of them find purpose, then my life has meaning.”

A community effort

This is not a one-man show. The initiative is powered by community artists, many of whom have long been involved in rickshaw and cinema banner painting.

Among them are veteran names like Rafiqul Islam, Solaiman, Mohammad Shipon, Md Humayun, Abdur Rob, Abdul Karim, and Md Dulal — who now serve as mentors, passing their skills down to a new generation.

Photographer Deep Loh is also documenting this journey, preserving each



moment in frame.

The school officially launched on 1 August 2025, with a small but

passionate gathering. Guests included Mahmud Hossain Khan, a Canada-based businessman, and Tanjida Mousumi, a journalist also residing in Canada.

“Their presence gave us courage,” says co-founder Md Monir Hossain, who has worked alongside Pappu since the early planning stages. “It showed us that even from abroad, people care about our heritage.”

Monir adds, “Dhaka is known as the city of rickshaws — this art was born here. We want to ensure it lives on through everyone, not just a few. That’s why this school is for all: children, the elderly, students, and professionals. Everyone.”

Looking forward

While the school currently operates on limited resources, Pappu and his team remain hopeful. “If we get help from government bodies, NGOs, or even the European Union, we could expand this,” he says. “I don’t want anything for myself. I just want to keep working with the youth. Maybe through them, I’ll live on in their brushstrokes.”

At a time when tradition is increasingly replaced by trends and machines, Pappu’s Art School for All stands as a reminder: art is not just for the privileged. It’s for anyone willing to learn, and anyone who still believes that a splash of colour can change a life.

And in a quiet corner of Chawkbazar, it already is.

WHEN ART WALKS AMONG US

A collaboration between Manas and Bipasha Hayat

It is not often that fashion designers collaborate with artists to create wearable art, but when Faiza Ahmed, of Manas fame, worked with Bipasha Hayat, something magical came into being. She has woven conceptual art form into the folds of high fashion, creating a series of sarees that speak a new language and move our thoughts. In her latest work, “Cast My Vote for Socrates’ Acquittal”, the two have made a successful collaboration, and it seems that in very simple terms, Ahmed dares to ask, “What if art didn’t just hang on walls, but walked among us?”

Inspired by reflection

For over 15 years, Manas, as a brand, has been building bridges between fashion and fine arts. She has brought artworks by giants of the Bangladeshi art world like Zainul Abedin and Quamrul Hassan, and reimagined iconic imageries onto wearable forms.

The inspiration for the latest series comes from the celebrated conceptual artwork by Bipasha Hayat, which was done for the project FUTURE OF HOPE, during the upheaval of the COVID-19 pandemic, with the support of Durjoy Bangladesh Foundation.

At that time, the death of George Floyd in the USA made headline news, and Hayat saw the mass agitation take form in front



of her through the window of her Brooklyn apartment. She researched and found that both Floyd and Socrates shared the same fate — a remarkable similarity, as both their deaths were caused by human rage. It raised questions about equality and freedom in the artist’s mind.

Based on that feeling, Hayat felt an urge to represent that connection in her multidimensional artwork, and the recent collaboration is, in reality, an extrapolation of that very thought.

Faiza Ahmed shared, “Art is not always a visual piece, or a matter of aesthetics. It often speaks the inner thoughts of the artists. And Manas always strives to find that

link between artists and their creations.

“I have worked with images from Bipasha Hayat’s paintings and presented them on sarees. Along with lines from Bipasha Hayat herself with her signature, there is a quote in Italian by a celebrated art historian and educator, Giovanna Brambilla, who found out about Hayat’s work and included it in her recent book, where she talked about this particular work.”

Ahmed added, “People can wear it as an extensive stonework and also a saree with calligraphy.”

Rooted in mutual respect

Bipasha Hayat expressed her deep

admiration for Faiza Ahmed’s work, which is a result of research and keen observation.

She said, “Working with Faiza has been a wonderful journey. For years, Faiza Ahmed has painstakingly brought art and artists onto her subject, which is designing clothes, and I thank her for this endeavour and the attempt to bring fine art in wearable form. However, what is more important is that bringing fine art aesthetics to the common man in the best possible way, and Faiza Ahmed deserves kudos for all the research, knowledge and passion for doing that and most of all for the acknowledgement of my work.”

A soulful launch

On the evening of 21 July 2025, the collaborative effort of Manas and Bipasha Hayat was inaugurated through a private launch, where Durjoy Rahman, founder of DBF, was also present. It was a soulful evening wrapped in meaning, creativity, and respect for art and artists.

In a world increasingly driven by mass replication, this collaboration stands apart for its depth and deliberateness. It reminds us that fashion can be more than beautiful — it can be soulful. And perhaps that is the quiet triumph of the Faiza Ahmed and Bipasha Hayat collection.

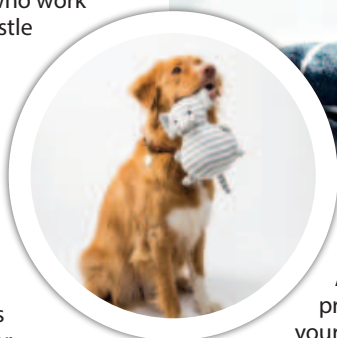
Managing time for pets

From hundreds of submissions, 30 couples were shortlisted by Berger's creative agency, Creato BD, under the direction of industry Veteran Rashid Khan — whose name spans iconic campaigns like CloseUp 1 and Lux Channel I Superstar. The glam department was led by Afroza Parveen, owner of RED beauty salon, and actress and host, Samia Afreen.

"We didn't do this campaign just to be different," he said. "We did it because this is what these stories deserved. The photo shoot was important, yes, but so were the real memories, the real emotions behind them. Berger was exceptionally brave in trusting this vision."

The top 15 couples were invited to an event at Six Seasons Hotel at the end of January. It was an ice-breaking session, with a small shoot to understand each couple's dynamic. The final five were selected by a grand jury: actress Bidya Sinha Mim, musician Partho Barua, and

filmmaker Amitabh Reza. The journey, filled with stunning visuals and personal moments, later received a grand premiere at Star Cineplex, Centre Point, where the entire campaign was celebrated with flair.

"Selecting the top 5 from the 15 was a wild ride," Mim laughed. "We genuinely loved every single couple. And this campaign felt like a story captured in time. Honestly, I've told my husband, I loved this more than our own honeymoon in the Maldives!"

Twinkle was refreshingly candid about what many assume of such campaigns: "You often hear these things are fixed or given through inside references. That clearly wasn't the case here. It was incredibly luxurious and glamorous — something many people wouldn't even imagine having access to."

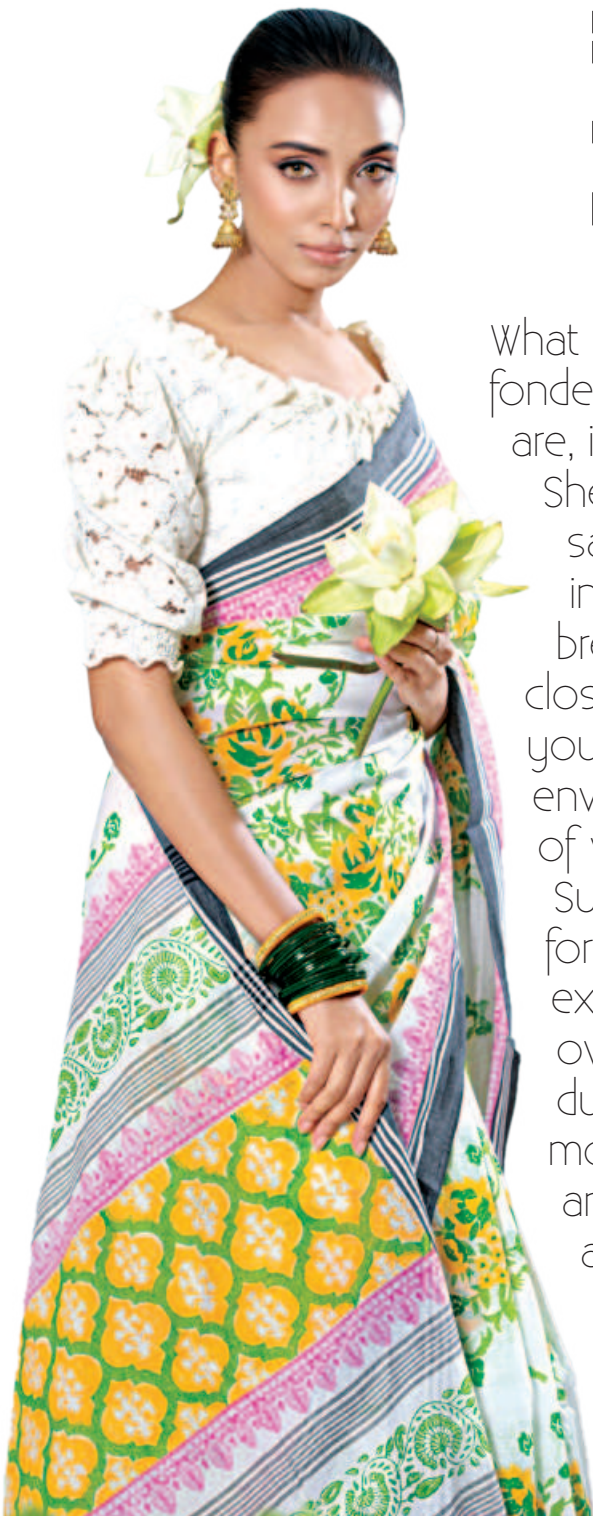

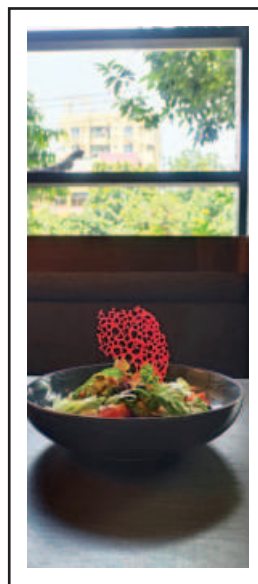
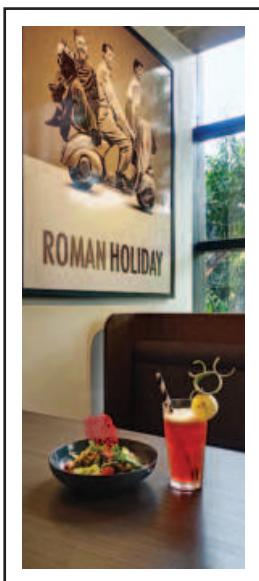

HOUSE CAFÉ

rekindles Dhaka's café culture of the past



Some cafés beg to be photographed, and then there are a few rare ones that make you sit down, breathe, and stay a while. House Café does not try to dazzle. It doesn't want to be your next Instagram backdrop. What it does, rather successfully, is revive a mood, a whisper of the '70s and '80s, when café culture was not curated for virality but for comfort, conversation, and the occasional pause.

Tucked away in Dhanmondi, House Café is a slow-burner. You feel it in the lighting, warm, soft, with no sharp white glares trying to sterilise your thoughts. The décor does not shout either; it murmurs. Embracing what the founders call "quiet luxury", the interior of the café has a minimalist approach that feels anything but cold.

Displaying monochromatic portraits of some of the most celebrated films, outfitted with simple lines of furniture, and stylistically furnished with textural variety, the entirety of the space reads as intentionally designed rather than haphazard.

After a year and a half of trial and error, the founders arrived at a small, small and thoughtful menu. They took a little initial quiet inspiration, mostly from Mediterranean, Spanish, and Mexican cuisines, and while they are not really overly experimental nor aggressively traditional, they made it all fit in with the client's parameters.

The shrimp aglio olio is as straightforward as it sounds but comes with enough garlic and bite to make you sit up. The roast beef sandwich, on the other hand, is a rich, satisfying meal disguised in simple packaging. For lighter affairs, the chocolate croissant is already becoming a bit of a favourite — buttery, flaky, and not cloyingly sweet. If you are leaning towards dessert, the vanilla milk cake with pistachios deserves your attention.

The drinks menu is not a secondary thought either. The iced lemon tea feels rejuvenating, especially when paired with the croissant. For the coffee addicts, the classic café latte is clean, no fuss, no burnt beans masquerading as coffee.

What's perhaps most refreshing

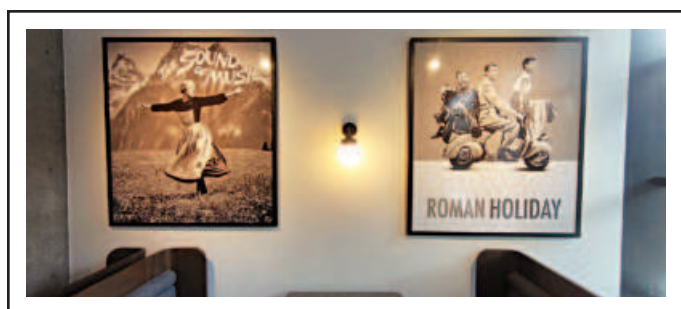
about House Café is its refusal to follow the noise. While many eateries in Dhaka sprint to ride trends and seasonal fads, House Café moves with its tempo. And it appears to be catching on. With one

location established in Gulshan 2 and another arriving in Tejgaon, there is expansion taking place (not fast, but slow and meaningful).

In a city that could sometimes use a pause, House Café reminds us that not everything has to be an immediate, loud, intensive haul

from a hundred choices. Sometimes the best places are the ones that take time and encourage you to take your time.

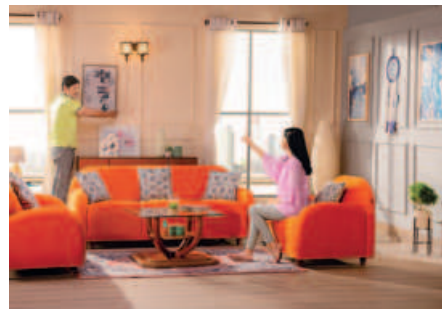
A newlywed's guide to choosing the perfect sofa
