Commuters suffer for suspension of trains

Thousands of low-income passengers and small-scale traders in the Sylhet region are suffering from a prolonged disruption in three local train services along the Sylhet Akhaura railway route, with only one train in operation.

For daily wage earners, vegetable vendors, and fish traders, the absence of reliable rail transport has increased travel costs and put livelihoods at risk, forcing many to depend on expensive and overcrowded road transport.

The once-busy route is now served only by the Surma Mail, which itself runs irregularly with just three coaches, one of which is reserved for the postal department.

At one time, the Sylhet Akhaura

route was served by multiple local and intercity trains, including the Jalalabad Express on the Sylhet-Chittagong line, the Kushiyara Express and a DEMU train – all now inactive. The Jalalabad Express was suspended during the pandemic, the DEMU was discontinued in 2019 due to mechanical issues, and the Kushiyara Express has not run for nearly four years.

The three local trains remain suspended due to a shortage of engines, coaches, and manpower, said Kulaura Junction Station Master Roman Ahmed.

Gias Uddin, a fish importer from Sylhet, said they used to bring Chandpur hilsa and sea fish from Chittagong by train at a much lower cost. "The closure of the Jalalabad Express has hit us hard.

Road transport is expensive and less reliable," said Gias.

Regular commuters such as Sipon Khan of Langla, Fakhr Uddin of Monu and Nazrul Islam Belal of Bhatera said road travel has increased both costs and travel time, particularly affecting day labourers and working-class families.

"Earlier we could travel for Tk 30-40. Now it costs over Tk 100, not to mention the delays," said Sipon.

Contacted, Sylhet Akhaura Railway Traffic Inspector Shahjahan Patwary said the delay in restarting local trains is due to a shortage of engines, coaches, and drivers.

"Several letters have been sent to the higher authorities in this regard. Hopefully, they will take action soon," he said.

Other reasons included the movement of slow vehicles on highways, reckless motorcycle riding by young people, lack of awareness about traffic laws among road users, and weak traffic management, it said.

The foundation made 10 recommendations to reduce accidents and deaths. These include producing skilled drivers, fixing drivers' salaries and working hours, enhancing the capacity of the Bangladesh Road Transport Authority, properly enforcing traffic laws, removing slow-moving vehicles from highways, building separate service roads for them, and fully implementing the Road Transport Act 2018.

FROM PAGE 3 acquitted all 49 accused, including Tarique and Babar, scrapping the trial court verdicts that had earlier convicted and sentenced them in connection with the grenade attack on an Awami League rally in 2004.

The acquittal came following hearings on death references and appeals filed by several convicts.

Later the state filed the appeals with the Appellate Division seeking to overturn the HC decision.

Promote sustainability

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Speakers said the Grand Bargain commitment was adopted in Istanbul in May 2016 at the World Humanitarian Summit and signed by around 70 parties, including donor countries, UN agencies, and INGOs, to advance humanitarian action.

Its objectives include localisation of aid, quality funding for local national actors, and accountability to affected populations – issues that are more important than ever, as USAID fund cuts have already affected the developing world, speakers also said.

With Bangladesh set to graduate from LDC status, its access to soft loans and trade privileges from developed countries will be curtailed, they added.

Md Iqbal Uddin of COAST Foundation said while Grand Bargain 3.0 is set to conclude in 2026,

progress remains limited.

He urged donors and aid organisations to fulfil their commitments by ensuring at least 25 percent direct funding to local actors, providing multi-year and flexible funding, ensuring mutual accountability, and supporting local leadership.

Shameen Anam, executive director of Manusher Jonno Foundation, said accountability and transparency apply equally to donors and implementing organisations, underscoring the importance of ensuring that aid reaches the right beneficiaries.

Gawher Nayem Wahra of Disaster Forum stressed that localisation is not only about funding but also about the localisation of resources.

Referring to a study, Sudhanshu S Singh of Humanitarian Aid International in India said only 6 percent of funding

currently reaches local actors directly.

He urged stronger support for the local actors.

Abdul Awal of Noakhali Rural Development Society cautioned that aid cuts put local actors at greater risk.

He stressed preparation for unforeseen crises and negotiating better terms with donors.

Matilda Svensson, first secretary at the Embassy of Sweden in Bangladesh, highlighted that Sweden and SIDA already provide 25 percent direct funding to local and national actors, fulfilling the Grand Bargain commitment.

She emphasised the need for signatories to build equitable partnerships and avoid subcontracting in the development sector.

Rezaul Karim Chowdhury, executive director of the COAST Foundation, moderated the seminar.

MJF expresses outrage

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Among these fatalities, 133 women were killed by their husbands, 42 by in-laws, and 33 by their own family members.

Shaheen Anam, executive director of MJF, highlighted the lack of justice in society, where perpetrators commit such crimes with impunity.

Many cases of domestic violence go unreported,

and even in extreme cases, legal action is rarely pursued, she said.

She also urged the authorities to take swift and decisive measures, review all reported cases to ensure that survivors receive justice, and ensure proper trials.

"Many women from low-income families are left trapped in violent marriages, as their parents fear social stigma and lack

the means to bring them home. Without financial security, countless women are forced to suffer abuse in silence rather than risk their children's survival," she further said. The deaths of Keya and Jamey must not fade into silence; they are a wake-up call to end impunity and safeguard the dignity, security, and rights of women in Bangladesh, the MJF statement said.

angered the families of the martyrs. However, the Ministry of Law has no involvement with this bail."

He added, "The High Court or the higher judiciary does not fall under the jurisdiction of the law ministry. Therefore, the ministry has no connection with bail or any other decision of the High Court."

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Once abundant

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"I gave up fishing two years ago and now drive a battery-run auto-rickshaw," said Binod Chandra Das, 55, from Aditmari Jelepura in Lalmonirhat. "It pains me to leave my ancestral profession, but I had no choice."

"It costs more to repair nets and boats than what we earn from fishing," said Kamlakanta Das, 60, from Rajarhat Jelepura in Kurigram.

Sulekha Das, 45, of the same village, said, "We used to eat fish every day. Now, sometimes not even once a week."

Abdul Khalek, 65, who has spent 40 years fishing in the Teesta, fears the worst.

"In monsoon I earn Tk 600-700 a day, but in the dry season, barely Tk 300. If the Teesta dies, the fish will die. And with them, so will we."

Asked about the election environment in Bangladesh, Miller said, "Well, I can see that there is an awful lot of media attention on the preparation of elections and an awful lot of political attention of course on the preparation of elections."


"... As the EU, we are determined to empower our partner Bangladesh and of course the Election Commission as it conducts these elections," he added.
