Won't accept Ducsu polls until our complaints resolved: JCD

Jatiyatabadi Chhatra Dal yesterday said they would not accept the Dhaka University Central Students' Union (Ducsu) election as legitimate until their submitted allegations were addressed. JCD said they submitted 11 complaints about polls irregularities, but the authorities have been delaying action. Their allegations include administrative bias towards a particular panel, supplying and printing ballots in its favour, not disclosing the number of used and returned ballots, barring polling agents from entering centres, use of non-transparent ballot boxes, and ballot papers without serial numbers. The Ducsu election was held on September 9. At a press conference at Madhur Canteen, held two weeks after the polls, JCD said they reported various irregularities after the announcement of the schedule, but teachers failed to resolve them and "failed to uphold the honour of trust."

In a statement, Abidul Islam Khan, JCD's VP candidate, said, "The inconsistencies, irregularities, and rigging of the 2025 Ducsu election will continue to be reviewed."

"Until the administration clarifies its position regarding a fair election, there is no scope from our side to legitimise the election," he said.

The panel alleged that ballots were supplied in favour of a specific panel, signatures were given before voter presence, and discrepancies existed between voter turnout and votes cast. Candidates also demanded the voter list and CCTV footage, but the administration took no effective measures.

JCD further said complaints regarding ballot paper issues were properly filed by multiple candidates and polling agents, but the administration did not investigate, but rather delayed with excuses.

They added that it was not disclosed which press printed the ballots, and unprotected ballots were later found in Nilkhet's Gausul Azam Market.

They also alleged that the accuracy of the vote-counting machines and software was not verified in front of voters and candidates, while the list of polling agents was published at midnight, before the polls. Many proposed agents were excluded, and some could not enter centres for not receiving ID cards on time.

As per JCD's allegations, the process of appointing polling officers was unclear, and many of them filed false complaints against candidates.

They also alleged biased roles of BNCC, Rover Scouts, and Girls' Guide members in charge of security, alongside the unrestricted entry of outsiders. Polling agents were also kept inactive during the counting of votes.

STUDENTS' UNION ELECTIONS

Ratul promises reforms, end to discrimination

35 DU researchers among world's top 2% scientists

Dhaka University has announced that 35 of its faculty members and researchers have been named among the "World's Top 2% Scientists 2025" by Stanford University and Netherlands-based publishing house Elsevier.

DU administration made the announcement through a press statement yesterday.

Last year, 10 researchers from Dhaka University featured in the list.

The global ranking is based on published papers, citations, H-index, consistency, and the impact of co-authors.

Prof Niaz Ahmed Khan, vice chancellor of the university, congratulated the faculty and researchers on their inclusion in the world's top scientists' list.

No security threat during Durga Puja

Says home adviser

There is no security threat over the Durga Puja celebrations, said Home Affairs Adviser Lt Gen (retd) Jahangir Alam Chowdhury yesterday.

"Adequate security measures have been taken at 33,000 puja mandaps across the country and members of Ansar, Police, RAB, BGB, and Army personnel will be deployed to ensure security," he said while talking to reporters after visiting the Ramakrishna Mission Puja Mandap in Narayanganj.

"CCTV cameras have been installed at all mandaps and this year's celebration will be vibrant and joyful. There is no lack of security," the adviser said.



73% of DNCC road crash victims pedestrians

Says 2023 report

Pedestrians, motorcyclists, and cyclists make up 95 percent of reported road traffic fatalities in Dhaka North City Corporation areas, according to a report.

Of the fatalities, 73 percent were pedestrians, 20 percent motorcyclists, 5 percent vehicle occupants, and 2 percent cyclists.

The report, titled "Status Summary 2024: Road Safety Risk Factors", was released under the Bloomberg Philanthropies Initiative for Global Road Safety.

The findings were unveiled at an event organised by DNCC, the Johns Hopkins International Injury Research Unit, CIPRB, and Vital Strategies at DNCC's Nagar Bhaban yesterday.

Since May 2021, JH-IIRU has been conducting studies in Dhaka north under the initiative. Presenting the findings, Dr Shirin Wadhanian of JH-IIRU said speed observations between October 2021 and November

2024 showed that 23 percent of vehicles across all categories were found to be exceeding limits based on the BRTA Speed Limit Guideline 2024.

The BRTA guideline, issued in May, set maximum speeds of 80 km/h on expressways and highways and 40 km/h on city roads.

Motorcycles topped the list of vehicles that exceeded speed limits, with 51 percent, while 29 percent of vehicles were over the limit on local and collector roads. Speeding was slightly higher on weekends, compared

to weekdays. Other risk factors identified were excessive speed, low helmet use, and lack of seatbelts and child restraints.

Despite these challenges, road fatalities in DNCC dropped from 424 in 2015 to 283 in 2023, though they rose to 456 in 2021.

The report suggested police enforce new limits with a focus on motorcycles, pickups, light trucks, and commercial vehicles.

Brig Gen Md Moin Uddin, DNCC's chief engineer, said, "Speed is a major factor in fatalities. If vehicle speed is kept under control, fatalities will go down. From PRTF, speed limit guidance came out in 2022, and we must implement it."

"Our footpaths and footbridges must be usable. Many footpaths are occupied by shops. I take this failure on myself, but I seek everyone's cooperation to clear them. If pedestrians have safe passage, fatalities will drop significantly."
