'Hasina had clear intent to kill protesters' Tajul tells ICT-1

Deposed prime minister Sheikh Hasina had a "clear and deliberate intention" to kill protesters during the July uprising by locating them with drones, opening fire from helicopters, and using lethal weapons, Chief Prosecutor Tajul Islam told the International Crimes Tribunal-1 yesterday.

Tajul made the claim while placing closing arguments for the fourth consecutive day in a case against Hasina, former home minister Asaduzzaman Khan Kamal, and ex-IGP Chowdhury Abdullah Al-Mamun, who has turned approver.

Citing Hasina's phone calls with then Dhaka South City Corporation mayor Sheikh Fazle Noor Taposh, Jatiya Samajtantrik Dal President Hasanul Haq Inu, and then Dhaka University VC Prof

Aid trucks roll into Gaza

Rafah border crossing set to reopen despite row over hostage bodies

Aid trucks rolled into Gaza yesterday and Israel resumed preparations to open the main Rafah crossing after a dispute over the return of the bodies of dead hostages that had threatened to derail the fragile ceasefire deal with Hamas.

Israel had threatened to keep Rafah shut and reduce aid supplies because

those bodies was not that of a hostage. The dispute over the return of bodies still has the potential to upset the ceasefire deal along with other major issues that are yet to be resolved.

According to Al Jazeera, the Israeli army continued sporadic attacks on Palestinians despite the ceasefire, killing at least three people in Gaza.

Later phases of the truce call for

Hamas to disarm and cede power, which it has so far refused to do. It has launched a security crackdown, parading its power in Gaza through public executions and clashes with local clans.

Longer-term elements of the ceasefire plan, including how Gaza will be governed, the make-up of an international force to take over there and moves towards the creation of a Palestinian state have yet to emerge.

Twenty-one bodies of hostages remain in Gaza, though some may be hard to find or recover because of destruction during the conflict. An international task force is

The man behind 'Tin Goyenda' passes away

Renowned author Rakib Hasan, the mind behind the beloved teen detective series "Tin Goyenda", passed away yesterday. He was 74.

He had been battling kidney complications for a while and required regular dialysis. Rakib breathed his last at Gonoshasthaya Nagar Hospital in Dhammendi after he was taken there for dialysis in the afternoon. His son, Rahid Hasan, told Prothom Alo that his father died shortly after the procedure.

Most 'pristine' star in universe discovered

Astronomers have observed a primeval star that they believe to be the most "pristine" object in the universe.



A team led by Alexander Ji at the University of Chicago said the star, named SDSS J0715-7334, offers a glimpse into the first stars that emerged shortly after the Big Bang.

The star originates from a dwarf galaxy called the Large Magellanic Cloud, which is around 163,000 light-years away from the Milky Way. It has since migrated to the Milky Way's halo, making it a "galactic immigrant", according to the researchers.

What makes it so pristine is that it is unpolluted by elements that are heavier than hydrogen and helium.

It contains just 0.8 parts per million of heavy elements, which makes it around 20,000 times purer than the Sun.

This composition means it is a likely candidate for one of the earliest stars in the universe, with astronomers previously theorising that such stars had long since exploded due to a lack of heavier elements.

US will 'impose costs' on Russia if Ukraine war doesn't end
Says US defence secy

US Defence Secretary Pete Hegseth yesterday warned Moscow that the United States and its allies would "impose costs on Russia for its continued aggression" if the war in Ukraine does not come to an end.

"If we must take this step, the US War Department stands ready to do our part in ways that only the United States can do," Hegseth said at a meeting of the Ukraine Defence Contact Group of Kyiv's allies at Nato headquarters.

Hegseth did not elaborate. His comments came as US President Donald Trump's administration is considering a request by Ukraine for long-range Tomahawk missiles.

"Now is the time to end this tragic war, stop the needless bloodshed, and come to the peace table," Hegseth said.

GLOBAL PASSPORT RANKING 2025

Bangladesh 100th out of 106

Shares spot with North Korea

Bangladesh has ranked 100th out of 106 in the global passport rankings 2025, published by the UK-based Henley & Partners on Tuesday.

According to this ranking, Bangladeshis now hold the 7th weakest passport globally.

Earlier rankings placed Bangladesh 100th in January 2025, 97th in 2024, and 101st in 2023.

According to the latest Henley Passport Index, a Bangladeshi passport allows visa-free or visa-on-arrival access to 38 destinations, placing the country alongside North Korea in the ranking.

In South Asia, Maldives holds the highest position, ranking 56th with visa-free access to 94 destinations. It is followed by India, which ranks 85th with access to 57 countries, Bhutan at 92nd with 50 destinations, and Sri Lanka at 98th with 41. Nepal and Pakistan are placed below Bangladesh, at 101st and 103rd, with visa-free access to 36 and 31 countries respectively.

At the top of the global list, Singapore retains its lead, granting visa-free access to 193 destinations, followed by South Korea.
