

G7 calls for urgent Ukraine ceasefire

Sounds alarm on Sudan crisis

G7 foreign ministers on Wednesday called for an immediate ceasefire in Ukraine and raised the alarm about the escalating crisis in Sudan, as they wrapped up a meeting in Canada.

In a joint statement, the top diplomats from Britain, Canada, France, Germany, Italy, Japan, and the United States voiced "unwavering support" for Ukraine's territorial integrity.

"An immediate ceasefire is urgently needed," the Group of Seven said.

At the talks near the famed Niagara Falls, G7 leaders discussed various options to bolster funding for Ukraine's efforts against Russia's invasion.

Israeli air strikes hit Gaza's south, north

UN chief says truce 'fragile, repeatedly violated but holding'

Israel yesterday carried out air attacks on Gaza's northern city of Beit Lahiya, eastern areas of Gaza City and the southern city of Khan Younis, where artillery shelling has also been reported.

Palestinians have been hearing the sound of explosions over the past four weeks since the ceasefire was announced and was supposed to end all acts of violence on the ground.

The Israeli military has continued to demolish and detonate many remaining residential buildings.

UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres on Wednesday described the ceasefire in Gaza as "fragile" and "repeatedly violated" while appealing for it to be respected and used to advance peace efforts.

"The ceasefire in Gaza is fragile, is repeatedly violated,

but it is holding. And I strongly appeal for the ceasefire to be fully respected and to pave the way for the negotiations of phase two, leading to the creation of the conditions for the self-determination of the Palestinian people and the creation of the two-state solution," Guterres said at a news conference at UN headquarters in New York.

US Secretary of State Marco Rubio said Wednesday he was optimistic that the UN Security Council would finalize a

resolution on Gaza that would back an international security force.

"We feel optimistic that it's going to happen," Rubio told reporters after G7 foreign ministers met in Canada.

Turkey's defence ministry said yesterday that main expectation from a planned International Stabilisation Force in Gaza is for it to provide guarantees that the fragile ceasefire will last.

Nato member Turkey has emerged as a critical player and mediator in ceasefire efforts, voicing a desire to join the stabilisation force despite Israel's repeated objections.

Meanwhile, Israeli forces yesterday rounded up at least 25 Palestinians in raids across the occupied West Bank, spanning the areas of Tulkarem, Hebron and Nablus, according to the Wafa news agency.



The statement said the scenarios discussed included "further leveraging immobilized Russian sovereign assets" held across different G7 jurisdictions -- a complex strategy that has been debated intensively within the European Union.

Ukraine's Foreign Minister Andriy Sybira -- who was invited to the talks -- had earlier told reporters that the G7 needed to increase pressure on Russia's Vladimir Putin while reinforcing Ukraine's war-making capacity.

"Putin still has an illusion that he can win," Sybira said.

"In reality, he has lost over one million soldiers and has not achieved a single strategic goal... We must make the cost of continuing this war unbearable and dangerous for Putin personally and his regime," he added.

US sanctions Myanmar armed group over cyber scam centres

The United States announced Wednesday that it was imposing sanctions on an armed Myanmar group -- alongside four of its senior leaders -- accusing them of supporting cyber scam centres that target Americans.

The action took aim at the Democratic Karen Benevolent Army (DKBA), alongside companies Trans Asia and Troth Star, for their alleged roles in helping to develop these scam centers, the US Treasury Department said.

"The revenue generated by scam

center workers -- who are often themselves victims of human trafficking -- supports organized crime and allows the DKBA to finance its harmful activities," the Treasury added.

John Hurley, the department's undersecretary for terrorism and financial intelligence, said that criminal networks operating out of Myanmar "are stealing billions of dollars from hardworking Americans through online scams."

"These same networks traffic human beings and help fuel Burma's brutal civil war," he said in a statement, warning that the

US government would continue pursuing cybercriminals.

The two firms targeted, alongside Thai national Chamu Sawang, are also linked to Chinese organized crime, the Treasury said.

The agency's move adds to earlier actions against "illicit actors" perpetrating these scams."

In May, it designated the Karen National Army as a transnational criminal organization, alongside its leader and his two sons for their "roles in facilitating human trafficking and cyber scams that harm US citizens."

Nepal protest probe bans ex-police chief from travel

Nepal imposed a travel ban on the former police chief yesterday as a government commission investigates his role in a deadly crackdown during the September uprising that toppled the government.

Chandra Kuber Khapung, who retired yesterday, was police chief during the youth-led protests that erupted on September 8.

The order "bans his foreign travel with effect from today and prevents him from leaving the Kathmandu Valley without the commission's approval", commission member Bigyan Raj Sharma said in a statement.

Khapung "will be required to appear before the commission at any time", it said.

Pakistan grants lifetime immunity to president, current army chief

Pakistan's parliament yesterday approved a sweeping constitutional amendment granting lifetime immunity to the president as well as the current army chief, a move critics warned would erode democratic checks and judicial independence.

The 27th amendment, passed by a two-thirds majority, also consolidates military power under a new Chief of Defence Forces role and establishes a Federal Constitutional Court.

The changes grant army chief Asim Munir, promoted to field marshal after Pakistan's clash with India in May, command over the army, air force and the navy.

He and other top military brass will enjoy lifelong protections. Under the amendment, any officer promoted to field marshal, marshal of the air force, or admiral of the fleet will now retain rank and privileges for life, remain in uniform, and enjoy immunity from criminal proceedings.

Such protections were previously only reserved for the head of state. "This constitutional amendment will increase authoritarianism and whatever little semblance of democracy existed in this country will fade away," said Osama Malik, an Islamabad-based lawyer. Pakistan has long struggled to balance civilian authority with the military's role in politics.

Afghan nationals carried out two suicide bombings Says Pakistan minister

Afghan nationals carried out two suicide bombings in Pakistan this week, including one in the capital Islamabad, Pakistan's Interior Minister Mohsin Naqvi said yesterday.

Both the bombers involved in the attacks have been identified as Afghans, he told parliament in a session carried live on television.

There was no immediate response from Kabul.



Naqvi was speaking after a suicide bomber blew himself up close to a police patrol outside a lower court in Islamabad on Tuesday, killing 12 people and wounding 27.

Another bomber had rammed an explosive-laden vehicle into the main gate of a military school in South Waziristan district, near the Afghan border, on Monday, killing three people.

Militants then entered the school triggering a fight with Pakistani soldiers that continued for more than 24 hours until all attackers were killed.
