21-year-old tied to pole, hacked in C'nawabganj 2 held; mother accuses Jamaat supporters

Police have arrested two suspects after a young man was tied to an electric pole and hacked in Shibganj upazila of Chapainawabganj on Wednesday.

The victim, Abu Sufian Siju, 21, was first taken to a local hospital and later referred to Rajshahi Medical College Hospital.

As his condition worsened, he was transferred to the National Institute of Traumatology and Orthopaedic Rehabilitation (NITOR) in Dhaka on Thursday.

Doctors have said Siju's left arm need to be amputated after attackers used sharp weapons to hack his left arm, left leg and right hand, his mother Sufia Begum told The Daily Star yesterday.

Blaming local activists of Jamaat-

Cold wave, dense fog disrupt flights, ferries

3 killed, dozens injured in road collisions

As Bangladesh continues to shiver under the ongoing cold wave, dense fog has blanketed much of the country, disrupting ferry services and flights.

Temperatures fell below 11°C in multiple districts, especially in the northern areas.

"The situation will not improve for another two to three days," said Bazlur Rashid, senior meteorologist at the Bangladesh Meteorological Department (BMD).

A mild cold wave is sweeping Jashore, Chaudanga, Gopalganj, Rajshahi, Pabna, Sirajganj and Nilphamari, and it may persist in some areas, according to a Met Office bulletin.

Streets and riverbanks wore a misty veil early in the morning yesterday as residents braced against the sudden chill.

Meanwhile, the poor visibility due to dense fog likely caused at least three road collisions yesterday morning, killing three people and injuring 30 others in Faridpur, Tangail, and Munshiganj.

In Faridpur, three people were killed and two others injured in a head-on collision between an ambulance and a truck on the Dhaka-Khulna highway at the Munsurabad bus stand area in Bhanga upazila around 7:30am.

The deceased are Mizanur Rahman, 40, and his sister Beauty Begum, 30, of Keshabpur upazila in Jashore; and Nishan Ullah, 23, son of Rahmat Ullah from Rajganj village in Jashore's Manirampur upazila.

The injured were rescued and taken to Faridpur Medical College Hospital.

Following the collision, the truck driver fled

the scene, said Bhanga Highway Police Officer-in-Charge Helal Uddin.

In Tangail, at least 22 passengers were injured when two buses collided at Haripur in Ghatail upazila around 8:00am. The collision triggered a tailback of hundreds of vehicles, bringing the Tangail-Jamalpur highway to a standstill.



Witnesses said a Dhaka-bound bus of Binimoy Paribahan collided head-on with a bus of Prantik Paribahan.

Of the injured, 11 were admitted to Tangail General Hospital and one to Mymensingh Medical College Hospital; the remaining 10 received first aid and were discharged, according to authorities.

In Munshiganj, at least six passengers were injured when a bus rear ended a truck on the Dhaka-Mawa Expressway in Srinagar upazila around 12:45am.

Several passengers were trapped inside the bus following the collision. A team from the

'Minorities worry over their safety ahead of polls'

Politics that foments religious or ethnic divisions would ultimately weaken the country, Debapriya Bhattacharya said yesterday.

"Such politics will harm the economy, and, in the future, undermine our international relations and global standing," the noted economist said at a discussion titled "The Current Reality and Expectations of Human Rights of Minorities", organised by the Bangladesh Hindu Buddhist Christian Oikya Parishad at the CIRDAP Auditorium in the capital.

He added that religion-based politics is already creating an increasingly complex situation ahead of the polls. "Bangladesh should not view its religious minority citizens through the same political lens with which it views neighbouring India."

Dr Iftekharuzzaman, executive director of Transparency International Bangladesh, said minorities are not attacked solely because of their religious identity. "There is a force behind these incidents, and its main driving power is political. The objectives are partisanship, land grabbing and establishing dominance."

"Over time, political corruption has transformed the state into a bearer of anti-minority practices, and oppression and repression continue."

He added that the National Human Rights Commission has failed to

Bomb-like objects, chemicals seized at madrasa after blast

3 held; hunt on for prime suspect

Police yesterday recovered four crude bomb-like objects and 400 litres of chemical substances from a madrasa in South Keraniganj on Dhaka's outskirts, following an explosion there on Friday morning.

Law enforcers are now searching for several suspects, including Al Amin Sheikh, 33, a director of Ummal Qura International Madrasa, who was previously arrested on terror charges.

Yesterday, police detained three women linked to the incident: Al Amin's wife Asiya,

Myanmar goes to the polls amid civil war

Myanmar heads to the polls on Sunday as it battles a civil war that has ravaged parts of the country as well as one of Asia's worst humanitarian crises.

Already one of Southeast Asia's poorest countries, Myanmar has been hammered by a conflict triggered by a 2021 coup in which the military ousted an elected civilian government led by Nobel Peace Prize winner Aung San Suu Kyi.

Myanmar's humanitarian crisis is one of the most severe in Asia, driven by the intensifying civil war and repeated natural disasters, including a massive earthquake in March.

The ruling junta has previously suppressed information about a severe food crisis gripping the

Thailand, Cambodia agree truce

Weeks of border clashes kill at least 101; Asean to monitor ceasefire

Thailand and Cambodia ended weeks of fierce border clashes yesterday with a second ceasefire in recent months in the worst fighting in years between the Southeast Asian nations.

The ceasefire was holding, a Thai Defence Ministry spokesperson, Rear Admiral Surasant Kongsin, told Reuters about two hours after it went into effect at noon (0500 GMT).

"So far there's been no report of gunfire," he said.

Cambodia's Ministry of National Defence did not report any clashes after what it said had been a Thai airstrike early yesterday before the ceasefire announcement.

The agreement, signed by Thai Defence Minister Natthaphon Narkphanit and his Cambodian counterpart Te Seiha, ended 20 days of fighting that killed at least 101 people and displaced more than half
