A LEGACY RECLAIMED

His journey from exile to office

For the first time since independence, a third member of the same political family has taken the country's helm, with Tarique Rahman having become Bangladesh's first male prime minister in 35 years.

After more than 17 years in exile in the UK, the

Tarique gradually grew more measured, as years in exile left their mark on him – shaping his vision of greater tolerance in Bangladeshi politics.

60-year-old returned home last December to contest – for the first time in his political career – one of Bangladesh's most consequential elections.

Tarique took over as the BNP chairman after his mother, former prime minister and party chair Khaleda Zia, passed away on December 30 last year.

From then on, he worked tirelessly to mobilise the party ranks, touring districts with promises of curbing corruption, implementing electoral reforms, and ensuring socio-economic development.

He drew thousands of supporters to his

Economy, rule of law, governance to be the focus

Say ministers after taking oath

After taking the oath of office yesterday, several ministers said that economic reforms, improvement of law and order, and good governance would be among the top priorities of the new government.

Pledging to ensure stability and inclusive growth, they said that coordinated efforts would be made to boost investments, create employment, and address institutional weaknesses.

Describing the new cabinet as "a good one", Amir Khosru Mahmud Chowdhury, who is set to assume the role of finance minister, said the new government would prioritise investment and create a more business-friendly environment.

"We want to steer the country out of the oligarchic economic system created under the fascist regime. We want an economy where everyone can take part. We will make sure that the benefits reach everyone. Bangladesh's democratic transition has already begun," he told The Daily Star.

Early snag for Constitution Reform Council

BNP, allied MPs skip oath; Jamaat, NCP sworn in

The Constitution Reform Council suffered a setback yesterday as BNP's elected representatives took oath as MPs but declined to be sworn in as members of the council.

Three lawmakers from BNP allies, along with several independents, followed suit.

The decision by more than two-thirds of the MPs has cast uncertainty over the formation and functioning of the Council, proposed under the July National Charter (Constitution Reform) Implementation Order, 2025.

The move initially drew a strong reaction from Jamaat-e-Islami and the National Citizen Party and their allies, whose elected candidates at first refused to take oath.

for the council of ministers, dominated by new faces with only a handful of old guards. Among the notable inclusions is the interim government's national security adviser Khalilur Rahman, who was appointed as a technocrat.

President Mohammed Shahabuddin administered the oath of office and oath of secrecy to Tarique, 25 ministers,

Chandra Roy, Altaf Hossain Chowdhury and Ruhul Kabir Rizvi. Abbas, Nazrul and Rizvi were later named advisers to the new PM with the rank of minister.

The new council of ministers features 40 first-time entrants – 16 ministers and all 24 state ministers. Only nine had previously served as ministers or

New JS must meet within next 30 days

Tarique takes the reins

state ministers in the BNP governments led by Tarique's mother and late BNP chairperson Khaleda Zia.
Only three of the ministers and state ministers are women -- all first timers.
Two ministers are leaders of BNP's allied parties and three are technocrat appointees.
After taking the oath, Tarique, dressed in a black suit and white shirt, signed both the oath of office and the oath of secrecy. Accompanied by his wife Zubaida Rahman and daughter Zaima Rahman, he arrived at the South Plaza at 4:02pm to warm applause.
A few minutes later, the president arrived at the venue, and the swearing-in ceremony began at 4:08pm.
Cabinet Secretary Nasimul Ghani conducted the proceedings, which opened with the national anthem and a recitation from the holy Quran.
Then chief adviser Prof Muhammad Yunus, Chief Justice Zubayer Rahman Chowdhury, Chief Election Commissioner AMM Nasir Uddin, advisers of the interim government, Supreme Court judges, chiefs of the three forces, diplomats, newly elected lawmakers, political leaders, journalists, and top civil and military officials attended the event.
Among foreign dignitaries present were Maldivian President Mohamed Muizzu, Bhutanese Prime Minister Tshering Tobgay, Indian Lok Sabha Speaker Om Birla, and Pakistan's

Federal Minister for Planning, Development and Special Initiatives Ahsan Iqbal Chaudhary.
Hundreds of people, including supporters of the new MPs, thronged the Jatiya Sangsad Bhaban since morning to catch a glimpse of the oath-taking ceremony, which was broadcast live on internet and TV. The crowd, allowed to assemble along Manik Miah Avenue, erupted in cheers each time the names of ministers and state ministers were announced.
Earlier in the day, the BNP Parliamentary Party at a meeting at the Jatiya Sangsad Bhaban elected Tarique as its leader.
The new cabinet will hold its maiden meeting today at the Secretariat at 3:00pm, according to sources.
Region-wise, almost half of the council of ministers are from Dhaka and Chattogram divisions, while only two ministers are from the Sylhet division. Dhaka division has the highest representation with four ministers and eight state ministers. Chattogram division has nine ministers and two state ministers.
Three ministers and one state minister are from Rangpur division, while Rajshahi has two ministers and four state ministers; Khulna two ministers and two state ministers; Barishal two ministers and three state ministers; and Mymensingh four state ministers.
The swearing-in ceremony came six days after the BNP secured a stunning landslide in the 13th

national election. The party alone won 209 seats, with Tarique himself entering parliament for the first time after winning two constituencies. Its allies latched three seats.
Jamaat-e-Islami, which is the main opposition party now, secured 68 seats, while its allies got nine.
In the morning, all 212 newly elected lawmakers of the BNP and its allies, 76 of Jamaat and its partners, and seven independents were sworn in by CEC Nasir Uddin at the oath chamber of the Sangsad Bhaban.
The BNP lawmakers, however, opted not to take oath as members of the Constitution Reform Council -- a body for the implementation of July charter reforms following the victory of "Yes" in the referendum.
Jamaat and National Citizen Party lawmakers were sworn in in sequence after the BNP, although they had earlier indicated that they would refrain from taking any oath unless the BNP joined the reform council process.
Jamaat and NCP did not attend the swearing-in ceremony of the new council of ministers. After taking oath as MP, Jamaat Ameer Shafiqur Rahman said the BNP showed "disrespect" to July uprising martyrs through its refusal to take oath as reform council members.
With the swearing in ceremony, the curtain fell on the 18-month-long Yunus-led interim government rule. The interim government was formed in August 2024 after the Awami League regime was ousted by the student-led July uprising.

Yesterday, the interim government was formally dissolved through a gazette notification issued by the Cabinet Division, marking the end of the Advisory Council that governed during the transitional period.
The notification stated that the president appointed Tarique as prime minister, recognising him as an MP who commands the confidence of the majority in parliament, and giving consent for the formation of a new government under his leadership.
The eldest son of late president Ziaur Rahman and Khaleda, Tarique returned home to an ecstatic welcome in December last year after over 17 years in exile in the UK.
WHO GETS WHICH MINISTRY
Although the Cabinet Division usually publishes a gazette distributing portfolios among the cabinet members after the oath-taking ceremony, no gazette was issued as of writing this report at 1:00am.
According to a post published by the BNP on its verified Facebook page, party Secretary General Mirza Fakhrul Islam Alamgir was given the charge of the local government and rural development ministry while Standing Committee Member Amir Khosru Mahmud Chowdhury was appointed finance and planning minister.
Standing Committee Member Salahuddin Ahmed was assigned the home ministry, while fellow members Iqbal Hasan Mahmud and Maj (retired) Hafiz Uddin Ahmed were entrusted with the power, energy and mineral resources portfolio and the Liberation War affairs ministry

respectively.
Khalilur was given charge of the foreign affairs ministry. Another technocrat minister, BNP Chairman's Adviser Mohammad Amin Ur Rashid, was assigned the agriculture, fisheries and food portfolios.
Standing Committee Member AZM Zahid Hossain was assigned the women and children affairs and social welfare ministries; BNP Vice-Chairman Abdul Awal Mintoo the environment ministry; Vice-Chairman Kazi Shah Mofazzal Hossain Kaikobad the religious affairs ministry; BNP Chairman's Adviser Mizanur Rahman Minu the land ministry; Vice-Chairman Nitai Roy Chowdhury the cultural affairs ministry; BNP Chairman's Adviser Khandaker Abdul Muktedir the commerce, industries, jute and textiles ministries; BNP Chairman's Adviser and former Sylhet City Corporation mayor Ariful Haque Chowdhury the labour and employment and expatriates' welfare and overseas employment ministries; and BNP Chairman's Adviser Zahir Uddin Swapon the information and broadcasting ministry.
ANM Ehsanul Hoque Milon was given the education and primary and mass education ministries; BNP Joint Secretary General Shahid Uddin Chowdhury Anee the water resources ministry; Divisional Secretary (Rangpur) Asadul Habib Dulu the disaster management ministry; immediate past Attorney General Md Asaduzzaman the law ministry; BNP Executive Committee's Employment

Affairs Secretary Zakaria Taher the housing and public works ministry; Sarder Md Sakhawat Hossain the health and family welfare ministry; Fakir Mahbub Anam the post and telecom, and science and ICT ministries; BNP National Executive Committee Member Shaikh Rabiul Alam the road, rail and shipping ministries; and BNP Chairman's Adviser Dipen Dewan the Chattogram Hill Tracts affairs ministry.
BNP Advisory Council Member Afroza Khanam Rita is the only woman to be a minister. She got the civil aviation and tourism ministry.
10 ADVISERS
The new government yesterday appointed 10 advisers to Prime Minister Tarique, granting them the status of ministers and state ministers, according to an official gazette notification issued by the Cabinet Division.
Apart from BNP Standing Committee members Abbas and Nazrul, and Senior Joint Secretary General Rizvi, the five advisers who will hold the rank of ministers are BNP Advisory Council Member Ismail Jabiullah, and Dhaka University development studies teacher Rashed Al Mahmud Titumir.
The five advisers with the rank of state minister are BNP Joint Secretary General (international relations) Humayun Kabir; party chairman's Adviser Mahdi Amin and Chief Security Officer Brig Gen (retired) Shamsul Islam; writer and political analyst Zahed Ur Rahman; and Rehan Asif Asad.

Language debate in Pak era went beyond religion

Speakers tell *Star* Itihas Adda

The debate over the language of Bangalee Muslims during the Pakistan period was shaped not only by religion but also by questions of power, region, economy, and democracy, speakers said yesterday.

They made the remarks at the 12th session of The Daily Star's Itihas Adda, titled "The Language Question of Bangalee Muslims: Pakistan Period," held at The Daily Star Centre in the capital.

Writer and thinker Firoz Ahmed said debates over Urdu and Sanskrit vocabulary are often reduced to Hindu-Muslim binaries, though the issue is more complex. "When we debate the use of Urdu or Sanskrit words, we assume it is only about a Hindu-Muslim division. But it is not simply a communal issue," he said.

He referred to the historic East-West divide within Bengal. Citing an 1885-86 controversy, he said a Kolkata-based publication had described eastern Bengal's language as "impure" and suggested that writings from the region be edited in western Bengal. "Who gives them the authority to fix the standard of language?" he asked, adding that debates over linguistic purity were also contests over cultural authority.

He said words such as "Bondobosto" had long been part of Bangla and rejected the idea that vocabulary could be imposed from above. "No one can push a word into a language by force. A word survives only if people use it," he said.

Firoz also cautioned against discarding either Arabic-Persian or Sanskrit vocabulary. Referring to Abul Mansur Ahmad's idea of a "middle path", he said language should not be driven to extremes. Removing words from either tradition would weaken Bangla rather than strengthen it, he added.

Only three women in the new cabinet

Only three of the 49 members in the newly announced cabinet are women, accounting for just 6 percent of the government's top executive body.

Afroza Khanam Rita, newly elected MP for Manikganj-3, is set to become minister for civil aviation and tourism, said BNP sources.

Party sources also said Shama Obaid Islam, member of parliament for Faridpur-2, will serve as state minister for foreign affairs, while Farzana Sharmin Putul of Natore-1 will become state minister for two ministries — women and children affairs and social welfare.

Men will hold around 94 percent of cabinet posts under the new formation.

Notably, three previous cabinets had higher female representation than the incoming one.

The 2019 cabinet had four women among 47 members — about 8.5 percent. They were then prime minister Sheikh Hasina, Dr Dipu Moni, Begum Monnujan Sufian, and Begum Habibun Nahar.

Dipu Moni served as education minister, Begum Monnujan Sufian as state minister for labour and employment, and Begum Habibun Nahar as deputy minister for environment, forest and climate change.

Woman to die for Dhanmondi double murder

UNB, Dhaka

A Dhaka court yesterday sentenced a woman to death in a case filed in connection with the Dhanmondi double murder in 2019.

Judge of Dhaka Additional Metropolitan and Sessions Judge Court-7, Tauhida Akter handed down the punishment.

The convict is Surovi Akter, domestic help of deceased Afroza Begum.

The court also fined her Tk 50,000, in default of which she will have to suffer five months more in rigorous imprisonment.

The court also acquitted Bachhu Mia, a worker of the house, as allegations brought against him could not be proved. According to the prosecution, police recovered the bodies of Afroza Begum, 65, and her housemaid Diti, 18, from a house in Dhanmondi on November 1, 2019.

A case was filed with Dhanmondi Police Station on November 3, 2019. Police submitted a charge sheet against Surovi and Bachhu Mia on February 1, 2022.

The 2014 cabinet included five women among 57 members (8.77 percent). Alongside then prime minister Sheikh Hasina, were agriculture minister Matia Chowdhury, state minister for public administration Ismat Ara Sadek, state minister for women and children affairs Meher Afroz Chumki, and state minister for information Tarana Halim.

The 2009 cabinet recorded the highest female participation, with five women among 31 members -- around 16.12 percent. They included then prime minister Sheikh Hasina, Sahara Khatun, Dipu Moni, Matia Chowdhury, and Munnunjan Sufian.

Dipu Moni became the country's first female foreign minister, Sahara Khatun served as the first female home minister, and Matia Chowdhury was agriculture minister.

Experts warned that the decline in women's representation at the cabinet level could undermine decades of

progress in political empowerment.

At just 6 percent, the latest figure highlights the gap between women's share of the population and their role in policymaking, they said.

Kamrun Nahar, a member of women's rights group Naripokkho, said the low representation was not surprising.

"This is nothing new. But we had hoped for a more reasonable level of representation," she said.

She added that the government must prioritise women in decision-making roles. "With political support from the top, meaningful change can happen, and women will be able to engage in politics more actively," she said.

Language debate in Pak era went beyond religion

"The best terminology often comes from the languages that historically shaped our intellectual and cultural formation. To discard them out of narrowness weakens the language," he said.

Researcher Mamun Siddiqui of Bangla Academy said the language question during the Pakistan era was inseparable from land, democracy and economic rights.

He said discussions over Pakistan's state language began even before the state was formed. "It was like speaking of the Ramayana

before the birth of Ram," he said.

Citing Abdul Haq, Mamun said, "If linguistic freedom is not secured, political freedom remains incomplete."

"Besides, Enamul Haq had warned that imposing Urdu would bring 'political, cultural and economic death' to East Pakistan," he added.

Referring to Abul Mansur Ahmad, Mamun said, "If the language of the people and the language of the state do not coincide, that state cannot be democratic."

He said newspapers

and magazines from Chattogram, Cumilla, Sylhet and Dinaipur carried arguments in favour of Bangla as the state language, showing that the demand extended beyond Dhaka-based elite.

"These writings prepared people's minds," he said, stressing that the 1952 Language Movement did not emerge suddenly.

He described the language struggle as linked to economic and political emancipation, arguing that without that connection, "no language movement can succeed."

Prof Tariq Manzoor of the Bangla department at Dhaka University said, "If we think of 'Bangalee Muslim' as a combined identity, that is largely a post-1947 development," noting that before partition

the terms were often treated separately.

On language, he distinguished between spoken and written forms, saying linguistics prioritises speech while prescriptive grammar focuses on written norms.

He said attempts after 1947 to reshape Bangla through script reform, spelling changes and heavy insertion of Arabic-Persian vocabulary largely failed because language cannot be sustained through artificial imposition.

On the state language debate, he said from the perspective of a religion-based state, the push for Urdu as a lingua franca followed a certain logic. However, Bangla's demographic majority and rich literary heritage made it impossible to sideline, he

added.

"A language spoken by the majority and backed by a strong literary tradition cannot be denied state status," he said.

Although Bangla received constitutional recognition in the 1950s, its administrative implementation remained limited during the Pakistan period. Recognition was granted, but practical application lagged far behind, he added.

Trial of Quader, 6 others begins at ICT

The trial against Awami League General Secretary Obaidul Quader and six other party leaders began yesterday at International Crimes Tribunal-2 in a case over crimes against humanity committed during the July 2024 uprising.

Proceedings opened with the submission of the prosecution's written opening statement before the three-member tribunal, after which the first prosecution witness began testifying. However, minutes into the testimony, the tribunal adjourned the hearing until today following a prosecution plea.

The first witness, MA Razzak, is the father of Asif Iqbal, who was shot dead at Mirpur-10 while taking part in protests during July-August 2024.

The other accused are AFM Bahauddin Nasim, AI joint general secretary; Mohammad Ali Arafat, former state minister for information; Sheikh Fazle Shams Parash, chairman of Jubo League; Moinul Hossain Khan Nikhil, its general secretary; and Saddam Hussain and Sheikh Wali Asif Enan, president and general secretary of Chhatra League respectively.

According to the prosecution, the accused directly instigated, encouraged and provoked the use of lethal weapons against students and civilians, allegedly following instructions from former prime minister Sheikh Hasina.

They are also accused of aiding and abetting the government's crackdown to suppress what the prosecution described as a peaceful movement of unarmed students and civilians, including by enforcing a nationwide curfew and deploying lethal force.

In his opening statement, Chief Prosecutor Tajul Islam described Hasina as the latest addition to a long list of autocrats and fascists in world history, many of whom eventually faced trial.

He said the trial was not merely about the disposal of a single case, but carried a strong message for the nation.

Meanwhile, three defence witnesses were scheduled to testify yesterday before ICT-2 in the crimes against humanity case against JSD President Hasanul Haq Inu, but the defence failed to produce them.

One of Inu's counsels, Sifat Mahmud, said the scheduled witnesses were Brig Gen (retd) M Sakhawat Hossain, immediate past shipping adviser; Hasib-Al-Islam, a former coordinator of Students Against Discrimination; and talk-show host Jhumi Rahman.

The defence later sought the tribunal's permission to produce three alternative witnesses, including a foreign crimes expert. The tribunal allowed two of them and set February 22 for the next proceedings, but rejected the plea to include the foreign expert.

Abdus Sattar appointed PM's principal secretary

Former secretary ABM Abdus Sattar has been appointed as the principal secretary to the prime minister on a contractual basis for one year.

The Ministry of Public Administration issued a gazette notification in this regard yesterday.

Sattar, who previously served in senior roles within the civil service, will now assume the highest administrative post in the Prime Minister's Office.

He was appointed private secretary to BNP Chairman Tarique Rahman last month.



Youth hacked to death in Rajbari

UNB, Rajbari

A young man was hacked to death in broad daylight by miscreants in Rajbari Sadar upazila yesterday, said police and family sources.

The incident took place around 1:00pm on a paved road in Char Narayanpur area under Mizanpur union.

The victim was identified as Zahid Hasan Fakir, 27, son of Mahtab Fakir of Binodpur area in ward 9 of Rajbari municipality.

Family members claimed Zahid was killed after he demanded repayment of Tk 2,500 he had lent, while police said the murder was likely linked to prior enmity.

According to locals, Zahid received a phone call around noon and left home, saying he was going to collect the money. Shortly afterwards, miscreants attacked him with sharp weapons about 200 yards from his house, leaving him critically injured before fleeing the scene in an autorickshaw.

Locals rushed him to Rajbari Sadar Hospital where doctors declared him dead.

His mother Momena Begum said her son had left home after receiving the call and promised to return soon after collecting the money.

Keya forests face fresh threat

Trees allegedly felled for resort construction

Natural Keya or fragrant screw pine (Pandanus odorifer) forests on St Martin's Island are allegedly being ravaged days after the tourism season ended on January 31.

Locals alleged that numerous Keya trees are being felled along the seafloor in the Dakkhin-para area to clear land for resort construction.

Tayeb Ullah, a local resident, said he recently visited the area and saw that a portion of the forest had already been cleared, while more Keya trees had been felled and left to dry.

"This dense Keya forest protects the island's residential areas from the intrusion of tidal water. Several resorts have already been built after clearing Keya forests to give tourists a direct view of the sea," he said.

He said last year, seawater entered some residential areas during high tide, damaging freshwater ponds and threatening residents' livelihoods.

Foyezul Islam, chairman of St Martin's Island union parishad, said he had heard about the indiscriminate felling of Keya trees in the Dakkhin-para area along the beach but was not certain who was involved.

"A beach worker was sent to the spot for inspection on Sunday. Necessary steps will be taken following an investigation," he said.

He also said the land where the trees were cleared is privately owned. "It is possible that a local person sold the land to a resort businessman from Dhaka. However, it cannot be



confirmed why the trees were felled. It may have been for resort construction, or someone may have cut them for roofing purposes," he added.

Jamir Uddin, director of the Cox's Bazar district office of the Department of Environment, said they were aware of the incident and were treating the matter seriously, and that a preliminary investigation had already begun.

"The entire St Martin's Island has been declared an Ecologically Critical Area (ECA), and destroying any natural forest there is illegal. Those found involved will be identified through investigation and legal action will be taken under the Environment Conservation Act," he added.

Preserve works of Jibanananda

Speakers demand at poet's 127th birth anniversary programme

The 127th birth anniversary of celebrated poet Jibanananda Das was observed in Barishal yesterday with a series of programmes organised by local poets, writers, and cultural activists.

In the morning, members of Pragati Lekhak Sangha and Barishal Kabita Parishad paid floral tributes at a mural of the poet at the Jibanananda Das Memorial Auditorium and Library, established at his ancestral home.

Speakers at a discussion meeting, chaired by poet Tapankor Chakraborty, called for the establishment of a

research centre, a large-scale library, and a museum dedicated to the poet at his ancestral residence, Sarbananda Bhaban, also a portion of the current Department of Public Health Engineering office.

They highlighted that Jibanananda Das taught English at Government Brajamohan College from 1935 to 1946, noting that although a dormitory bears his name, little has been done to promote research and study of his works.

"Visitors from outside Barishal often leave disappointed as the poet's legacy is not properly preserved here," one speaker said.



Three of a family murdered in Cumilla's Homna

Three members of an expatriate's family were murdered in Monipur village under Homna upazila of Cumilla on Monday night, according to law enforcers.

The victims were identified as Papiya Akter Sukhi, 22, wife of Saudi Arabia expatriate Zahirul; their son Hossain, 4; and Zubayer, 5, son of Zahirul's brother Sattar.

Informed by locals, police went to the spot and recovered the body yesterday morning, said Dinesh Dasgupta, inspector (Investigation) of Homna Police Station.

The victims' bodies bore injury marks from sharp weapons, he added.

According to locals, both Zahirul and his brother Sattar are currently living abroad.

The bodies have been sent to Cumilla Medical College morgue for autopsy, said Morshedul Alam, officer-in-charge of the police station.

The OC also said police are investigating the incident to determine the motive, identify and arrest those responsible.

Filing of a case in this connection was underway, he added.

Man shot in B'baria, house set on fire in Narail

STAR REPORT

A man was shot in Brahmanbaria on Monday night and a house was set on fire in Narail early yesterday in connection with polls-related feuds.

In Brahmanbaria, Emon Miah, 24, a resident of Thollakandi village under Nabinagar upazila, was attacked by 14-15 armed men and hit by three bullets near his residence around 7:45pm on Monday.

"The armed attackers came on CNG-run autorickshaws and fired at Emon before fleeing the scene quickly," said Toufiqueul Islam, Emon's elder brother.

Emon was a supporter of Kazi Nazmul Hossain Taposh, a defeated independent candidate from Brahmanbaria-5. As a result, he faced rivalry from supporters of the elected BNP lawmaker Abdul Mannan, Toufiqueul alleged.

In November last year, two people were killed in a clash between two local rival groups. Emon is a witness in that murder case, he also said.

Emon was rushed to a local hospital, where doctors advised shifting him to Dhaka for advanced treatment, he added.

Contacted, Abdul Mannan MP said he did not know about any such incident. "It may be a result of an internal feud between two criminal gangs. It is not connected with my election," he added.

Contacted, Brahmanbaria Superintendent of Police Shah Md Abdur Rauf confirmed the incident and said police were investigating.

In Narail, the house of Humayun Molla, president of Hobkhali union BNP unit, was set on fire early yesterday in Bill-Dumurtala village under Sadar upazila.

Humayun's family members said he was a supporter of Monirul Islam, a defeated independent candidate from Narail-2. He has been facing rivalry from the union BNP unit's former president Riazul Islam Tinku, who is a supporter of Fariduzzaman Farhad, the BNP-nominated candidate who was also defeated in the election.

Drone attack on Sudan market kills 28

AFP, Khartoum

A drone attack on a crowded market in central Sudan killed 28 people, a rights group reported Monday, as the army and its paramilitary rivals traded aerial strikes in their battle for territory.

The attack occurred in a paramilitary-controlled area in the far north of Sudan's Kordofan region, currently the fiercest frontline in the three-year-old war between the army and the Rapid Support Forces (RSF).

According to the Emergency Lawyers, a group monitoring atrocities in the conflict, several drones hit the al-Safiya market outside the town of Sodari in North Kordofan on Sunday.

"The attack occurred when the market was bustling with civilians, including women, children and the elderly," the group said, adding that the toll was preliminary.

It gave no indication of who carried out the strike.

Sodari, a remote town where desert trade routes cross, is around 230 kilometres (132 miles) northwest of El-Obeid, the state capital of North Kordofan, which the RSF



has been trying to encircle for months.

The Kordofan region has seen a surge in deadly drone attacks as both sides fight over the country's vital east-west axis, which links the western RSF-held region of Darfur, through El-Obeid, to the army-controlled capital Khartoum and the rest of Sudan.

Across vast stretches of territory, attacks by both sides – many on remote towns and villages – have killed up to dozens of civilians at a time.

Last Wednesday, two children were killed and a dozen wounded in one strike on a school, while another severely damaged a United Nations warehouse storing famine relief supplies. After consolidating their hold on Darfur last year, the RSF has pushed east through oil- and gold-rich Kordofan, in an attempt to seize Sudan's central corridor.

Since April 2023, the war between the army and the RSF has killed tens of thousands of people.

Kyiv must negotiate 'fast'

Says Trump as Ukraine-Russia peace talks begin in Geneva

US President Donald Trump said Monday that he hopes Ukraine reaches a deal with Russia "fast," as Washington-brokered peace talks between Moscow and Kyiv began in Geneva.

"Ukraine better come to the table, fast," Trump told reporters aboard Air Force One while en route to Washington.

Negotiators from Ukraine and Russia gathered in Geneva yesterday for two days of US-mediated peace talks that will focus on the main sticking point of land.

Trump is pressing Moscow and Kyiv to reach a deal to end Europe's biggest war since 1945, though Zelensky has complained that

his country is facing the greatest pressure to make concessions.

Ahead of the talks, Russia carried out heavy airstrikes overnight across swathes of Ukraine, inflicting severe damage on the power network in the southern port city of Odesa, which Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky said left tens of thousands without heat and water.

17 killed in bomb attacks, gunfight

Two bomb attacks and a gunfight between police and militants in northwest Pakistan killed at least 14 security personnel and three civilians including a child, officials said.

The separate incidents in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa province on Monday, which left dozens more wounded, come as Pakistan's security forces battle intensifying insurgencies in southern and northern provinces that border Afghanistan.

This month the Islamic State (IS) group claimed responsibility for a massive suicide blast at a Shia mosque in the capital Islamabad that killed 31 people and wounded 169 others.

The latest attacks in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa targeted a checkpoint and a police station, according to a military statement and a security official.

Militants rammed an explosive-laden vehicle into a wall near a checkpoint in Bajaur district, killing 11 security personnel and a girl, the military said yesterday.



Russian military police building collapses

AFP, Moscow

A Russian military police building collapsed on the grounds of an army base outside Saint Petersburg, the local governor said yesterday, adding that authorities were probing the causes of the incident.

"I have instructed the security forces to assist the military in clearing the rubble and rescuing victims following the collapse of a military police building on the territory of a military unit in Sertolovo," governor Alexander Drozdenko said.

"The causes of the incident are being investigated," he added.

Sertolovo is a small village just outside Saint Petersburg, Russia's second-biggest city.

Local media outlet 47news reported that three people died in the incident, citing emergency services.

Cuba a ‘failed’ nation: Trump Urges Havana to strike deal with US, dismisses regime-change plans

AGENCIES

President Donald Trump on Monday said Cuba was a “failed nation” and called on Havana to make a deal with the United States, though he dismissed mounting a regime change operation.

“Cuba is right now, a failed nation,” the US leader told reporters aboard Air Force One. However, when asked if the United States would oust Cuba’s government, as Washington did when it raided Venezuela and captured president Nicolas Maduro, Trump said: “I don’t think that will be necessary.”

The island is facing major fuel shortages and blackouts as Trump intensifies the decades-long US embargo on the country and presses other



countries to stop sending Havana oil, reports AFP.

“It’s a humanitarian threat,” Trump admitted of the fuel shortages biting the country.

Garbage has begun to pile up on street corners in the Cuban capital of Havana, attracting hordes of flies and reeking of rotten food, in one of the most visible impacts of the US bid to prevent oil from reaching the Caribbean’s largest island.

State-run news outlet Cubadebate reported this month that only 44 of Havana’s 106 rubbish trucks were able to keep operating due to fuel shortages, slowing garbage collection.

Cardboard boxes, used bags, plastic bottles and rags have piled up on street corners across the capital, as some residents sorted through the waste looking for scraps they could re-use, while motorists, pedestrians and bikers are forced to circumvent the imposing heaps.

France’s Macron eyes fighter jet deal in India

Urges Delhi to back ‘moratorium on strikes’ against Ukraine civilians

French President Emmanuel Macron met Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi in Mumbai yesterday, as he began a three-day visit to India focused on artificial intelligence cooperation and a potential multibillion dollar fighter jet deal.

France is seeking to expand its military partnership with New Delhi, with discussions expected on a possible contract for 114 additional French Dassault Rafale fighter jets.

Modi, in a statement on social media addressed to his “dear friend” Macron, after he began his trip with his wife Brigitte in India’s financial capital, said he looked forward to “advancing our bilateral ties to new heights”.

Modi said he was “confident that our discussions will further strengthen cooperation”.



Macron praised the “remarkable acceleration” of ties with India, after the meeting. He said the shift came in response to the “changing international order”, adding that both countries did not want to “be subjected to any form of hegemony” or the “conflict of a few”.

Macron urged India to back “moratorium on strikes” against Ukraine civilians.

to India since taking office in 2017, began yesterday with a programme including honouring the victims of the 2008 Mumbai attacks, and meeting Bollywood film stars, including Shabana Azmi and Manoj Bajpayee.

The visit follows New Delhi’s confirmation last week that it intends to place a major order for Rafale jets, as well as the signing of a landmark free trade agreement between India and the European Union in January.

Macron will travel to New Delhi for an artificial intelligence summit today and tomorrow.

New Delhi has sought over the past decade to reduce its dependence on Russia, its traditional main supplier of military equipment, turning to other countries while also pushing for more domestic production.

France frees suspected Russia tanker after fine

France yesterday released a tanker suspected of being part of Russia’s sanctions-busting “shadow fleet” called “Grinch” after its owner paid a fine of several million euros, a minister said.

French forces and their allies boarded the oil tanker last month between Spain and Morocco after it started its journey in Russia, before escorting it to a port outside the southern city of Marseille.

Ship tracking websites marinetralfic and vesselfinder said the vessel had been flying a Comoros flag. “The tanker ‘Grinch’ is leaving French waters after paying several million euros and enduring a costly three-week immobilisation in Fos-sur-Mer,” Foreign Minister Jean-Noel Barrot said on X.

SECURITY CO-OPERATION Nigeria announces arrival of 100 US soldiers

Some 100 US soldiers are being deployed to Nigeria as part of increased military cooperation to fight insecurity in the West African country, the Nigerian defence ministry announced Monday.

The ministry did not specify when the “US military trainers” arrived or were due to arrive.

“The Defence Headquarters (DHQ) wishes to announce the arrival of about 100 United States military personnel and associated equipment at Bauchi Airfield,” the statement said.

“The arrival is planned and deliberate following a formal request by the Federal Government of Nigeria to the US government to support a clearly defined military training requirement, technical support and intelligence sharing with the members of the Armed Forces of Nigeria.”

Nigeria is facing a longstanding jihadist insurgency in the northeast, a conflict between farmers and herders in north-central regions, separatist violence in the southeast, and kidnappings for ransom in the northwest.

US President Donald Trump has claimed that Christians in Nigeria are being “persecuted” and are victims of “genocide” perpetrated by “terrorists”.

But Abuja and most independent experts say the violence in Nigeria indiscriminately affects both Christians and Muslims.

India court clears mega project on sensitive island

India’s environmental court has given the go-ahead to the strategically significant Great Nicobar infrastructure project despite widespread concerns of ecological damage to the island in the Andaman Sea.



The National Green Tribunal on Monday dismissed a batch of petitions objecting to the mega project on ecologically sensitive Great Nicobar island, saying “adequate safeguards” had been taken into account.

The infrastructure plan involves building a transshipment port, airport, power plant and a township on the island, located close to the Strait of Malacca, one of the world’s busiest shipping lanes.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi’s government is looking to pour billions of dollars into connecting the island to global trade routes, after the project was granted initial environmental approvals in 2022.

India’s environment minister last September called it a project of “strategic, defence and national importance”.

A moment to unite and deliver

Govt, opposition must work together for the sake of the country

With hope and aspiration for a better tomorrow, we welcome Bangladesh's new prime minister, Tarique Rahman, his cabinet members, and the members of the 13th parliament from both the ruling coalition and the opposition. The oath-taking ceremony of the new legislative and executive bodies on Tuesday marked the beginning of our country's transition back to parliamentary democracy. Empowered by ballots, they now bear the responsibility of shaping the nation's future for, hopefully, the next five years.

The greater responsibility, however, rests with the Bangladesh Nationalist Party (BNP), which formed the government with a two-thirds majority. Given our less-than-encouraging experience with majoritarian governments, particularly in the recent past, the new ruling party must take care not to misuse that power. Encouragingly, Tarique Rahman's measured words and gestures following the election results signalled a positive shift. So far, both the victors and the opposition alliance have shown relative restraint in their post-election reactions, something that has often been absent during previous transitions.

BNP's decision to refrain from taking the oath as members of the Constitution Reform Council may create some confusion. Under the July National Charter (Constitution Reform) Implementation Order, 2025, members of the 13th parliament are also to serve on the Constitution Reform Council. While several independent MPs, along with lawmakers from Jamaat-e-Islami, the National Citizen Party, and Islami Andolon, took the oath as council members on Tuesday, BNP MPs and independent Rumeen Farhana did not. BNP leader Salahuddin Ahmed told reporters that once parliament constitutionally approves the council, rules regarding members' swearing-in can be framed. He further argued that, under the existing constitution, lawmakers were not elected specifically as members of the Constitution Reform Council. While this justification merits consideration, as the ruling party the BNP must make sincere efforts to bridge differences with the opposition on this issue through dialogue. All the parties must remain resolute in their commitment to the principles and spirit of the July Charter, which they have all signed, the BNP included, who placed notes of dissent regarding some clauses.

Aside from the minor hiccup regarding the Constituent Reform Council, the new government's start has been promising. The decision by BNP and Jamaat-e-Islami lawmakers to forgo duty-free vehicles and government-allotted residential plots is commendable. At a time of inflationary pressure, such restraint could translate into meaningful national savings. We hope this spirit carries over into broader public expenditures as the executive assumes office.

As we watched emerging young leaders and seasoned stalwarts pledge to make our voices heard in the halls of democracy—the Jatiya Sangsad—we were reminded of the thousands whose sacrifices led to the ouster of an authoritarian regime during the July 2024 uprising. The 18-month interim administration that followed, despite its failure to implement many promised reforms, did deliver a credible election, and for that it deserves acknowledgment. Now, both the ruling party and the opposition must ensure that this hard-won democratic renewal does not falter again.

Contain price hike during Ramadan

Authorities must act swiftly to stabilise supply before prices spiral further

With Ramadan approaching, prices of essential goods have started to rise again. This is happening even though imports have increased in recent months. Traders say the rise is due to goods being stuck at the port, delays in unloading, and higher demand following the election holidays. According to a report in the daily *Samakal*, a total of 110 ships are stranded on water waiting to unload at Chattogram port. Half of these vessels are loaded with rice, lentils, chickpeas, dates, sugar, edible oil, and other daily necessities.

A prolonged work stoppage at the port, followed by the election holidays and restrictions on vehicular movement, has caused severe congestion. Normally, around 5,000 TEU (twenty-foot equivalent unit) containers are cleared daily. During the disruption, that number fell to nearly one-third of the usual volume, and on some days, no containers were cleared at all. As a result, around five million tonnes of goods are now stuck aboard vessels, while container backlogs at the jetties have climbed to over 41,000, making the situation worrying. Importers had reportedly brought in goods early this year, anticipating the proximity of Ramadan and the election. However, many have been unable to release their consignments on time. Even though port authorities say they are prioritising Ramadan goods, traders say that it may take another week, or even longer, to clear the backlog.

The impact is already visible in wholesale markets such as Khatunganj. Within a week, prices of onions, garlic, ginger, chickpeas, lentils, and vermicelli have increased. Date prices have risen by Tk 50-100 per kg, chickpeas by Tk 5-10 per kg, garlic by Tk 15, and vermicelli by up to Tk 150 per maund. Onions and lentils have also become more expensive. Together, these increases place significant pressure on household budgets.

There are reports that some traders may be deliberately holding back goods or exploiting the port congestion to raise prices. Weak market monitoring during the election period appears to have allowed such practices to go unchecked. If syndicates or unscrupulous traders are manipulating supply to drive up prices, authorities must act quickly to identify and stop them.

The government must ensure the uninterrupted clearance of essential commodities at the port. Special logistical arrangements, extended working hours, and coordinated transport support may be necessary to clear the backlog. Equally importantly, market monitoring must be strengthened. Authorities should verify stock levels, enforce transparent price displays at wholesale and retail markets, and take swift action against hoarding or collusive practices. If imports are indeed higher than last year and demand forecasts are clear, there is little justification for excessive price volatility ahead of the holy month of Ramadan.

The govt will be stronger with more women at the table

The 2026 election has been touted as one of the most historic in the country, remarkable for many reasons. It is the direct outcome of a bloody mass uprising led by students. It kept Awami League completely out of parliament, allowed Jamaat-e-Islami—a party bearing the unresolved legacy of 1971—to emerge as the main opposition, and brought BNP back to power with a two-thirds majority, giving Tarique Rahman the opportunity to demonstrate that he is the right leader to steer the country towards stability and progress.

Despite all this, what this election has not achieved is a respectable representation of women at the highest levels. Only 85 women contested in the election, including 66 with party nominations and 19 as independent aspirants. Eventually, only seven made it to parliament, including six from BNP and one formerly attached to BNP politics. It has been disheartening to see that candidates as accomplished and dedicated to public interest as Tasnim Jara, Taslima Akhter, and Manisha Chakraborty, among others, did not secure the required votes.

The continued sidelining of women in the country faded into near invisibility by the time the election came. A movement born in the name of justice and equality has eventually resulted in a parliament less representative of half the population than ever before.

Tragically, the interim government, despite being a product of an anti-discrimination movement, ended up discriminating against women's political participation. This occurred through its overindulgence of parties openly opposed to women's role in governance or their equal rights in public spaces. Political parties, meanwhile, did not bother to adhere to the minimum 5 percent representation despite pledging to do so by signing the July National Charter. The result, therefore, is hardly surprising.

But does this mean there is no way out of this absurd situation? Perhaps not.

A practical starting point would be

the women's reserved seats, which can provide at least some immediate corrective. Ideally, as recommended by the Women's Affairs Reform Commission—whose proposals, by the way, received zero attention during the Consensus Commission talks—proper representation in elections would have significantly strengthened women's political participation by giving them a direct mandate from voters. Since that has not happened, a more logical course is available: instead of adhering to the age-old practice of "rewarding" party loyalists by selecting their wives, daughters, or other female relatives, why not fill the reserved seats with competent women already invested in politics? These seats are allocated according to each party's proportion of parliamentary seats, a formula that gives parties both responsibility and opportunity.

BNP, because of its parliamentary majority, is in a particularly strong position and can choose more women candidates than other parties. This is an opportunity it should not miss. By selecting honest, competent, qualified women committed to public service, the party can send a powerful message that merit, not patronage, will shape the new chapter of governance.

Similarly, despite the general

sentiment within Jamaat to keep women out of leadership positions, it could serve the nation, and surprise many, by selecting accomplished professionals for the reserved seats.

However, merely allocating reserved seats to capable women will not bring meaningful change unless those seats come with real empowerment. Women MPs must have resources, visibility, and

and the entrenched influence of money and muscle. They campaigned on terrain hostile to their very presence. Their clean image, resilience, and steadfastness signal political courage.

Tasnim Jara, a physician and former member of the National Citizen Party (NCP), raised campaign funds through crowdfunding and built support by directly engaging ordinary people in her constituency. Her manifesto pledged to ensure improved healthcare and education, public safety, and greater accountability of MPs. Her campaign demonstrated organisational skills, public trust, and financial transparency, qualities essential for effective governance.

Manisha Chakraborty, another physician from the Bangladesher Samajtantrik Dal (BSD), contested in Barishal-5. A familiar face who had run as a mayoral candidate before, she raised funds through small public donations by distributing clay banks and secured 22,486 votes, which she rightly views as evidence of a growing vote bank seeking change from the "politics of plunder, corruption and communalism." Her appeal to young, middle-class, and working-class voters suggests the capacity to build broad-based coalitions.

Taslima Akhter, an activist, photographer, president of Garments Workers Solidarity, and member of the NTCC and Labour Reform Commission 2024, ran from Ganosamhati Andolon in Dhaka-12. Her campaign focused on transparency and accountability and advocated for a "citizen council" through which voters could hold representatives responsible.

These are just some of the names that immediately come to mind. There are many others who also deserve consideration. It is encouraging that three women MPs have already been given ministerial positions. We hope to see more in the top tiers of the government.

Imagine a parliament and cabinet with a significant number of competent, capable, and honest women members. Such inclusion would not weaken the government; it would make it stronger, more credible, and better equipped to address the developmental and economic challenges ahead. A government born out of the sacrifices and aspirations of ordinary people should reflect the full strength of its people. Empowering qualified women is not charity or concession; it is sound political judgment.

The economics of everyday extortion

In its idealised form, an economic system such as capitalism—often known for rewarding productivity, risk-taking, and innovation—is one in which profits follow value creation, competition disciplines excess, and institutions protect exchange. Yet across much of the developing world—and in several middle-income economies—what operates under the label of capitalism increasingly functions through coercion rather than production. Markets exist, money circulates, and transactions occur, but the logic animating them has shifted. Value is no longer primarily created; it is extracted. This is not a mere market failure, but a sophisticated, predatory mutation of the system.

This phenomenon draws from my ongoing research identifying ten slightly overlapping faces of capitalism, each shaped by institutional design and power relations. One of these distorted offspring I describe as "extortion capitalism." It emerges when systematic coercive extraction replaces productive accumulation as the dominant economic logic. In such systems, the pursuit of profit is no longer tethered to efficiency, innovation, or service delivery. It is anchored instead in control over permits, roads, ports, files, licenses, and ultimately, fear. The gatekeeper replaces the entrepreneur; the innovator, by the enforcer.

In Bangladesh, extortion is not a marginal deviation or an underground aberration; it is embedded in the very

architecture of everyday economic life. Transport operators, traders, contractors, and small businesses face payments that are neither taxes nor fees, but compulsory extractions enforced through political muscle, bureaucratic discretion, or outright intimidation. Economic survival depends less on entrepreneurship than on compliance with informal toll regimes. The price of doing business is not innovation, but submission. Markets function, but they function as corridors of rent extraction rather than arenas of competition.

The abstraction becomes concrete when one examines mass-contact state institutions. The Bangladesh Bureau of Statistics Citizen Perception Survey 2025, as reported by *The Daily Star* on December 25, 2025, shows that nearly one-third of citizens paid bribes to obtain public services, with the Bangladesh Road Transport Authority and passport offices emerging as the most corruption-prone interfaces. These are not elite gateways; they are universal points of contact that citizens must face repeatedly. When routine access to mobility and legality itself depends on informal payments, coercion ceases to be episodic and becomes structural. The citizen is not paying to break the law, but to access it. Formal compliance costs more than informal negotiation. In such a setting, corruption is not merely a moral failure; it is an economic toll. Citizenship becomes conditional, and a silent lesson is learned: voice does

not work—money does.

A closely comparable pattern appears in Nigeria, where police checkpoints, port clearances, fuel distribution, and public procurement operate as layered extraction points. Businesses factor bribes into operating costs much as they would electricity. Political power becomes a mechanism for monetising access to markets rather than regulating them. The distinction between public authority and private predation blurs, producing an economy where compliance is rewarded more reliably than competence.

In Pakistan, the mechanism is more institutionalised but no less coercive. Access to land records, utilities, and judicial relief frequently requires unofficial payments mediated by politically connected intermediaries. Elections rotate elites and slogans evolve, yet the extraction structure remains remarkably stable. What persists is not ideology but incentive: controlling chokepoints yields higher returns than producing goods.

The logic becomes starkly visible in Haiti, where armed groups openly control roads, ports, and fuel depots. Tolls are imposed on movement, trade, and basic survival. While the institutional form differs from South Asia or West Africa, the economic principle is identical: income is generated through coercive control rather than production. The absence of a functioning state does not eliminate capitalism; it mutates it into a raw system of enforced extraction.

In Afghanistan, this system has persisted across radically different regimes. Whether under warlords, transitional governments, or religious authority, trade routes are taxed, and households coerced. The continuity reveals an uncomfortable truth: extortion capitalism is not tied to doctrine. It is tied to the profitability of coercion. A hybrid version is evident in Myanmar, where businesses face overlapping demands from military-

linked firms and informal enforcers. Participation requires continuous payments, crowding out efficiency and innovation. Capital accumulation becomes defensive rather than productive—aimed at survival, not expansion. Even in Venezuela, access to foreign exchange and licences has long depended on political loyalty and unofficial payments. As output shrank, the state compensated not by reforming, but by tightening control over remaining economic arteries.

These countries differ in culture and geography, yet they converge on a common pattern. When coercive extraction becomes more profitable than production, capitalism mutates. Markets still exist, prices still signal scarcity, and money still changes hands, but the engine has changed. Value creation gives way to predation. Entrepreneurship narrows into rent-seeking. Innovation withers because its returns are appropriated before they can compound. Labeling this simply as "corruption" understates the problem. Corruption implies deviation from a norm; extortion capitalism is a stable economic equilibrium. Once entrenched, it does not self-correct through market forces because the market itself has been repurposed as an extraction device.

Recognising this pattern is essential because policy remedies fail when the diagnosis is wrong. Privatisation, deregulation, and investment incentives cannot work where coercion—not competition—sets the rules. Development strategies premised on market efficiency collapse when the market rewards access over ability. Understanding extortion capitalism is therefore not an academic exercise. It is a prerequisite for meaningful reform—and for distinguishing capitalism's productive potential from its most corrosive deformation. Until we dismantle the checkpoints of coercion, we are not building markets; we are merely financing their hijackers.

A six-point strategic memo to the new government

Bangladesh passed multiple tests of its democratic credentials through the 13th parliamentary election on February 12. It was a festive and peaceful one despite widespread apprehensions, had a credible voter turnout, stands as a decisive verdict for centrism and stable transition, and saw an encouraging aftermath with contestants accepting the results.

The election was not only about the contestants. Citizens have regained a sense of ownership over the democratic process and how the state is run. First-time voters saw voting as a political assertion. Women voted in large numbers. So did minorities. The ballot did more than bring in a new government. It carried clear expectations that governance must improve, and justice must be ensured at every level of the state-society relationship.

A closer look at voting data will be essential reading for the victors. The vote share percentage signalled a much closer competition than the seat share percentage. For longer-term political dominance, the BNP must closely read the mood of the electorate. For now, parliament stands poised to take on a new journey of democratic deliberations. A new team is in place to lead and steer governance. Tarique Rahman assumes the mantle of leadership with a measure of humility and restraint that is winning wide appreciation. The start surely is grounded in optimism. In the coming days, there will be much discussion within and outside the government on prioritising challenges and determining the ways forward. At this early stage, six signals from the government are

critical.

The first signal is how BNP deals with the issue of competence, in the cabinet as well as officials manning the machinery of the state. This is less about mere academic qualifications and more about a grasp of the real world, acumen, decisiveness, and ability to move the system to produce results. Two lethal diseases have corroded the bureaucracy: sycophantic lobbying and grievances as currency. The colonial legacy of red-tapeism and prioritisation of file-moving over results on the ground has the potential to grind every well-meaning policy initiative. The interim government did not do much to address these challenges. BNP's initial steps will be closely watched to assess how the competence issue is being addressed.

The second crucial signal is how the question about the economy is being perceived and handled. The interim government did credibly restore a measure of financial discipline, but it could not engage on the larger question of galvanising the economy. Stalled growth, investment and revenue mobilisation; rising poverty and unemployment; and deepening economic disparities define the current fundamentals of the real economy, as was shown in the Power and Participation Research Centre (PPRC) State of the Real Economy Report of 2025. The nation awaits a crucial signal from the new BNP economic team on how the question of economic recovery and economic equity will be approached.

Fiscal discipline remains essential, but a one-dimensional stability agenda will not

do. Momentum will come from identifying and nurturing multiple growth drivers and greater attention should be turned to mesoeconomics, the space between large corporate actors and micro-enterprises. This layer includes small and medium firms, manufacturing clusters, agro-processing networks, and service enterprises that employ at scale but often lack access to finance or technology. With the right policy support,

government is about effective compassion, which must accompany the focus on economic momentum. The recent PPRC research has shown that, on average, households across the country are barely breaking even. In urban areas, persistent budget deficits have become common, with families falling short by several thousand taka each month. Nearly 28 percent of citizens live below the upper poverty line, and for lower-income

and agency. These are agendas that found resonance in the electoral field, too.

The fourth signal is about the crucial issue of decentralisation. Rebuilding and empowering local government can be central to the political fortunes of the BNP government. Years of central dominance have widened the disparity and constrained local initiative. Decentralisation can correct that imbalance when accompanied by real authority, adequate resources, and clear accountability at the city and union levels. Regional inequality narrows when local institutions have the capacity to act. The landscape of political and economic power often resembles a Dhaka-versus-the-rest reality. A wake-up call on decentralisation has the potential to galvanise a much-needed national conversation.

The fifth signal is about healing. Autocratic rule did not merely suppress; it traumatised the national psyche. The interim period, unfortunately, somewhat dissipated the rare mood of national unity born from the July uprising. This agenda of healing is a crucial priority which will not be achieved by mere rhetoric or symbolic acts. Honesty of purpose and concrete institutional steps will be central. It cannot be achieved by the government alone, but the ruling group has to set the tone and direction.

The sixth and final signal is how the geopolitical complexities will be navigated. It is both a challenge and an opportunity, never more so than for Bangladesh at this moment of transition. Rushed agreements at the fag end of the interim government have raised some unease. The "Bangladesh first" position can be the anchoring message here. For us, engaging in the geopolitical space should not be seen as a zero-sum game. Our focus must be on positive-sum outcomes even when the geopolitical landscape is challenging and fraught with dominant power rivalries. The task here is not only for the foreign policy team, but for the entire government.

Good luck to the BNP government. Good luck to Bangladesh. Good luck to all of us.

these enterprises can broaden the base of expansion and reshape the pattern of growth. A structured national economic dialogue would help align public policy with these emerging growth drivers across sectors such as leather, light engineering, digital services, and regional production hubs.

Goodbye and good luck

On August 5, 2024, we were told that the old order had vanished into the Indian sunrise, and in its place stood a Nobel laureate, handed the impossible task of governing a country that had just been torn apart from within. Three days later, on August 8 at 2:15 pm, Professor Muhammad Yunus stepped onto the tarmac in Dhaka, not as the Hasina regime's favourite villain but as the new interim leader of Bangladesh. When he said, "I am remembering Abu Sayeed," and called this our "second victory day," promising that the fruits of this freedom must reach every corner of the country, the words did not feel like rhetoric; they felt like a hand on the shoulder of an exhausted nation.

The monsoon revolution of those 36 days had washed away the fascist machinery of Awami League, and we were offered the terrifying privilege of getting it right. It was, in every sense, our "West Wing" moment, that fleeting instant when history cracks open just wide enough for ordinary people to slip their shoulders under its weight and try, however clumsily, to steer it somewhere kinder.

It has been over 550 days since that afternoon of impossible hope. It is now February 2026. For me, to serve as deputy press secretary in this fragile, in-between time was to live in a permanent state of becoming, never quite arriving, always translating chaos into sentences the country could bear to hear, even when our own voices shook.

We were told that Bangladesh was bankrupt, not only in its coffers but also in its very spirit, and for 18 months we lived with the stubborn resolve to prove that projection wrong. We inherited a currency collapsing under its own fear and food inflation that had soared to 14.10 percent in July 2024 during the fever pitch of the uprising. Our foreign exchange reserves, which had slid below \$20 billion in 2024, now hover above \$32 billion, no longer a freefall but a fragile plateau that buys us time to think instead of panicking.

We treated the economy as one treats a trauma patient—stabilise the pulse, stop the bleeding, whisper encouragement in the dark. The vitals are steadier now, but the country still lies in a ward, not yet discharged,

surrounded by monitors that beep like small, insistent questions about what comes next. To work in those rooms was to learn a new kind of faith: that small, stubborn adjustments in policy could translate into one more child eating eggs twice a week instead of once.

In that same ward, we saw the birth of the July National Charter, a constitutional promise, fragile but real, crafted to ensure that never again will one pair of hands be allowed to clutch the entire state by the throat. Signed in October 2025 after months of arguments, walkouts, and exhausted compromises, the charter gathers more than 80 reform proposals, nearly 50 of them constitutional, and binds them to a now-held referendum that asked the country, in one breathless "Yes" or "No," whether it truly wanted to restrain its rulers. It is, at the very least, a guardrail we did not have before, a line scratched into the road by people who have seen where the cliff begins.

We also witnessed something deeply human: the return of faith from afar. In 2025, remittances reached an all-time high of around \$32.8 billion, the largest annual inflow in our history, and in the first seven months of the 2025-26 fiscal year alone, more than \$19.4 billion already came home through formal channels. These numbers live in spreadsheets, but in truth, they are love letters from millions of Bangladeshis scattered across the world, each transaction a whisper: "I believe in you again; I am willing to risk my hard-earned wages on the possibility that this time will be different."

We turned our gaze outward differently, too, refusing to lean on a single neighbour as if geography were destiny. Instead, we walked towards a more balanced, multipolar reality, securing support from the IMF and World Bank not as trophies but as lifelines woven into a broader strategy, even as published reserve data showed a slow climb back from the low twenties to the low thirties in billions of dollars. We negotiated with the United States and other partners to ease pressures on our exports, knowing that a "technical adjustment" in tariffs could mean the difference between shuttered gates and a factory's lights staying on for another year, between a pink slip and a renewed work ID, between a family slipping back into hunger and daring, quietly, to plan for a daughter's college admission.

And yet, revolution is never clean. It leaves fingerprints and fractures on everything it touches, and we would betray our own commitment to transparency if we pretended the porcelain did not crack in our hands. When the old police state vanished almost overnight in August 2024, it did not leave behind a ready-made rulebook; it left behind a gaping vacuum that reforms could not fill quickly enough. The official record of "mob justice" cases may read as a smaller number, but it obscures a larger catastrophe unfolding in the spaces between policing and justice, in the streets where some people became judge and executioner because the law had not yet learned to write itself in a new, credible voice.

Awami League remains banned from

contesting. The streets demanded this, and many of the wounded and grieving saw it as the only way to keep the old nightmares from slamming the door open again. I get it, and I agree with it. But the historian in me cannot quit the unease: did we build an essential firebreak, or did we plant a future grievance that will one day return as flame? Was this our necessary safeguard or our greatest misstep? Only time, and the people living in it, will be able to say.

We came here knowing we were meant to be a parenthesis in the long, complicated sentence of Bangladesh's history, a brief interruption rather than the final clause. That parenthesis now closes. The files are packed, the nameplates taken down, the rooms we briefly filled with arguments, laughter, and midnight drafting sessions return to their old, indifferent neutrality. The idea of "New Bangladesh" that we dared to speak of in headlines and speeches is no longer ours to hold, or to protect, or to disappoint; it passes, trembling and unfinished, into other hands.

It has been a privilege to speak for a government that understood from the beginning that its highest duty was to steward a transition, and then step aside. To those who won the election, good luck. You will need every ounce of courage, humility, and imagination you can find, because the ghosts of July are still here—watching, whispering, and waiting to see what you do with the house we are leaving behind, its walls still smelling of smoke and fresh paint, its doors finally, mercifully, unlocked.

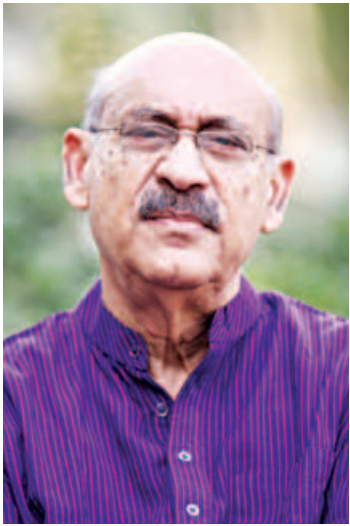

Showbiz veterans voice hopes for new government

With the country entering a new political chapter following the parliamentary election, attention is also turning to the future of the cultural sector. Artists across disciplines are hoping for stability, institutional support and an environment where creative expression can thrive without fear or disruption. Five prominent cultural figures; Abul Hayat, Tariq Anam Khan, Salahuddin Lavlu, Gias Uddin Selim and Masum Reza — shared their expectations with The Daily Star.

ABUL HAYAT:

Seeking the freedom to work Veteran actor Abul Hayat said he wishes to continue working as he always has, but without obstacles or restrictions. He hopes that

more meaningful and refined work, beneficial to the country, will be created. Artistes, he said, should have the freedom to work independently while remaining responsible and accountable. According to him, artistic work should reflect the voices and concerns of the people, and the new government should ensure a positive and open environment for cultural practice.

TARIQ ANAM KHAN: Less control, more opportunities

Tariq Anam Khan emphasised the importance of culture as a reflection of a country's identity. Music, theatre and films, he noted, have taken the nation's reputation to the international stage. However, over the past year and a half, the cultural

sector; especially theatre—has faced significant challenges.

He said that the less the government intervenes, the better it will be for the sector. Although Dhaka has expanded considerably, the number of theatre halls has not increased. Even in areas such as Uttara, Gulshan and Dhanmondi, adequate performance venues remain scarce. He expects the new government to develop infrastructure and safeguard freedom of expression.

SALAHUDDIN LAVLU:

The arts need security and investment

Salahuddin Lavlu said the country must prosper overall, as the cultural sector cannot advance without a strong national economy. Having

spent his life in acting and directing plays, he hopes for more work opportunities and greater investment in culture. At the same time, he stressed the importance of ensuring the safety and security of artistes and those involved in the industry.

GIAS UDDIN SELIM:

Culture builds a strong nation

Gias Uddin Selim believes the arts play a crucial role in building a strong nation. He said the cultural sector has often been neglected since the country's birth, adding that the more culture is practised, the more the nation will progress.

He noted that the sector cannot move forward with limited budgets and neglect. Alongside economic prosperity, he said, the country must also

invest in cultural development.

MASUM REZA:

No restrictions on festivals and exhibitions

Masum Reza said that in recent months, many drama performances and cultural festivals were cancelled. Numerous events organised outside Dhaka were also called off, including a major festival planned in his home district of Kushtia.

He said no clear explanation had been provided for these cancellations. Many Baul and traditional artistes were also unable to perform regularly. He hopes the new government will ensure that artistic activities continue without interruption and that artistes can work freely and independently.

Acclaimed actor Mosharraf Karim has resumed filming after returning from Umrah in Saudi Arabia, joining director Sagar Jahan for two Eid television dramas.

Karim returned on February 11 after spending 10 days in Saudi Arabia with his wife, Robena Reza Jui. He began shooting on February 15 for **Soda Shotto Bolibo** and **Adu Bhai**, both slated for Eid broadcast.

A legacy reclaimed

vigorous campaign, ultimately leading his party to a landslide victory in the 13th national election, held 18 months after an unprecedented student-led uprising that ousted the Awami League government.

However, Tarique's ascent to power was anything but easy, shaped by the trauma of his father's assassination, and then his long years in exile, all the while facing persistent accusations of corruption and nepotism from his political detractors.

His father, late president Ziaur Rahman, who founded the BNP in 1978, was assassinated in a military coup in 1981 when Tarique was a teenager.

Since then, Khaleda led the party, which went on to form government in 1991, 1996, and 2001 under her leadership.

Having spent his childhood and adolescence in Dhaka, Tarique became a member of Bogura's Gabtali upazila BNP in 1988 at the age of 22. However, he got involved in politics before he formally joined the party and had even taken to the streets with his mother during the 1990 anti-Ershad movement.

In 1994, Tarique married Zubaida Rahman, the daughter of the former Bangladesh Navy chief and a two-time minister in subsequent governments, late Rear Admiral Mahbub Ali Khan. They have a daughter — Barrister Zaima Zarnaz Rahman.

Tarique was made the first joint secretary of the party in June 2002, around a year after the BNP returned to power in 2001 with Khaleda as the prime minister.

Three years later, he convened a countrywide grassroots forum that covered every upazila. He visited all the upazilas, addressed grassroots leaders and activists, and had one-on-one conversations with locals.

It was during this period that Tarique was embroiled in controversy. He was accused of running "Hawa

Bhaban", dubbed an alternative power centre during the BNP-led coalition rule. He was also blamed for using his power to gain personal advantage.

Tarique consistently refuted all the allegations against him.

He was arrested on corruption charges during the military-backed caretaker government rule in 2007 and was reportedly tortured in custody for 18 months.

Archival news reports from that year said he suffered fractures in the spine and fell sick during multiple court appearances. He was finally granted bail on medical grounds on August 28, 2008, and was released



from jail on September 3 that year.

A week later, he left for London with his wife and daughter for medical treatment while facing multiple criminal cases at home.

On December 8, 2009, the BNP national council elected Tarique as senior vice chairman, ignoring the party charter that stipulates election to the posts. He was re-elected to the position at the sixth national council in 2016.

Earlier, on January 7, 2015, the High Court banned publishing, broadcasting, or reproducing speeches and statements by Tarique in all print, electronic, and social media as long as he remained absconding in London.

That year, tragedy struck again when his younger brother Arafat Rahman Koko passed away.

While in exile, he continued to shape the BNP's strategy and policies and served as the party's acting chairman after his mother was sentenced to prison in 2018.

Since then, he has led the party virtually from London, attending meetings and overseeing key organisational decisions.

According to his associates, Tarique gradually grew more measured, as years in exile left their mark on him — shaping his vision of greater tolerance in Bangladeshi politics.

He was convicted in absentia in five cases and faced a flurry of lawsuits, but all charges and rulings against him were dropped after the ouster of the AL government — clearing the legal barrier to his return.

Tarique returned home on December 25 last year to an ecstatic welcome. Addressing a massive crowd, he said, "... I have a plan for the people of my country, for my country," indicating his readiness to lead.

And thus began the party's campaign.

To strengthen the party's position, he attended numerous programmes across the country, addressing 64 public rallies, seeking votes for the "Sheaf of Paddy", the BNP's electoral symbol.

He made dozens of area-specific pledges, assuring people of job creation, welfare, healthcare, and the development of infrastructure and agriculture. His party also pledged to establish an accountable and "just state", directly answerable to people.

Tarique, nicknamed "Pinu", was born on November 20, 1967. After completing his initial studies at Dhaka's BAF Shaheen College, he was enrolled in the international relations department of Dhaka University in the 1980s.

In his election affidavit, his educational qualification was mentioned as "higher secondary."

Replying to a query about the commodity market ahead of Ramadan, he said, "We have just taken responsibility. I do not think there will be any trouble. There will be no more syndicates in Bangladesh."

Trump's new envoy arrives in S Africa with relations frayed

A conservative media critic picked by President Donald Trump to be US ambassador to South Africa has arrived to take up his post, the US embassy said yesterday, with bilateral relations fractured over a range of issues.

Washington and Pretoria are at odds over a series of international and domestic policies, from South Africa's genocide case against Israel to Trump's disputed claims that white Afrikaners are being persecuted.

Brent Bozell, 70, needs to present his credentials to President Cyril Ramaphosa before officially taking up his post.

"I'm confirming that he's in (the) country," a US embassy official told AFP.

Trump chose the right-wing Bozell for the job in March, soon after expelling South Africa's ambassador on accusations that he was critical of Washington. Pretoria has yet to announce a successor.

Trump said at the time that Bozell "brings fearless tenacity, extraordinary experience, and vast knowledge to a nation that desperately needs it".

Bozell is founder of the Media Research Center, a non-profit that says it works to "expose and counter the leftist bias of the national news media".

A strong defender of Israel, he said at his Senate confirmation hearing in October that he would push Pretoria to end its genocide case.

South Africa's government filed the case with the International Court of Justice in 2023, alleging that Israel's war on Gaza — which followed the attack by militants from Palestinian group Hamas — breached the 1948 United Nations Genocide Convention. Israel has denied that accusation.

Bozell also told the Senators: "I will communicate our objections to South Africa's geostrategic drift from non-alignment toward our competitors, including Russia, China and Iran."

the first sitting of parliament, an official of the parliament secretariat said.

Immediately after the House goes into its maiden sitting, the Speaker and deputy Speaker will be elected and sworn in by the president. After that, the session is likely to be adjourned for 15 to 20 minutes for their oath-taking.

The new Speaker will then preside over the House session.

The Business Advisory Committee of the new parliament will also be formed at the first sitting, with the new Speaker as its head.

The committee will decide the tenure of the inaugural session and other business of parliament.

The main task of the treasury bench at the first sitting will be to place those ordinances before the House which the government wants to turn into law.

The interim government promulgated or amended a total of 130 ordinances during its 18 months in office.

The president will also address the first sitting of the session in line with the Constitution, according to sources at the parliament secretariat.

The cabinet will approve the speech, and MPs will discuss the president's address.

ATTACK ON Star, PROTHOM ALO Probe stalled in both cases No new arrests since Dec 26

The drive against those accused of vandalism, attacks and arson at the country’s two leading newspapers – The Daily Star and Prothom Alo – seems to have stalled, with no arrests made since December 26.

After the twin attacks on the night of December 18 – two months ago – two cases were filed, one by Prothom Alo and one by The Daily Star, on December 22. Soon afterwards, 37 people were arrested, according to court documents.

Fifty-three days since the last arrests, the investigation has made little progress.

‘Plan to make sports disciplines mandatory at school level’

After being sworn in as the State Minister for Youth and Sports on Tuesday, former national football team captain Aminul Haque appeared before the media at his residence in Mirpur to outline the immediate and long-term sports plans of the Bangladesh Nationalist Party (BNP)-led government.

Aminul, regarded as one of the safest pairs of hands in Bangladesh football, assumed office under the technocrat quota after weeks of speculation, although he narrowly lost in the Dhaka-16 constituency in the national elections held on February 12.

Hailing from Bhola and raised in Mirpur, Aminul began his top-flight career with Mohammedan Sporting



Club, initially serving as third choice goalkeeper behind the experienced Saeed Hasan Kanan. He made his international debut in 1998 in a friendly against Qatar and represented Bangladesh until 2011, rarely losing his place.

The 45-year-old revealed his government's plan to create a healthy environment in sports, maintain good relations with India, make sports mandatory from Grade 4 across the country, establish a sports industry, solve burning issues regarding cricket and

cricketers, as well as corruption in sports and financial constraints of national sports bodies. Following are excerpts from the press briefing:

On sports environment: A distance among organisers, players and journalists has been created in past and we want to close that gaps to create a good relation among all sports stakeholders.

On sporting relations with India: Spoke to the Indian Deputy Commissioner in the parliament area soon after being sworn in and expressed

desire to have a friendly relation with India and other neighbouring countries through diplomatic ways. Want to solve the problem with ICC as per ICC rules and regulations.

On overall sports plan: The government has a big plan to make five sports disciplines, including football and cricket, mandatory from Grade 4 at school level and appoint three sports teachers each for five disciplines and one sports officer in all 495 upazilas in the next one year and bring them under payroll.

On BCB, Shakib Al Hasan and Mashrafe Bin Mortaza: BCB polls have been questionable. Shakib and Mashrafe are legendary cricketers and their cases should be dealt at the government level through discussion.

On corruption in sports: I maintain zero tolerance in corruption in sports and never allow corruption in sports.

On future of athletes: We will create jobs for athletes after their retirement, so that the athletes don't have to think about their future during their playing career. We want to give utmost priority to athletes in order to make the financially solvent.

On politics and sports: It has been a long practice in sports, so it is not possible to depoliticise the sports overnight but I want to keep politics outside the purview of sports.

Former captains rally for Imran

More than a dozen former international cricket captains, including India's Sunil Gavaskar and Kapil Dev, rallied Tuesday for jailed Pakistan ex-premier Imran Khan, appealing the Islamabad government to give him "adequate" medical treatment.

The statement, signed by 14 captains and seen by AFP, demands the proper care of Khan, a former World Cup-winning captain who, according to his lawyer, has lost most of the vision in his right eye.

Khan has been in jail since 2023 and was sentenced late last year along with his wife to 17 years on corruption charges they both deny.

His lawyer visited Khan in jail last week and later submitted a report to Pakistan's chief justice and the Supreme Court detailing his concerns and requesting treatment for his client.

The statement signed by the former cricket skippers "respectfully" urges Pakistan "to ensure that Imran Khan receives immediate, adequate and ongoing medical attention from qualified specialists of his choosing".

The campaign is led by former Australian captain and contemporary of Khan, Greg Chappell.

Other signatories are Michael Atherton, Michael Brearley, Nasser Hussain and David Gower (England), Allan Border, Ian Chappell, Belinda Clark, Steve Waugh and Kim Hughes (Australia), Clive Lloyd (West Indies) and John Wright (New Zealand).



Black Caps spoil Samra's dream

New Zealand produced a clinical chase to crush Canada by eight wickets in Chennai on Tuesday, sealing their Super Eight berth in the T20 World Cup and denying teenage sensation Yuvraj Samra a victory after a moment he had manifested for a while.

Chasing 174, New Zealand were never in trouble, reaching 176-2 with almost five overs to spare as Glenn Phillips finished unbeaten on 76 and Rachin Ravindra made 59 not out. Phillips said the pair stuck to their processes, taking it "one ball at a time."

Earlier, Samra had lit up the tournament with a breathtaking 110 off 65 balls – becoming the youngest centurion in T20 World Cup history. The 19-year-old anchored Canada's innings after captain Dilpreet Bajwa chose to bat first, sharing a 116-run opening stand in 14 overs.

Bajwa fell for 36, caught by Phillips off Kyle Jamieson, but Samra powered on, reaching his hundred from 58 balls with six sixes and 11 fours – the highest individual score of the tournament so far.

"I manifested this moment ever since we qualified," said Samra, who was named after Indian great Yuvraj Singh. "Every single day, I dreamed about scoring a hundred on this stage," he added.

Yet New Zealand's composed response ensured his dream innings ended in defeat. The win also eliminated Afghanistan, as New Zealand joined South Africa as Group D qualifiers.

Phillips praised Samra's knock as "fabulous", saying the teenager had "a long future ahead."



Historic Super Eight FOR ZIMBABWE

Australia, Ireland crash out

The match was washed out, but even without on-field action at the Pallekele International Cricket Stadium on Tuesday, there was plenty to rejoice for Zimbabwe fans and the Sikandar Raza-led side in the pavilion. Zimbabwe reached the Super Eight of the T20 World Cup for the first time after their Group B fixture against Ireland was abandoned due to rain. The result also confirmed the elimination of Australia and Ireland, as Sri Lanka and Zimbabwe progressed from the group. Zimbabwe have five points from three matches, while Australia have only two and will be unable to catch the African side even if they win their final group game against Oman on Friday. This is only the second time Australia, champions of the 2021 edition, have exited at the group stage of the tournament, having previously been eliminated at the same stage in 2009. Meanwhile, Ireland have completed all four of their group matches, while Zimbabwe will face Sri Lanka in a dead rubber tomorrow.

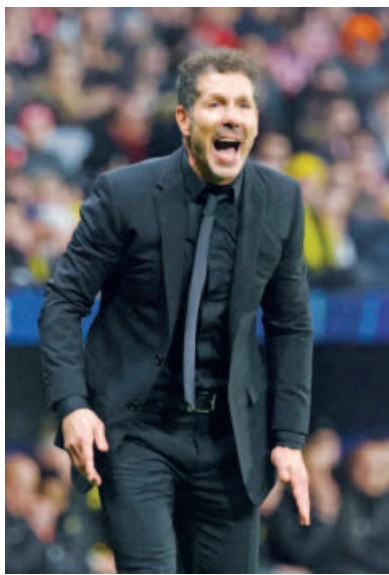
Unpredictable Atletico brace for Brugge test

Atletico Madrid's campaign has been unpredictable. They beat – nay thrashed – big teams at times, but again got smacked by sides fighting for survival, and that inconsistency sets the backdrop for Wednesday's Champions League playoff first leg against Club Brugge at the Jan Breydel Stadium.

Atletico Madrid arrive in Belgium after a mixed week, having demolished Barcelona 4-0 in the Copa del Rey semifinal first leg before slumping to a 3-0 LaLiga defeat against Rayo Vallecano. Earlier this season, Diego Simeone's men also edged Real Madrid 5-2 in LaLiga, yet they now sit fourth domestically, 15 points adrift of the leaders – a stark reflection of a campaign defined by swings in form.

Both sides are chasing a place in the Champions League round of 16 after missing automatic qualification. Brugge finished 19th in the league phase with 10 points from eight matches, recording three wins, one draw and four defeats. Atletico placed 14th with 13 points, courtesy of four wins, one draw and three losses.



Ivan Leko's side head into the tie encouraged by domestic momentum, winning four of their last five matches in all competitions. Their Champions League home form has also been respectable, returning two wins, one draw and one defeat, including a commanding 3-0 victory over Marseille in their most recent European outing.

However, Brugge's continental numbers underline their volatility: 15 goals scored and 17 conceded, leaving them with a negative goal difference.

Atletico's European story is similarly uneven. They fell 2-1 at home to Bodo/Glimt in their final league-phase match and have conceded in each of their last eight Champions League games, digesting 15 goals overall so far. Another outing without a clean sheet would mark their longest such run in the competition. While they have found the net 17 times in Europe, defensive solidity has clearly deserted them.

Their away record offers Brugge encouragement – just one win, one draw and two defeats on the road – a vulnerability the Belgian side will hope to exploit.

History suggests little separates the teams. Across eight previous European meetings, both clubs have claimed three wins apiece, with two draws, including a goalless stalemate in their most recent encounter.

With Atletico favourites yet defensively fragile, and Brugge buoyed by home form, Wednesday's opener promises a finely balanced start to a compelling playoff tie.



Barca slip, Real benefit

The LaLiga title race intensified as Barcelona dropped crucial points, allowing Real Madrid to climb to the summit -- by just two points -- with 14 games remaining. Spanish champions Barcelona suffered a damaging 2-1 defeat to Girona on Monday, days after Los Blancos overtook the Catalans by beating Real Sociedad on Saturday. Hansi Flick's side had a chance to reclaim top spot but fell short in a gripping derby clash. Teenage star Lamine Yamal missed a penalty, though Barca briefly seized control when defender Pau Cubarsi struck just before the hour mark. However, goals from Thomas Lemar and Fran Beltran powered an impressive comeback for 12th-placed Girona.

Probe stalled in both cases

No new arrests since Dec 26

The drive against those accused of vandalism, attacks and arson at the country’s two leading newspapers – The Daily Star and Prothom Alo – seems to have stalled, with no arrests made since December 26.
