65% people spared power tariff hike
Says info minister

Information Minister Zahir Uddin Swapon yesterday said the government kept 65 percent of the country's marginal consumers outside the electricity price hike, considering the global energy crisis and domestic realities. The Bangladesh Energy Regulatory Commission raised electricity prices at three levels, wholesale, transmission and retail, last Wednesday. The new rates will take effect with the June bill. Speaking at the Secretariat, Swapon said although BERC raised electricity prices for all consumers, the government appealed to ensure that prices were not increased for marginal consumers who use up to 75 units of electricity. Consumers within this limit will continue to pay electricity bills at the previous rates, he said. "If there had been a proper policy for energy resource extraction over the past 20 years, we would not have to be so import-dependent now," he added. He also said the government has taken initiatives for domestic gas exploration and offshore bidding, while also giving priority to solar and renewable energy production.



'Mango: more than just a fruit'
Experts urge better harvesting, export practices to unlock mango's true potential at Star Itihas Adda

Mango is part of Bengal's history, culture, and daily life, but early harvesting, poor processing, and weak export facilities are preventing Bangladesh from realising the fruit's full value, speakers said yesterday. They made the remarks at an episode of The Daily Star Itihas Adda titled "Aam O Aamjonota", held at The Daily Star Centre in

the capital. Speaking at the event, writer and mango researcher Mahbub Siddiqi said mango has a long history in this region. Scientists trace its origin to the Indo-Burma region, including Chattogram, Arakan, and parts of Southeast Asia, he added. He highlighted references to mango in Sanskrit and Pali literature, Buddhist texts, the

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Cut renewable energy equipment taxes to 1%
Say speakers at discussion

Civil society organisations yesterday urged the government to reduce taxes and duties on renewable energy equipment to a symbolic 1 percent for the next decade. They said the current average tax burden of 37 percent is making solar power unnecessarily expensive and slowing Bangladesh's renewable energy transition. The demand was made at a press conference titled "Renewable Energy for Energy Security: Policy Shifts Needed in the National Budget" at a Dhaka hotel. The Coastal Livelihood and Environmental Action Network (CLEAN), the Bangladesh Working Group on Ecology and Development (BWGED), and several other organisations jointly organised the event. A policy paper presented at the event said renewable energy equipment currently faces taxes and duties ranging from 26.9 percent for solar panels and inverters to over 58 percent for mounting structures, DC cables and solar power walkways. This raises the cost of renewable energy systems by an average of 37 percent, creating a major barrier for households, farmers and small businesses seeking to invest in solar power, it said. Presenting the keynote paper, CLEAN networking adviser Monowar Mostafa said Bangladesh remains heavily dependent on imported fossil fuels, while the current revenue

structure penalises clean energy technologies. The groups called for reducing customs duties, VAT, advance income tax, advance tax, and regulatory duties on all renewable energy

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Govt launches nationwide anti-dengue drive

The government launched a three-month nationwide campaign yesterday to raise public awareness about dengue prevention, eliminate Aedes mosquito breeding sites, and ensure a clean environment. Health and Family Welfare Minister Sardar Md Sakhawat Husain inaugurated the campaign at Rabindra Sarobar in the capital. "The government is launching a nationwide awareness campaign, including announcements through loudspeakers, to prevent dengue. We want to convey the message to everyone that maintaining cleanliness and preventing water from accumulating are the most effective ways to combat dengue," he said at the inauguration. DSCC Administrator M Abdus Salam said citizens have the most important role in preventing the spread of dengue. A DSCC survey identified 28 of the corporation's 75 wards as high-risk areas, he said. A week-long special "crash programme" will begin in those wards from today to intensify anti-dengue measures. Abdus Salam also said the prime minister had warned authorities about potential dengue risks two months ago, prompting the city corporation and health authorities to take advance preparations.

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3 more die with measles-like symptoms
Death toll rises to 613

UNB, Dhaka

Three more children died from measles-like symptoms in the last 24 hours till 8:00am yesterday, raising the fatalities from the disease and similar symptoms to 613. The Directorate General of Health Services (DGHS) classified the latest deaths as suspected. As such, the total number of suspected measles deaths has reached 522, while the confirmed deaths remained unchanged at 91. A total of 915 suspected measles cases and 117 confirmed measles cases were recorded during these 24 hours, bringing the overall total to 77,791 and 9,620, respectively. Since March 15 this year, a total of 63,134 suspected measles patients have been hospitalised, of whom 58,964 have recovered, according to the DGHS.
