



60% of all loans DISTRESSED

Amount stands at Tk 10.91 lakh crore

Distressed loans in the banking sector soared 44.3 percent year-on-year to a record Tk 10,91,848 crore in 2025, reflecting the sector's deepening fragility.

Loans that are at a high risk of default, or where the borrower is already experiencing serious repayment difficulties, are termed distressed loans. These are calculated by combining defaulted loans, written-off loans, unclassified rescheduled loans, and loans under stay order.

As of December last year, distressed loans accounted for about 60 percent of total outstanding loans of Tk 18,20,915 crore.

"This means that nearly two-thirds of all loans are no longer performing normally," said Mustafa K Mujeri, executive director of the Institute for Inclusive Finance and Development and a former chief economist of Bangladesh Bank.

Such a situation severely weakens the banking system and raises serious concerns about its ability to function effectively, he said.

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China zone across the tunnel gets green light

Ecneq clears Tk 4,189cr Chinese Economic, Industrial Zone in Anwara

The Executive Committee of the National Economic Council (Ecneq) yesterday approved a Tk 4,189 crore project to build supporting infrastructure for the Chinese Economic and Industrial Zone (CEIZ) in Chattogram's Anwara.

Policymakers hope the CEIZ will become one of Bangladesh's largest foreign investment hubs, with project documents showing the zone is expected to attract at least \$500 million in foreign direct investment and create more than 100,000 direct and indirect jobs once fully operational.

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Criticise, don't sensationalise Tarique says at discussion with BNP-beat journo

Iran fight back in tense opener amid turmoil

Iran twice came from behind to salvage a 2-2 draw against New Zealand in their opening World Cup match yesterday, but the result was only one part of a turbulent day for a team whose entire campaign has been overshadowed by war, political tensions and a series of logistical obstacles.

Team Melli arrived at the tournament under extraordinary circumstances following months of military conflict between Iran and the United States, with a peace agreement only announced on Sunday. Their preparations had already been disrupted by delayed and rejected US visas for some members of their delegation and a last-minute decision to move their training base from Tucson, Arizona, to Tijuana in Mexico.

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Cape Verde withstand Spanish inquisition

It was as if the Spanish Armada had descended upon the Atalanta Stadium, where former champions Spain faced Cape Verde in yesterday's Group H opener in what had been billed as one of the biggest mismatches of the tournament.

But the small African island nation -- the second-smallest country by land area and the third-smallest by population ever to qualify for a World Cup -- refused to bend to the Spanish inquisition, producing one of the most memorable performances of the tournament in a goalless draw.

Spain kept asking questions, but largely the same ones, and Cape Verde would not budge.

With 65 places separating the two sides in world rankings and, on the back of Germany's 7-1 thrashing of fellow debutants Curaçao a day earlier, many expected Spain to impose themselves in similar fashion, especially after their dominant triumph at the 2024 Euros.

Instead, Spain endured bags full of frustration, brooding stares and exasperated sighs as they struggled to unlock the Blue Sharks.
