Four more die with measles-like symptoms

Four more patients died of suspected measles across the country in the last 24 hours until 8:00am yesterday, bringing Bangladesh's combined tally of confirmed and suspected measles-related deaths to 712.

The DGHS has classified the latest deaths as suspected measles fatalities.

With the latest update, the number of suspected measles deaths has risen to 619, while the number of confirmed measles deaths remained unchanged at 93.

A total of 941 new suspected measles cases were reported during the 24-hour period, bringing the cumulative number of suspected cases nationwide to 99,207.

Meanwhile, 116 new confirmed measles cases were recorded, bringing the total number of laboratory-confirmed infections to 11,710, according to DGHS data.

Relocate illegal chemical depots from Old Dhaka

Speakers urge govt

The Bangladesh Poribesh Andolon (BAPA) yesterday called upon the government to take appropriate measures to relocate all illegal chemical warehouses and hazardous industrial establishments from Old Dhaka and other residential areas to safe locations within a fixed timeframe.

It also urged the government to establish planned Chemical Storage Zones or Chemical Villages to prevent future disasters.

The demands were made at a seminar titled "Nimtoli Tragedy: When Will Negligence-Induced Killings End?", organised by BAPA at the Jatiya Press Club to mark Nimtoli Tragedy Day.

BAPA President Prof Dr Nur Mohammad Talukdar chaired the event while its General Secretary Md Alamgir Kabir moderated it. Dhaka South City Corporation (DSCC) Administrator Abdus Salam attended as the chief guest, while Md Saleh Uddin, deputy director of the Fire Service and Civil Defence, was special guest.

Abdus Salam stressed greater public awareness and strict enforcement of the Bangladesh National Building Code.

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ATTACK ON Star Suspect put on two-day remand

A Dhaka court yesterday placed Anowar Hossain of Lakshmipur's Raipur on a two-day remand in a case filed over the arson attack and vandalism on The Daily Star's office in Dhaka.

Dhaka Metropolitan Magistrate Ariful Islam passed the order after investigating officer Jahirul Islam, a sub-inspector of the Detective Branch of Dhaka Metropolitan Police, sought a five-day remand for Anowar, 38, said a sub-inspector of DMP's Prosecution Division.

Earlier in the day, Anowar was shown arrested in the case, following an application submitted by the investigator.

Filed on December 22 last year, the case accused 350 to 400 unidentified individuals under the Penal Code, the Anti-Terrorism Act, the Special Powers Act, and the Cyber Security Ordinance. The case estimated the damage at Tk 40 crore.

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LOCAL GOVT ELECTIONS EC sets sights on October

The Election Commission (EC) yesterday said it was gearing up preparations to conduct local government elections, targeting October as the possible timeline, starting with the union parishad polls.

Following a meeting on the EC's local poll preparation, the constitutional body said the number of polling centres may increase slightly this time, and the drafts of the code of conduct would likely be finalised within a 15-day timeframe once it gets feedback from political parties and stakeholders.

The commission said no decision regarding the polls will be taken without discussing it with political parties.

According to the EC, ballot boxes, presiding officers, and polling officers are already in place for the elections. Discussions have also been held on whether the budget for the polls can be reduced.

The EC also said it discussed the participation of teachers from private educational institutions in local elections but could not reach a decision.

The commission held a four-hour-long meeting yesterday from 11:00am to 3:30pm regarding the overall preparation. The meeting also reviewed laws and regulations related to local government polls.

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Demonetise Tk 500, 1,000 notes to boost bank deposits

Highlighting the erosion of public trust in the banking sector, Khokon said many people now avoid depositing money in banks and instead keep cash at home.

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Forests vanish, hunger grows for 200 langurs

For nearly 25 years, more than 200 black-faced langurs have lived along the Maheshpur border in Jhenaidah. Divided into at least six groups, they roam villages including Bhabanagar, Swaruppur, Chapatala, Talsar, Shyamkur, and Kusumpur.

However, destruction of forests and expansion of farmland and net-fenced orchards have left them with dwindling food sources, forcing them into daily conflict with farmers and pet dogs.

These monkeys roam the area under the leadership of several dominant males. One of them, named "Bir Bahadur", is the leader of a 35-member group in Kusumpur and has a fresh wound on his face.

He remains alert, scanning his surroundings in an aggressive posture, as if he has just returned from a

fierce battle. Every day he fights to protect his group and secure food and territory. For nearly nine years, he has maintained leadership by defeating rival males from other groups. But with age and worsening food shortages, the struggle has become increasingly difficult.

Other langur leaders like Ranjay, Prahari, Aranyabir and Shaktiman occupy their territories in the same fashion. Territorial disputes are frequent. At times, the monkeys also come under attack from pet dogs in nearby villages.

Local veterinarian Mahiuddin said the adult monkeys in the area are noticeably smaller and lighter than expected. Unlike wild animals living freely in forests and feeding naturally, these monkeys appear malnourished, underdeveloped, thin and weak.
